City Council News:

Rublic Hearing

Mayor Meyers opened the public hearing on May 18th, 1987 for reduction of lot size requirements without municipal sever. A representative from the Metropolitan council read the Met Council's policy which opposed small lots without sever and recommended one unit per ten acres. Planning Commission Chairperson expressed opinion that reduction of lot size to nineteen thousand square feet would not help the city's growth. That if lots were too small, then the city would be forced to install municipal sever and the entire city would be expected to pay for such an improvement. Another Planning Commission member stated that smaller lots would mean future problems which should be handled now. Another citizen expressed disapproval based on a letter received from the PCA [Pollution Gontrol Agency]. Other citizens also opposed the reduction of lot size from two and half acres. \

Sources of information on lot size requirements were briefly discussed. Councilman Briggs commented that the purpose of a Public Hearing was to obtain information and hear the public's opinion.

Council was asked why consideration was being given to reduce lot sizes back to nineteen thousand square feet. The mayor explained that a vari request had been made and the council chose to consider the issue further. Question was asked why nineteen thousand square feet had been changed to the two and half acres. Councilman Wendland explained that this change had been made for several reasons. He thought one reason was to attempt to control development. Developers were required to install utilities and streets before developing. A citieen agreed that reduction of lot sizes should not be made, since in the future, there could be problems.

Councilman Hanson stated that the council's primary purpose was to provide a healthy environment for citizens and the real issue was whether or not unsewered lots would pollute the city's well or ground water. The mayor added that their concern was for safety. He asked the citizens present, if they were concerned about safety or taxation. A citizen spoke of having to put in sever in already developed additions and taxing the core city residents, as well as concern for the public's health. Another citizen inquired about how many additional hookups the system could service. Ebeling [Maier Stewart] stated that the sytem could handle an additional estimated four hundred individuals.

Motion was made and carried with all ayes to close the Public Hearing. Motion was made to table action on the Zoning Ordinance, but after further discussion, motion was withdrawn.

Motion was made and carried with all ayes to send proposal of lot size to the Planning Commision, requesting collection of more information, then make a recommendation, including correlation of material to support their decision.

Public Works Department

On May eighteeenth, the City Administrator presented a report on the need for a city truck for the Public Works Department. Motion was made to purchase said truck. Discussion was held on the kind of truck and the necessary accessories. Council consensus was that the vehicle should be red. Motion was made and carried with all ayes to purchase a city truck to be paid for with the Public Works Capital Equipment Funds and Federal Revenue Sharing Funds.



Sixth Street

Council considered requests by the contractor at the May 18th meeting for additional compensation. An area of concern was the culvert on Sixth Street. A hazard existed with this culvert. The engineers recommended work be approved for correction of the problem.

Access to one driveway was one reason for concern, since the street was being lowered to improve the grade. Engineer and property owner were to work together to solve this problem.

Motion was made and carried with all ayes authorizing payment of any changes made on reinforced concrete pipe on Sixth Street on a time and material basis, the city's share not to exceed three hundred dollars.

Police Contract



Council was told on May eighteenth that the City of Young America has contacted cities and townships regarding the creating of a Task Force to study district policing versus contract policing. A meeting is scheduled for June third. The City Administrator suggested appointment of a representative from the city. Motion was made, appointing Councilman Hanson as the representative.

Presbyterian Church

Jeff Siegel presented results of study on the Presbyterian Church for public use. The findings, recommendations and design solutions by the architect were reviewed. Discussion was held pertaining to handicap accessibility. A small addition in the rear of the building would be necessary for such an access, but this would preserve the historical facade of the church front. The structural condition was sound, but a small area requires rebuilding. The committee appointed would now study costs for suggestions and attempt to submit suggestions for financing these costs.





Ebeling [Maier Stewart] updated the council at the May eighteenth meeting on the progress of the construction. Mainline sewer and water will be completed by Memorial Day, he told the council.

