Historic Clock

The Heritage Preservation Commission members were told by the building inspector of discussions with the 2017 Street Improvement Project on Broadway regarding installation of a pedestal clock at the corner of Fourth Street and Broadway. Question was asked if the clock would be two sided. That answer was not available. The Heritage Preservation members approved by motion recommending that the clock be two sided and that at the top, the year established 1852 be displayed.

Corridor Study

WSB & Associates representative provided the council with an overview of information regarding the Jonathan Carver Parkway Corridor Study. The purpose of the study is to identify short-term, midterm and long-term plans necessary for the road from the highway to the county road. Reviewed were the objectives, goals, key study elements, schedule overview, and near-term activities. Question was asked about traffic movement. County Road # 43 would also be reviewed. Study is anticipated to be complete by approximately July of

Inter-Fund Goan

The city manager explained the information pertaining to the Inter-Fund Loan to the council. Council member inquired about the costs incurred for the Depot Park improvements. These improvements were cost-sharing expenses which included the parking lot, landscaping, kiosk, etc for trailhead improvements. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution authorizing an inter-fun loan from the sanitary sewer fund to the park dedication fund.

Building Inspector Updates

The building inspector updated the council. Final inspections would be forthcoming regarding the daycare center neareing completion. The dental office had been issued the certificate of occupancy, Centra Homes has completed the development identified as Lylewood Glen. Carver Ridge 2nd addition had three remaining lots and two homes were under construction. There are three homes being built in Copper Hills, two homes in Christy's Bluff and Riverview Estates has three houses under construction

Miscellaneous

Staff has been researching the possibility of acquisition of property owned by Wm Mueller and Sons for possible storm water pond. The council was told that Centra Homes will not be involved in the Hartman Communities housing project.

The estate of Ms Shambour might possibly be applying for a demolition permit for property on Third Street West. The Heritage Preservation Commission will need to review the application.

The city manager told the council that he had met with the State Senator Scott Jensen. The Senator expressed interest in efforts including certification of the levee in the bonding bill. The Senator would also be prioritizing the Highway 212 expansion from Carver to Cologne.

The council was asked to study guidelines for maintaining natural habitat for new developments within the city under Natural Habitat Protection.

The mayor discussed with the council a Sister City Program after attending a Regional Council of Mayors meeting. The group expressed interest working with mayors from outstate to develop relationships.

The mayor stated the importance of learning more regarding drone regulations for cities.

Discussion was also held with a suggestion regarding Irrigation and the city discussing implementation and guidelines for irrigated areas utilizing non-treated water.

The city council conducted interviews for a Parks Commission opening Applicants were also asked about interest in serving on other commission positions.

Concern was expressed by council member regarding the recent appointments concerning the topics concerning the Monarch butterflies and plastic bags projects and not having a work plan in place. The city manager suggested asking the applicants to present a plan regarding their projects and it would include resources and time-frame.

The city manager updated the council that the building committee personnel would be touring city halls in various cities and the council was invited to participate in the tour.

The city manager discussed with the council the alternative options inclusive of decorative crosswalks at the intersections of 3rd and 4th Streets on Broadway. Quotes and samples will be obtained for council review for the spring planned project.

Strategic Plan

The city manager provided an overview of information concerning the Strategic Plan - Action Plan session that had been held in February. Suggestion was made to contact the Urban Land Institute regarding marketing suggestions received in the past. Clarification was asked for regarding reference made for group to help the Parks Commission with the Master Plan. The manager indicated that the Engineering firm was compiling an inventory of city parks. A future meeting was scheduled for the council and the parks commission. Question was asked if the engineering firm would conduct the entire process and if the city planner had previous experience with similar projects in the past. Response was given that the city planner had done a Parks Dedication study. The Parks inventory was more park specific planning. The study could be used for determination of park dedication fees. A thorough research of the individual parks had not been done in the past. Question was asked how often the strategic plan would be reviewed gauging progress. The council would be given quarterly updates. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the action plan for the 2017 - 2022 Strategic Plan.

Chaska Valley Family Theatre

The Chaska Valley Family Theatre has forwarded information for upcoming season. They will hold auditions on th 18th and 19th of September from 6 to 9 PM at the Pioneer Ridge Middle School for their holiday show, "It's a Wonderful Life."

Their 2018 spring line up is "Schoolhouse Rock Live" and auditions will probably take place in December or January.

Their summer show will be "Footloose" with auditions in March or April. They have also relayed that they will be doing an adaption of the movie, "That Thing You Do", next year, called "The Wonders". Stay tuned for details.

2040 Comprehensive Plan

Joint session was held with the city council regarding the 2040 Comprehensive Plan discussions. Goal setting was the first topic of discussion with an exercise addressing "How will Carver be successful in 2040?" The goal of the session was to develop the planning principles to guide the plan. Principles selected included Sense of Community Pride, embrace the river, planning for access to Carver commerce, homes for all, connected by trails, innovative infrastructure and planning, and long term financial stewardship. These principles would be incorporated into the 2040 Comprehensive Plan.

Council Compensation

The city manager discussed with the council his findings regarding the topic of council compensation. The city council personnel are paid per regular and special meetings as authorized by the council and the last increase was made in 2001. The compensation issue was reviewed during the 2016 budget process and at that time the decision was made to maintain the same compensation. The staff collected information from surrounding cities for review. Change Action has to be done by ordinance. Additionally, any ordinance change relating to compensation would only become effective per state law after the next general election. On any changes made, a new compensation plan would not become effective until January 2019. It was also noted that it appears that there is a trend towards an annual compensation system.

