Hnnual Storm Sewer System

The council did not need to take action initially at the first monthly meeting. The presentation was required to meet the conditions of the city's annual report for the municipal separate storm sewer system permit for submission to the MN Pollution Control Agency. The City of Carver has been operating under an NPDES Phase II General Storm Water Permit from the MPCA since 2003.

Annually the city is required to conduct a public hearing to educate the public and allow comments from the public. The city works with the Lower MN River Watershed District and the Carver County Watershed Management Organization on new development reviews.

The engineer would give a presentation on the history of the NPDES, general urban storm water education and the status of the compliance with permit conditions. Public comments would be welcomed and responses prepared and submitted to the MPCA along with the report. Storm water utility fees pay for the costs associated with the report and the staff recommended submittal to the MPCA.

The council held the required Public Hearing for the annual Storm Water presentation. There was not any additional information or questions from the public.

Elementary/Park Update

The Public Services Director provided an overview of the field lighting opportunities for the proposed elementary school/park site. There was a discussion regarding the costs on the value of placing lights presently versus later, the need for the lighting and the costs of one or two fields.

The council requested further investigation to answer the potential uses of the fields after dark, if the school had any fields that were lighted in the district. Then further discussion will be held.

Council was updated on information that the Planning Commission held a Public Hearing regarding the proposed elementary school pertaining to four items involving rezoning from agriculture to public/institutional, the preliminary plat, site plan and the final plat which were all approved.

Also the Planning Commission held a second Public Hearing to amend the city's sub-division regulations and Zoning Ordinance related to financial securities for other government entities including schools in Carver County which was also approved.

Street Repair

The council discussed street repairs with the Public Services Director. Proposal was made for mill and overlay for areas on 6th Street and Carver Bluffs Parkway that currently are in need of attention. The council discussed the areas and the issues related. Cost comparisons and quotes were reviewed. Motion was made and carried with all ayes approving the quote from GMH Asphalt Corporation not exceeding stated amount for repairs.

Village Hall

One of the members from the Focus Group gave the council his opinion on the Village Hall's future. His opinion was that focus efforts should be on the design of a new civic center rather than remodeling. A post office could be included in this new center. Remodeling the hall would only postpone the inevitable and more costly in the future. He further stated that the land under the hall could be converted to green space or a parking lot.

The administrator updated the council summarizing former requests that included soil boring and brokers certified opinion of value. Discussion of alternatives could be beneficial, concern was information was too generic. A Master Facilities Study had been requested. The process of that proposal was reviewed by the council. The process would allow the council to obtain significant feedback from the residents, allowing further discussion on future options. The council consensus supported the option of the Master Facilities Study.

The administrator also updated the council on the option and status of the historic schoolhouse usage. The owner may have received an offer from a private party and the administrator will keep the council advised to the status. Motion was made and carried with all ayes to engage the services of Leo A Daly for a study.

Focus Group

Administrator pointed out to the council that the Focus Group Report was a strategic initiative to include two areas in preparation for the Comprehensive Plan and to define engagement strategies to be employed. The groups were round table discussions. The primary guiding principles from the entire report included development of community cohesiveness; commercial and industrial development competition; support and preserve the historic downtown; encourage affordable housing; communication, education and transparency to the community; and the leverage of the park and school partnerships. The next step is to create mini action plan so that portions can be implemented. Initially this could begin with the ambassador program. That information gathered could be used by the Planning Commission and the Council for consideration for future discussions. At this time, this information is merely an update, communications, will be posted at the city's website and other means of social media pages.

Liquor Licenses

The council reviewed the licenses due for the city. Carver Liquor Harvey's Bar and Grill, Lisa's Place and the Dog House applications were all certified by the sheriff's office and background checks completed. Approval for the licenses require council approval. The Lions will request temporary licenses as needed via their non-profit status.