Motion was made and carried with all ayes accepting the change order involving the work around the gas line on Fourth Street, adding pressure gauges on the manholes and the lowering of the water main on Fourth Street, in order that the road was consistant with the driveways. This change order involved a dollar increase to the contract.

Ebeling told the council that Hydro Engineering requested additional compensation for testing of septic tanks and rerouting of the mainline which was more difficult. Engineers were not supporting the requests. The mayor stated that if Hydro opposed the decision to deny these requests, they were to come before the council.

Ebeling requested consideration of Maier Stewart's request for payment of additional inspection hours on the project. Councilman Briggs was not comfortable with the payment. There was further discussion. Ebeling stated that he was authorized to reduce the total by ten percent, but was not authorized to reduce hourly rates. Motion was made, carrying with all ayes, authorizing payment of twenty-five thousand dollars to Maier Stewart for additional services.

Several ads have been run for a water and wastewater operator. The City of Chaska has declined to run the system. Applications and Munitech's proposal will be reviewed at the next meeting. The system will not be operational until an operator is hired. City Administrator was asked to screen applicants. Qualified individuals will be interviewed.

City Administrator told the council that a property owner would not have a septic tank installed, since the city had not received a signed permit.

Hydro Engineering, Maier Stewart and the council held a construction meeting on June 8th. The discussion regarded Hydro's request for additional money for charges in scope of work in the project which was not in the specifications.

Hydro had been testing tanks. The PCA [Pollution Control Agenty] did not want to pay for that testing. Ebeling [Maier Stewart] stated that perhaps if the city were to explain to the PCA, they may reconsider. Motion was made for the City Administrator to pursue the issue with the PCA. Further discussion was held. Motion was made and carried with all ayes to table the topic until the next meeting.

Change order would be written up and presented to the council in the future for their consideration of a request of double unit price for water and sewer installed west of Elm Drive. Hydro requested a letter from both the city and Maier Stewart because some water lines were not seven and a half feet below the surface. Councilman Briggs had a problem with jeopardizing the main part of the project because of street grades. Request to lower grades of streets had been done after the mains were installed. Motion was made and carried with all ayes to table the issue until the next meeting.

Ebeling requested approval to appeal PCA's completion date of July 17th, 1987 and to agree with Maier Stewart's recommended completion date of July 29th, 1987 for the municipal utilities projects. Motion was made and carried with all ayes approving appeal of completion date set by the PCA. Ebeling also told the council that Paul Boettcher would be phased out as Carver's resident engineer because he was needed elsewhere. John Downing would be the inspector on the project. The council protested this change, directing Ebeling to relay their wish to John Stewart that Boettcher remain in Carver.

Munitch's proposal for operation of the municipal utilities systems had been lowered due to more responsibilities to be taken on by the city staff. Applicants had not met PCA requirements. Approval of Munitech's contract for one year was accepted by motion.

Hearing on the condemnation pond site property had been completed.

Restoration of property was inquired about. Property owner was directed to work it out with the contractor, but doubted restoration would be completed before the end of the project.

Proposed Tentative Construction scheduled Posting

Continuous tentative proposed construction achedule for municipal utilities [Water and Sewer], is posted on the Bulletin Board at the Post Office and/or at the Hydro Engineering Office [448-6343], also, in the basement of the Village Hall.

Council discussed their options on May 18th regarding Gillfilan Avenue. The Minnesota League of Cities' attorney thought some maintenance should be done. The council's consensus was that the street would have minimum maintenance as do other gravel roads in the city.


Carver Fire Relief Association

Councilman Wendland asked the mayor on May 18th, if any more information had been found regarding the Fire Relief Association's pension amount agreement. The City Administrator told the council that it was his understanding that the city had agreed to support up to two hundred and seventy-five dollars of the pension and that the Fire Department would be responsible for the remaining increase of four hundred dollars with fundraisers, etc.



