Eagle Ridge Addition

On June 29th the council was requested to approve the final plat of twenty one lots of the proposed eighty units for Eagle Ridge Addition. Administrator explained changes concerning letter of credit. The Subdivision Ordinances requires 125 % of the cost of the project. Also explanation wasgiven regarding a small section of Outlot to be used for tot-lot park dedication and amount owed by developer for parks for the first plat approval. Motion was made adopting Resolution approving the first plat of Eagle Ridge Addition for 21 lots.

At the July 5th meeting Administrator stated that Developer's Agreement is in need of refining and approval should be contingent upon engineer's and attorney's approval. Motion was made and carried approving Phase I of Eagle Ridge Addition contingent upon attorney and engineer review/approval.

Municipal Utilities

Council was informed that Municipal Utilities Operator requested forming a committee to research the water meters/billing system to recommend a system which would be right for the city. A committee was formed.

Carver County Shcriff's Department

Carver County Deputy was present at the July 5th meeting to report on the request of additional patrolling. Citations have been issued and traffic monitored. There has not been any additional information regarding the damage at RiverSide Park. Council member requested additional 'STOP' sign at Fourth and Jorgenson Streets. Another council member reported receiving complaints of speeding and passing on double yellow lines on County Road # 40.

Another complaint was received regarding ATV's and dogs in SunnySide Addition. Deputy checked on the situation.

Carver Bluffs

Engineer and Architect representing Carver Bluffs Addition were present to discuss Phase I for final approval with some minor changes.

Council was told that land for two ball fields would be available in the park area. Council member inquired about maintenance of retention ponds. Maintenance would be covered as part of the storm drainage system. Motion was made and carried by roll call vote adopting resolution approving final of Phase I.

Miscellaneous

Motion was made and carried by resolution transferring general funds to capital funds.

Frey informed the council that municipal water has been installed at RiverSide Park.

Frey also reported that black dirt has been hauled onto the dike and has been seeded. The ditch at Ash and Main needs to be dug out due to fill up of silt. Also changes are necessary at Third Street drainage system where pump sits.

NSP has voiced complaint about inability to get trucks beneath the rail road trestle since the construction of the dike. Therefore, it may be necessary to cut down the dike some.

Erosion problem at Spring Creek and Fifth Street was discussed.

Inquiry was made regarding the historic bridge at Sixth Street.

Proposals was made that the maintenance garage could be constructed near the park in Dahlgren Township where Town Line Road is proposed to be.

Frey reported that R \hat{s} W will clean up the compost site area. Future composting will have to be at the Chaska site.

1994

Improvements

The Public Hearing was held on June 29th for 1994 Improvements. Engineer summarized the events of the project. Bids have been taken for the Sixth Street Project. Citizen questioned being assessed again. Explanation was given that streets were replaced during municipal utilities project and assessments were for utilities not street improvements at that point. Front foot charge was discussed, as well as grant funds.

Citizen inquired about the erosion control measures already done. It was the citizen's opinion that it had been done wrong twice and he didn't feel that they should pay again.

Another citizen inquired about unbuild-able lots. These lots were not going to be assessed the unit charge, payment would be made for the unit charge, but where applicable a front foot charge will be assessed. Question was also asked about truck use on Sixth Street. Upon construction of Town Line Road the use of Sixth Street should be eliminated.

Another citizen objected to unimproved Agriculture land being assessed. There are no plans for development. Citizen argued that homes in Lenzen Addition are assessed for only trunk line and not lateral should apply to citizen, as well. Clarification was made that Lenzen Addition fronting Fourth Street will be assessed for both lateral and trunk.

Part of the project would be paid for by Tax Increment Financing funds. The street will have curb and gutter to help control water runoff. Citizen voiced that the last time work was done, it caused disturbance to natural water ways and caused water problems in homes. Discussion was held on water levels, road elevation, bike trail, assessments and who benefits from this project. Council also discussed procedure for deferring assessments on Agricultural land.

Council discussed the term the assessments would run and decision was made based on twenty years previous assessments. Interest rate at $7\frac{1}{2}\%$. Motion was made and carried accepting resolution adopting the assessment roll as amended.

At the July 5th meeting, administrator explained why bids should be awarded at this time rather than waiting. Motion was made and carried to award the bid for the Sixth Street Improvements to Northdale Construction.

Motion was made and carried authorizing staff to work with Ehlers & Associates to solicit proposals for the sale of General Obligation Improvement Bonds to finance the Sixth Street Improvements.

Comprehensive Plan

Council discussed draft Comprehensive Plan. Work is to be continued. Work on Phase II has been quoted and is not to exceed \$ 12000

Heritage Preservation Commission opposed the Upland Commercial Center. Suggestion was submitted that current business district be expanded by rezoning. It was also discussed forming Chamber of Commerce.

The Park and Recreation Board Department drew up additional trails with already proposed trails on present plans.

Motion was made and carried approving continuation of work on the Comprehensive Plan not to exceed \$ 9,000.

Scott-Carver Thresher's Show

Old fashioned country fun for the entire family happens Friday, Saturday and Sunday (August 5th, 6th & 7th) When the Scott-Carver Threshers steam, chug and plow through their 31st Steam and Gas Engine Festival near Jordan. Gates open daily at 8:00 AM and close at sundown.

Highlighting this year's festival is the Minnesota State Horse Plowing Contest featuring draft horses competing for top places. Every day includes the 1:00 PM parade of gigantic steam engines, antique cars, trucks and tractors and antique farm equipment and construction equipment.

Other festival highlights include grain threshing, horseshoe competition, a country-western dancing demonstration, a fiddling contest, square dancing, the Thunder Road Band, quilting, Sammy's Concertina Band, a craft market, a flea market, plus the massive Vilter stationary steam engine with the 18' flywheel from the demolished Armour meatpacking plant.

Friday features the Jolly Woodchopper entertaining in the picnic shelter before and after the 1 PM parade. The horse plowing contest begins Saturday morning at 11 AM with the walkingplow contestants. Sulky-plow competition begins at 2:15 PM. Sunday brings out the 2-bottom plowing at 11 AM and the 3-bottom plowing at 2:15PM.

Burning wood and water to build steam pressure, the massive steam engines are belted daily to the grain separators to thresh stacks of wheat. Other giants are belted to the sawmill to turn huge logs into dimensional lumber.

Square dancing by the Richfield Squares in the outdoor picnic shelter begins at 11:00 AM, Saturday, followed by the daily parade at 1:00 PM, then a countrywestern dance demonstration from two to four, and then the twelfth annual fiddling contest at 4:00 PM. Competing for cash prizes are children as young as eight and old timers in their eighties, each playing a fast tune and a waltz.

Saturday evening concludes with a roast beef dinner at 6:00 PM and a dance with Sammy's Concertina Band from Chaska. Sunday morning begins at eight with gospel singers entertaining in the breakfast shelter followed at ten with more square dancing by the Richfield Squares. That afternoon the "Thunder Road Band' from Mankato entertains.

Ladies from the Chaska area will demonstrate the art of quilting in the reconstructed log cabin that was originally built in 1850.

The Scott-Carver Threshers is a nonprofit organization, and the volunteers are not paid for their services. Anyone wishing to help work on the grounds or the equipment is welcome to become a member. All proceeds go to the expense of the festival, new buildings and equipment, and new attractions. These volunteers are working to preserve our agricultural and industrial past for the present and future generations.