Brewery Ordinance

Background information was given by the city planner. Previously the council had reviewed proposed amendments to the ordinances permitting breweries, taproom and brewpubs within the city. Several amendments would be required to accommodate this type of use relating to licenses, zoning and fee ordinances. The city attorney reviewed and commented on the topic. The Planning Commission held a Public Hearing on the ordinance amendment. Their recommendation was to permit these types of uses by Conditional Uses in various commercial and industrial zoning districts. Motions were made and carried with all ayes adopting ordinance relating to taproom and brewer onsale and off-sale licenses; adopting the ordinance amending the zoning ordinance relating to brew pubs, breweries and taprooms; and adopting ordinance establishing license fees.

DownTown Master Plan

Background information was given by the city planner on the Downtown Master Plan. The dragged plan was being submitted for public review and comments. Participants working on the plan for approximately a year included residents, board members, business owners and individuals interested in the community. The plan is available on the city's website. Three primary key areas defined as requiring further discussion and study were the Streetscape of Broadway to 6th Street, realignment potentiality of Mt Hope Road intersection with the former County Road # 40; and the creation of possibilities for the south end of Broadway to connect to the river enhancing the awareness of its importance to the community. The mayor pointed out that these ideas were only 'concept plans' at this point in time. Further feedback from the residents is welcomed. Grant potential is also being investigated.

League of MN Cities

The administrator told the council of his interest in applying for the vacancy on the League of Minnesota Cities Executive Board. It was his opinion that this vacancy would afford the city the opportunity to have additional influence on policy development throughout the state that impact cities. Additionally, it would also give Carver some notoriety on issues. Motion was made and carried with all ayes approving the application by the administrator. The performance of the administrator was again praised and reiterated for his selfless and conscientious contributions for the city and its residents.

Fire Station Rental Hyreement The council reviewed the approval request for the Fire Station

The council reviewed the approval request for the Fire Station Rental Agreement with the Carver Fire Relief Association. The relief association is an independent organization comprised of current members of the Fire Department. The primary role of the Relief group is to manage pensions. There is a Board of Trustees selected within their membership and required board seats held by the city's fire chief, city administrator and the mayor. The agreement formalizes the use of the station for the association and its members. The recommendation was approval of the agreements.

Street Name Change

The council discussed the changing of the street name by adoption of an ordinance. The street of discussion involved $300 5^{th}$ Street East and change the address to 300 Mount Hope Road. Originally the East Street of Fifth was planned for continuation through to County Road #40. However, this extension never materialized. As a result, the current address is incorrect on the County's Property information system. Emergency services ultimately could have difficulty locating this property by the current address if the issue is not resolved. The staff recommended approval.

Park and Ride

Request was submitted for approval of the final payment contingent upon final county approval for the Park and Ride Shelter. The costs of this project were split between two contractors doing separate work. One contractor has completed all their work and requests payment. Carver County has been the acting administrative agent for the city. After the city approves payment, then the county will review and approve payment. The staff recommended approval.

Ordinance *Ame*ndment

The staff submitted a recommendation to the council regarding the Subdivision Regulations Ordinance to clarify language pertaining to financial security and development agreements for governmental entities. With this amendment, the Eastern Carver County Schools and Carver County would be required to enter into a development agreement but would not be required to post financial security.

Administrative Assistant

The council was requested to authorize a motion to temporarily fill the Administrative Assistant position at said amount. The present assistant will be taking an unanticipated temporary Leave of Absence for approximately eight weeks. The necessity to fill the position is required to support the building official's activities and back up support for boards and the city to continue to provide services necessary to ensure operations continue to function smoothly.

Pedestrian Underpass

The city reviewed for approval the plans and specifications for the Pedestrian Underpass and scheduling a bid opening Funding has been received from the Livable Communities Demonstration Account for a trial extension and pedestrian underpass under the County State Aid Highway program. The underpass will allow access to the Park and Ride structure and surrounding development. The new elementary school is also scheduled to open in the fall of 2017. The underpass and trail is owned and maintained by the city under the county's policy for trails and underpasses.

Acquisition of permanent and temporary easements for the trail and the underpass were obtained in the spring of this year. Dimensions and plans were provided to the city engineer. In order to encourage more competitive processes the project is being scheduled to allow work beginning summer or fall of this year and the work completed this year. Limited closures are expected.