Council considered four claims submitted on June 8th regarding mileage. Motion was made but rejected to approve mileage claims. A second motion was made and carried to approve payment of three of the claims submitted. A third motion was made and carreid with all ayes amending payment request for mileage from twenty-six cents per mile to twenty-one cents per mile. Motion was made, carrying with all ayes establishing mileage for councilmemebers at twenty-one cents per mile.

Council discussed mildage payments for outside meetings. Councilman Briggs stated it was a matter of civic duty and had difficulty expecting payment for mileage. Councilman Hanson commented that there should be compensation.



Building Request

ercial establishment owner wants to purchase property adjacent to the establishment to build an addition to his building. This land is in the flood plain where there are state and federal restrictions regarding building in the flood plain. City Administrator had talked with the building inspector and there were dangerous repercussions to grant such a request. City Administrator could talk with the DNR and Army Corps of Engineers to obtain their opinion on the matter. It was stated that since the property was within the flood fringe, it was suggested to check and see if the flood line had changed when the map had been drawn showing exact locations of the flood plain line.

Miscellaneous

Mayor asked citizen for reasoning for accessing County Road # 40 from the vacated street. Response was given that the driveway was not useable and the vacated portion was the easiest available route. This practice was to be stopped per the agreement of the street vacation.

Quote has been received for renewal of city insurance, the council was told on May 18th. There was an increase in the premium. Motion was made and accepted to approve payment.

Council reviewed guidelines for park and playground equipment management. City Administrator contacted the chairperson of the Carver County Fair Board. Some problems existed, but it would take, at least, five to ten years to move from their present location.

The Park Board has given' permission to plant part of the park complex land. In return, the farmer will donate towards development of the park. The council discussed whether or not the city should hold any monies, if received.

Motion was made and carried with all ayes approving the Revised Emergency Plan for the City of Carver.

Property owner presented complaint about property rented out. Permission was asked to have the Health Inspector make an inspection of the property. Council agreed to have an inspection conducted by the Health Inspector.

Representative from the SteamBoat Committee requested beer licenses on June 8th for SteamBoat Days. Motion was made and carried with all ayes to grant request for licenses.

Maiser [Maiser Accounting] reviewed the 86' preliminary budget with the council. State audit on water grant funds was not final. Brief explanation was given and at a future meeting the final grant audit will be reviewed and questions answered.

Payment requests were reviewed and approved for Hydro Engineering. Request for reimbursement of funds was approved by motion.

Lawcon boat ramp payment to William Mueller and Sons was aprpoved by motion. Lot size for property without municipal sewer was discussed. Representative from the Met Council restated the Met Council's position on the issue.

Mount Hope Road ditches were asked to be filled by Frey.


Lenzen and SkyView additions will be swept after June fifteenth and then Frey will fill the cracks on SkyView Lane.

City Administrator told the council about the new state law which will limit the amount of levy increase for 1988 to three percent.

Council considered participation in a new program being implemented by the Carver County HRA for residential energy conservation. Motion was made and car-ried with all ayes approving resolution for the city's participation in the Carver County Home Energy Check-up Program.

Fire Relief Association representative requested council approval on amendment to by-laws of Relief Association. Issue was not resolved.

Councilman Thuenning requested to resign as Planning Commission representative since he was unable to attend the last couple of meetings. Issue will be discussed at the next council meeting.



Knudson [HRA] updated the council on June eighth regarding the block grant. Relocation of the final property owner in the floodway should be hopefully completed by late August.

Council was told that the screen planting by the water tower was not grant eligible. DEED did feel that the fence would be grant eligible, but should be placed at the base only. Forner had agreed to scaled back screening from original plans. Knudson and Forner would be working together on planning of planting. Knudson would bid out fence portion of the agreement.

A misunderstanding had occurred regarding commercial loan funds. An applicant thought the loan had been approved. The Council thought they had a moral obligation to process the loan. Motion was made and carried with all ayes approving the loan application.

Knudson told the council that he would not be working on the project grant in July and August.

Be yourself. Expecially, do not feign affection. Neither by cynical about love; for in the face of all aridity and disenchantment it is perennial as the grass.