Interim City Hall Proposal

The Building Official, Public Services Director and City Clerk/ Treasurer presented an alternate option moving the city hall personnel to the Fire Department/Public Services building during construction of the new city hall instead of moving to Carver Place. The reasons for this alternative emphasized additional space, better features, accessibility and more of a long-term investment. The council agreed with the feasible option. The staff would begin work on a budget for this move and return to the council for consideration in the future.

The council reviewed the costs associated with a temporary relocation of city hall offices to the Fire Station/Public Services building. The city manager presented the plan temporarily relocating offices. This plan is in anticipation of the expected demolition of the existing city hall in early 2018. Pending approval, the tentative scheduled construction of a new city hall would be in the spring of 2018. Also pending approval, the schedule and communication plan for the relocation will be in the future.

Fire Department

The Fire Chief introduced the council to the two new fire fighter hires who are Nathan Dingler and Matthew McCoy. Welcome was extended and thanks to the two gentlemen for their service to the city.



The council member thanked the department for their invitation to participate in firefighting activities. Comment was made regarding a great experience and how much was learned from the event. Thanks were also extended to the Fire Department and the Sheriff's office for the visits made on the "Night to Unite" event, as well. The mayor also tremendous experience. This idea added to the relationship and commended the department on their initiative.

City Engineer Report

The city engineer updated the council on the schedule for the project by GMH Corp. If the citizens have questions or comments, they are asked to contact the engineer or the contacts listed on the project.

The mayor inquired whether or not the streets would be ready for Steamboat Days. If they are not, then the mayor requested a valid reason, other than weather as to why they would not be completed. The engineer responded understanding the concerns and stated that the work would be completed. Other council members also expressed their concerns. The engineer also stated that the contractor is well aware of the importance of completion prior to the city event and is a resident. Question was also asked about completion of the alleys. The engineer indicated that they were not specifically listed on the schedule but coincide with the work into the 3rd Street, Hickory, Ash, Jorgenson and 5th Street. Sidewalk completion was questioned. The engineer stated that the sidewalks on Broadway will be completed, but west of the bridge on 3rd street the sidewalks will not be done. Statement was made that the area in question is the site of the scheduled beanbag tournament.

City Hall Project

The city manager discussed with the council the construction management services for the city hall project proposed. Clarification was requested that the council consensus was city manager form of government. The response was correct. The city manager had not worked with a contractor on a previous city hall project. The mayor had spoken with both contenders for the construction management services, Vos and Kraus Anderson. It was the mayor's opinion that the firm of Kraus- Anderson was best equipped with the best resources for completing the job with respect for Vos. Statement was also voiced respecting the concerns of fellow members regarding the cost difference but see value in the choice and recommendation for working with Kraus Anderson. Council members weighed in on their opinions. Kraus Anderson has many professional experience and resources along with their reputation. Struggling with the cost difference. Statement was voiced regarding the importance of comfort zone with contracted services versus the cost differences. Motion was made and carried with four ayes and one nay selecting the proposal from Kraus Anderson providing construction management services for the Broadway City Hall project.

Oak Tree Development

The engineer discussed with the council the Wetland Conservation Act Action necessary in the Hartman Communities 'Oak Tree Development. The proposed Oak Tree Development project consisting of developing one hundred family lots, one hundred thirty townhomes and approximately ten acres of park, trails and open space including wetland, ponding, tree preservation and bluff zones. The proposed project involves the impact of a small portion to wetlands. The applicant proposes replacement of the wetlands utilizing wetland bank per state requirements. The city council approves the permit application and the permit application provides the necessary information to confirm the project meets the requirements of the Wetland Conservation Act.

Congratulations to the Carver Black Sox!

The Carver Black Sox qualified for the MN Amateur Baseball State Tournament. Their last state tournament game was in 1983.

From the Black Sox website is the following report and is important to share their good news and what happened:

"Carver Wins First Game in State Tournament Next Game - Sunday, August 27th, 5 pm – in Norwood versus Dodge County

"Marck Ulrich threw a complete game, 5-hit shutout to lead the Black Sox to a 11-0 win over the New York Mills Millers on Friday evening in Hamburg. Ulrich struck out 6 in the victory.

"Carver and New York Mills were locked in a tight 2-0 game until Carver broke it open in the 7th inning scoring 5 runs; then added 4 more runs in the 8th to seal the game. Carver opened the scoring in the 4th inning on a two out single by Anthony Gross bringing in Sam Warner. Bailey Melz then singled to drive in Bryce Tuma who had been hit by a pitch; and the Black Sox added to a lead they would not relinquish.

The 7th inning started with a one out single by Matt Mitchell who advanced to second on a balk. CRVL Batting Champion, Kyle Dalton followed with a single to drive in Mitchell to give Carver 3-0 lead. The lead grew on a single to Ulrich, a walk to Andrew Weber, a hitby-pitch to Warner, another walk to Tuma and a 2 run single by Gross.

"The Black Sox were led by Gross' two hits and 3 RBI, along with 2 hit nights by Dalton and Ulrich; and 2 RBI nights from Weber and Warner.


"Norton, Maes Pitch Carver to a 2-0 Victory Over Young America to earn the 3rd seed in Region 7 Tournament

Carver took an 8-6 lead in the 6th on RBI singles by Ian Walkowski and Bailey Melz. Walkowski had 3 hits for the game as did Adam Fredericks. Dalton, Melz and Mitchell all contributed 2 RBI. Anthony Gross scored 3 runs.

"The Irish came back with 3 runs in the 7th to take back the lead at 9-8. Green Isle's Nolan Hartmann came in to shut down the Black Sox and earned the victory."