Funding for the project are from the LCDA grant, Storm Water Utility, and any additional funding will come from Park Dedication funds. Due to budgetary constraints, two alternatives are proposed. Lighting for the underpass with alternates for research time and the second alternative involves paving of asphalt. The final decision for acceptance will be determined prior to award of the project.

The engineer informed the council that the plans had been updated and that MnDOT State Aid had also approved the plans. The proposed construction schedule was made to encourage bidders. Closure of the road was estimated for about three weeks for the underpass construction. Motion was made and carried with all ayes approving the plans and specification for the pedestrian underpass and scheduled big opening time and date.

The engineer and the council discussed the construction closure, costs, temporary traffic control, bypass lanes and equipment maneuverability further. After the initial meeting the staff requested additional alternate bids involving reducing road closures to two weeks or one week. Discussions involved time schedules for contractors and the inability to be that restricted to one or two weeks, it would allow the contractors to choose or not choose bidding of alternates and still be considered responsive.

Joint Powers Hyreement

An update was given to the council regarding the Joint Powers Agreement involving County Road # 40 and turning it back to the city. The topic involved the city and county staff pertaining to the county state aid highway. Discussions have occurred with the county involving the turning back to the city which began early in the 2000s. Support was given when the streetscape improvements along Broadway were done. Again support was given to the variance request of street width. The discussions continued with the MCES improvements. At that time the population had increased with anticipated quick growth. A letter was sent involving the achievement of the Mutual State Aid status and negotiation of mutually acceptable terms were the intention taking over jurisdiction. The issue again surfaces with discussion of the Highway 61 Corridor Study. There was confusion discussing the referenced highway 61. Further discussions have been held and clarifications with the county engineer to the language of the Corridor Study which is being adjusted since the county road 40 turn back issue has not been negotiated to date. The final outcome of the discussion involved the decision that once the city reaches a population of five thousand and is accepted as a municipal state aid city then negotiating a joint powers agreement between the city and the county will be pursued.

Certified Levee Study The council was updated on discussions the city staff held with the Army Corps of Engineers regarding a Levee Study. Over the years the City of Carver has contacted federal legislators requesting support in funding for a feasibility study on the existing levee. Working with the Army Corp of Engineers on the repairs of the Spring Creek Levee and were updated that if funding were to become available for these types of studies that the city was the highest priority on the St Paul District's list. Work has been in progress to prioritize this topic. The city staff have been updated on some of the upcoming steps required relating to their prioritization

The first step involves a Federal Interest Determination that uses existing available information that reveals the whole situation to view the problems of the existing levee, alternatives and a very rough order of magnitude estimate of cost related to levee improvements. The Federal Interest Determination would involve the Army Corps of Engineers and made a site visit. Then the Army Corps of Engineers would forward their Federal Interest Determination to see if a feasibility study is warranted.

If a feasibility study were to be determined to be warranted and funding obtained, then the Army Corps of Engineers would be the first upfront costs for the study and then enter into a cost share agreement with fifty percent cost on the Army Corp of Engineers and the remaining fifty percent the responsibility of the city. The staff will continue to meet with the Army Corp of Engineers to work through the Federal Interest Determination process relating to a levee feasibility study and update the council as necessary.

Community Park Shelter

The council was informed that the roof at the Community Park Shelter required replacement in order to stay consistent with other city parks. Originally this project was to be a community project but the two bidding contractors were not interested in working with the city to be a project manager. Working with large sheets of metal can be dangerous, safety is the ultimate goal. Warranty and quality of workmanship is a controllable measure when working with licensed contractors. Project completion can be completed with maximum of three days versus volunteering when available. Public service does not have the knowledge or experience with metal roofing systems to complete the task. Therefore, Public Services recommended hiring Voss Construction to replace the roof. Expectations were work hours from 7:30 AM until 3 PM, clean up for park activities and two to three days for completion of a metal roof.

