# Sixth Street

City was also informed that grant payments to the city will be on a reimbursement basis.

### Riverside Park

Frey spoke with the DNR who do not object to the park being closed at night. Park should be open from 6:00 AM to 10:00 PM. There is no agreement with the city and DNR regarding the Riverside Park. Since the Sheriff's Department locks the Post Office; possible for them to lock a gate? Motion was made to erect a gate to Riverside Park. Frey has been pricing gates.

# Stop Signs



Frey requestd moving "Stop" signs. Signs should be put on Oak Street to deter drivers racing to County Road # 40 to beat gravel trucks. Motion was made and carried to move "Stop" signs from Third Street to Oak Street, both ways.

# Equipment Fee Schedule

Council considered an Equipment Fee Schedule. Council consensus was dislike for the idea of city equipment being used for anything other than city purposes. Motion was made and carried not to permit city equipment to be rented out. The fee schedule would be used for budgetary purposes only. Motion was made and carried tabling fee schedule.

### Siren

Fire Chief Riesgraf attended meeting to discuss the siren that has been going off without warning. Chief wants the siren blown manually by firemen and not to have the Sheriff's Department doing There is concern of people Not Pattention because it blows inconsistently and sometimes for no apparent reason. Administrator will check into what it will take to connect to the same system as the remainder of the county since Carver is the only area not connected. Motion was made and carried to discontinue blowing siren by Sheriff's Department, taking responsibility to set it off.

Administrator was directed to check with Carver County Emergency Services about a radio receiver with decoder. The mayor stated that the siren should be moved or another purchased.

#### Miscellaneous

NSP will be trimming trees down County Road # 40 into Carver, in order to eliminate some power outages.

Motion was made and carried to adopt Block Event Regulations and Permit Application as presented. Motion was made, amended and carried to establish fee for Block Event Permit. There was further discussion regarding fee established.

Administrator informed the council that the 1992 Budget proceedings would begin soon. Councilmember would like some history with the budget.

On July 8th, a Public Hearing was held for the Lawcon Grant application at the Park and Recreation Board Meeting.

Construction of Townline Road may have an impact on the park. Administrator has already contacted the county engineer regarding the issue.

Councilmember would like a better understanding of the authority of the Heritage Preservation Committee. Request was made to distribute copies of the ordinance to councilmembers. Administrator was also directed to examine and interpret the ordinance.

Motion was made and carried authorizing the donation to Carver-On-The-Minnesota the balance of funds in the historic Grant Fund for use of restoration of stained glass windown in old Presbyterian Church (Interpretive Center).

# Employment Contract

Administrator discussed his employment contract with the council. He would like to eliminate the posting of hours. As a rule, he will be in the office on Tuesday and Thursdays and every other Monday or half days on Monday. Motion was made and carried to accept amended employment contract. It was council's consensus also, that the Personnel Policy should be updated.



## Municipal Utilities

Municipal Utilities Operator informed the council that property owner's lift station is complete and can be accepted as part of the system. Motion was made and carried accepting lifting station as part of the city's system.

Operator is hoping to use plans and speculations from Chaska for watter filtration plant, but the Minnesota Department of Health needs current plans and specs, as well as an engineer's signature. City Engineer will sit down with operator and Frey for discussion and an accurate estimate and attempt to have attempt to have a timate and attempt to have a timate for August meeting. Administrator was directed to contact Health Department regarding was been discussin with PCA regarding twenty-four some sumpler required at pond site. PCA may allow him to install a modified sampler that will cost much less.

# Siegel's Building



The building has been sold by Contract For Deed. If owner defaults on the loan, can nev owner assume the loan? Attorney for purchaser suggested a letter from the city be obtained agreeing to allow him to assume the loan if loanholder defaults. Further discussion was decided should be answered by the attorney.

New owner wanted to refurbish the building as nearly as possible to it; historic appearance. He was directed to the Heritage Preservation Commission. The lower level will remain 'Wearable Art' for now. However, in the near future, the lower level will be an architect's office.

# Scott-Carver Thresher's Show

Jordan, MN-Old-fashioned country fun for the entire family happens on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday (August 9th, 10th, 11th) when the Scott-Carver Threshers steam, chug, and whistle through their 28th Steam and Gas Engine Festival near Jordan. Gates open daily at 7 a.m. and close at sundown.

Children will see the "good old days" in action, and grandparents will relive many of the activities from their own childhood on the farm or in the industrial world. Highlighting each day's events is the 1 p.m. parade of gigantic steam engines, antique cars, trucks and tractors, and antique farm equipment and construction equipment and construction equipment. A new attraction that the Threshers are restoring is a stationary steam engine with an 18-foot flywheel from the old Armour meatpacking plant in So.St.Paul. Other festival highlights include grain threshing, a country-western dancing demonstration, fiddling contest, square dancing, a country-western band, quilting, spinning, a craft market, a flea market, plus mush more.

Burning wood and water to build steam pressure, the massive steam engines are belted daily to the grain separators to thresh stacks of wheat. Other giants are belted to the sawmill to turn huge logs into dimensional lumber. In the corn field, Threshers cut bundles with a binder while others shred last year's

Square dancing by the Richfield Squares in the outdoor picnic shelter begins at lla.m. Saturday, followed by the daily parade at 1p.m., then a country-western dance demonstration from 2 to 4, and then the tenth annual fiddling contest at 4p.m. Competing for cash and prizes are children as young as 8 and old-timers in their eighties, each playing a fast tune and a

Saturday evening concludes with a pig roast at 6p.m. and a dance with Sammy's Concertina Band from Chaska. Sunday morning begins at 7:30 with a nondemonination church service in the picnic shelter followed at 10:30 with more square dancing by the Richfield Squares. That afternoon Danny Robinson's "Thunder Road Band" from Mankato entertains. Sunday, 4p.m., is the drawing for the 1948 "B" John Deere tractor.

Ladies from the area will demonstrate the art of quilting in the reconstructed log cabin that was originally built in 1850. "The Lace Lady" from Sleepy Eye will demonstrate the art of making Bohemian lace Saturday and Sunday.

For those seeking the unusual, craft and flea market dealers sell crafts, antiques tools, and collectibles. For those wishing to learn how to restore equipment or how to so a particular craft or how to fix a particular food, the Threshers' bookstore sells "how-to" books of all kinds. Additional attractions include a shingle mill, a lath mill, a drag saw, a corn shredder, and a straw baler. In the blacksmith shop, smithies pound out horseshoes. In the huge machinery shed that houses many pieces of antique farm equipment and tools, the broom makers from Redwood Falls construct brooms from the broomcorn they grew last year.

Mingling their aromas with the steam and smoke are the Threshers' food stand, pop and popcorn stand, and ice-cream stand. Serving of the thresherman's breakfast begins each morning at 7:30.

Admission is the purchase of a souvenior button for \$4; children under 12 are free. The button entitles one to free admission all three days. Signs on U.S. Highway 169 direct traffic to the grounds. Anyone who exhibits equipment receives free admission. Parking is free.

The Scott-Carver Threshers is a non-profit organization, and the volunteers are not paid for their services. Anyone wishing to help work on the grounds or the equipment is welcome to become a member. All proceeds go to the expense of the festival, new buildings and equipments, and new attractions. These volunteers are working to preserve our agricultural and industrial past for the present and future generations.

Scott-Carver Threshers is a non-profit organization. Neither owners nor operators are paid for their services. 8s go into new buildings, equipment and stractions for the betterment of the club and the viewing pleasure of the public. sectator. 