AnneAxation

The city planner informed the council that an amended order approving the annexation had been issued and that upon adopting the resolution it include an updated legal description. The legal description had been changed subsequent to the resolutions. An updated survey and title work had been prepared for the designated property and the council reviewed the amended and replacement resolution involving the annexation of the Lenzen Property involving the Carver/Dahlgren Township Joint Agreement.

Primus Companies and the Lenzens have jointly submitted land use applications for rezoning from agricultural to general comercial; variance allowing driveway onto collector road; preliminary plat, site plan, and final plat. The Planning Commission reviewed these applications and recommended approval. Request was submitted from the developer to consider reimbursement for specific costs relating to utilities. Typically the city has reimbursed. A resolution was drafted authorizing reimbursement items. Staff was waiting on receipt of estimated costs.

Resolution was also drafted for the possible requirement of an extension of municipal utilities lines to the north. Dependent upon costs request may be made to the developer and reimbursement considered for this request.

Street and Utility Improvements

The council discussed with the city engineer options relating to the 3rd Street Bridge. Bridge option preferences need to be relayed to the staff. Discussion was held on preparation of a Bridge Improvements Study if necessary if the city chooses to remove the old bridge and construct a new bridge. The condition of the bridge was talked about and the bridge was built in 1912 and is in poor condition with a sufficiency rating computed as a value to determine eligibility for funding. Sufficiency rating of eighty or less is classified as structurally deficient and is eligible for funding, In order to get bridge funding, plans need be prepared, submitted and approved by MnDOT. Several legislative cycles could pass before funding project based on current funding levels and ranks compared to other bridge projects. The bridge inspection completed in 2015 recommended planning for repairs or replacement.

Removal or replacement of the 3rd Street Bridge prompts a permit from the Army Corps of Engineers. In the historic district, it then prompts federal requirements involving the state Historic Preservation Office. This process was required for the 4th Street Bridge projects. Staff anticipates similar study necessary for the 3rd Street Bridge prior to permit approval by the Army Corps of Engineers. The staff had been directed previously to survey for repair or replacement. Survey was posted for public's input, a resident design session reviewed the issue. The pros and cons of various types of options were reviewed.

The city identified street, alley and utility improvements of the remaining streets in the downtown area along with the Capital Improvement Plan. The streetscape improvements along Broadway had been included in the Downtown Master Planning Study. Along with street improvements, there will be areas of work required for sanitary sewer, storm sewer and water main work to be considered in the 2017 Street and Utility project area. If the City were to proceed with design, the cost of the feasibility report would be credited against the design costs for the project. These costs associated with the project would be paid through assessments, utility funds, general funds, and bonding.

2017 Budge t Review

The administrator provided the council with an overview of the budget process. The financial personnel also discussed the long range financial planning process.

Proposed Dental Office

Construction of a proposed approximate twenty seven hundred square foot dental office was submitted by applicant on the property at the intersection of Dahlgren Road and County Road # 11. Annexed properties are automatically zoned so as compatible with the Comprehensive Plan guidance of for commercial. The proposed development is consistent with the General Commercial Zoning District. The Planning Commission reviewed and recommended approval for the proposed rezoning.

The proposed development does not meet all the requirements for approval to allow a driveway access onto the collector road. The property will not be developed to its fullest use. A variance request would be considered for the lot only. The building cannot exceed thirty five squire feet which would allow for expansion. If further development of the property were pursued, access would be required to be reviewed again. The Planning Commission recommended approval of the variance.

Preliminary plats provide the layout for lots and blocks for future sale and ownership of specific parcels. The Site Plan reviews both the internal development and architecture of the site. The Final Plat is recorded at the County Recorder's Office. Due to the simplicity of this plat and small amount of public improvements, the preliminary and final plats are being reviewed jointly because they are inter-related and the elements composing these are reviewed together. Proposal is for a dental office only even though there is availability for future development. Future development impacts were not considered at this time in the reviewal process. The land is being developed as an outlot which will not be buildable until such time as additional development is proposed. Additional development will be reviewed cumulatively for impacts. The proposed land is one lot for a dental office building, and two outlots for future development. The present proposal allows for expansion.

Construction of the driveway is proposed with access off of Dahlgren Road. This would be a joint driveway to be shared by all uses of the site. A maneuvering agreement is required. Also the plans dedicate Dahlgren Road and County Road # 11 to the public. A traffic impact analysis was not required. Proposed development for another use is then anticipated to require a traffic impact analysis.

A trail is required on the north side of the lot from the intersection of County Road # 11 and Dahlgren Road to the western property line. However, the subdivision ordinance provides for the possibility to postpone the extension of certain improvements if conditions warrant. Currently the trail would serve only one use and does not provide for signal controlled pedestrian crossing. A trail easement is proposed presently. Construction of a trail in the future if later development of the property is pursued may be required. Utilities will be required to be extended through new plats to the property line. Park dedication is required and will be calculated at the execution of the developer's agreement. Existing trees were identified and are predominantly on the western side of the site. No removal is proposed to be enough to require replacement. Future development could affect the requirement of reforestation. There is a proposed landscape plan. Updates will be required.

Outlots A and B are not buildable until future subdivision and site plans are reviewed and approved by the city and county. A title commitment shall be provided for the city attorney to review prior to plat released for recording. The developer will be required to reimburse the city for all costs incurred by the city and/or consultant relating to review of proposed development plans, inspection of improvements and the Developer's Agreement preparation. A trail easement for Outlot B will be required on the north side. Construction of the trail will not be required until additional application for site plan and/or subdivision is submitted. Office access is not permitted to have direct access onto County Road # 11 or Dahlgren Road. Dahlgren Road is identified in the county's transportation plan as a future county road. The driveway location does not meet the requirements of the county. Existing utility lines not required to be required to be deemed in the future if and when subdivision application is submitted. In the future lines installed will be required to be placed underground. Signage will be required and reviewed separately by the city planner. Infrastructure will be designed and constructed by the developer and approval and inspection to be by the city engineer. Construction components will be detailed in the Developer's Agreement to be approved with the final plat. Easements will be secured by the developer.

Community Growth Partnership

The administrative intern discussed the Carver County Community Development Agency Community Growth Partnership Incentive Grant Program with the council. The council needs to authorize the staff to submit a grant application for this grant. This program was created and funded by the Carver County Community Development Agency in January of this year. The goals of the program are to increase the tax base and improve the quality of life in Carver County. It is intended to assist cities with redevelopment plan goals. Blighted and underutilized areas do not maximize their potential economic value and can negatively impact the livability of a community. The responsibility for creating redevelopment activities lies primarily with the cities. The council reviewed the drafted resolution.

(Dpeeding

Extra Enforcement on county roads will be seen in an attempt to bring attention to consequences of speeding. Facts have been publicized that speed has played a major role in crashes that killed many in the State of Minnesota roads in 2015. Enhanced enforcement and increase education efforts regarding traffic safety is the ultimate goal and the message being relayed.

Speeding is a leading factor in crashes, contributing to one out of every five fatalities on Minnesota roads. The summer months are especially troublesome with an average of twenty three speedrelated deaths a year during the 100 deadliest days (Memorial Day – Labor Day) on MN roads.

The consequences of speeding is obviously death, but there is also the greater potential for loss of control of the vehicle; increased stopping distance, less time for response for crash avoidance, and increased crash severity. Did you know that three seconds is a safe following distance? Did you also know that at 60mph it takes more than the length of a football field to stop? Then there is the inability to see motorcyclists. Motorcycles are smaller and their speed and distance are more difficult to judge the sheriff stated.

Speeding costs are astronomical. Go to the city's website or Carver Current and read more information on this topic. I have only out highlights to reinforce the facts. "Speeding to get Nowhere Fast" and " Speeding does not help one to get to their destination significantly faster." I always joke that a speeding person is worried that we will get their parking spot and that item we were going to buy in the store or get that last table at the restaurant. The saddest part of the whole scenario is that the end consequence of death is not worth the speed. There is no more when you are gone. You can't come back, you can't do over, you can't fix the error. It's OVER/DONE. You are GONE! SLOW DOWN!
