

River View Estates Proposal

The Planning Commission reviewed actions taken by the council at the October council meeting regarding changes in the ordinances pertaining to proposed development on Elm Street. City staff had been directed to review what changes would have to be made in the City Code and Ordinances in order to make it comparable to approve for River View Estates without granting a lot of variances. Attorney had commented that this would be the easier route to pursue. These changes would have to involve the DNR and the community. DNR Ordinances cannot be violated. The Planning Commission could submit recommendations regarding changes in the Bluff Protection Ordinance.

The Planning Commission members' voiced dissatisfaction that their recommendations were disregarded by council regarding the decisions made for River View Estates development. The members' opinion was that the community should be educated on the bluff line and that their recommendations had been ignored. Explanation was offered that the council does make changes per the Planning Commission's recommendations. Further explanation was given that a lot of time has been spent enforcing the Bluff Ordinance in the past. When variances were granted special circumstances warranted those decisions.

The Planning Commission discussed educating the public regarding bluff lines. It was the commission's opinion that they were not heard on their recommendations submitted regarding this development. Administrator pointed out that the council and commission have worked very hard enforcing the Bluff Ordinance.

The River View Estates developer requested to be heard prior to scheduled agenda time allotment at the November meeting. The developer was of the impression that there had been some confusion regarding the issues involved with his development. There were heated discussions regarding the variance requests and bluff ordinance specifications. A council member voiced a motion accepting approval of proposal for River View Estates with conditions that both bluff homes have controlled gutters, construction of retaining wall as presented; assurance from plumber that pump and pipes provide adequate service for additional homes; and that the developer pay a portion of upgrades not to exceed \$1000. Debate

ensued regarding homes in the city limits, which did not meet bluff ordinance; the necessity of the attorney being present prior to approval and question arose whether or not variances were included in this motion. One council member stated that everyone should be treated equally and offered to chauffeur the council to point out homes built on bluffs. Motion presented was carried with three ayes and two nays.

The administrator requested clarity of motion presented whether or not variances were inclusive. Two council members voiced that the variances were included. Advise was given to get the attorney's input on this issue. These variances would affect new development in the future. Administrator encouraged the council not to approve the proposed subdivision too hastily. A question was asked about the need to approve at this meeting. Presentation received had been a preliminary plat asking if the motion by-passed to a final plat. Planning Commission Chairman asked why the council had chosen to by-pass the Planning Commission's decision. Response was given that setback in different areas is less than thirty feet.

The engineer explained some of the history of the bluff ordinance. There were man made slopes constructed giving the illusion of some homes appearing closer to the bluff. There were not any homes built less than the set back requirement in the last six years. Homes built closer to the bluff were constructed prior to the approval of the present ordinance.

The council continued discussion regarding approval of preliminary or final plat for proposed subdivision. City Planner was of the opinion that a preliminary plat presented had been approved. A final plat would have to be reviewed by the Planning Commission. Attorney inquired drafting resolution adopting preliminary plat in traditional format. Council consensus was to draft resolution. Attorney directed council for a need to find fact for the variances. A representative should be chosen to discuss finding of fact with the attorney. Council member requested that the engineer ensure correct retaining wall for the subdivision. Notation was made that the developer needs to prepare a final plat for the subdivision. A council member voiced his opinion that a massive error had been made in the approval of this subdivision.

Andrade Corporation

An Andrade Corporation representative was present at the Planning Commission meeting to discuss preliminary proposal for proposed plans for subdivision west of the city. One issue for the preliminary plat was the bluff line. A map was presented for the commissions' review. The plat is for single family development. Mr Hagen, Carver Bluffs developer has agreed to construct a sidewalk to connect potential future development of the Andrade property to the north. Lot sizes and cul-de-sacs were discussed. The Rishavy property had not been included on the development Streets, bluff lines, setbacks were all discussed. The issue of decks were talked about. Park area and sidewalks were briefly touched on.


Proceeding with the plans for this development were to be postponed temporarily depending on the bluff line issue. Their goal was tentatively spring. Preliminary plat approval requires a ten day publication notice and a Public Hearing.

The proposal from the developer from the Andrade Corporation has been postponed until the bluff ordinance issue is resolved.

Municipal Utilities

Utilities superintendent spoke to the council regarding the purchase of equipment to aid in problem manholes. This equipment would remove items in the lines. The council approved purchase of the equipment called a 'jetter' to correct problems in the manholes.

Motion was made and carried approving the plans and specifications for Well #2 authorizing the publication of an advertisement for bids.



Fourth Street Improvement Project

The council held Public Hearing on the proposed assessment for the Fourth Street Improvement Project. The engineer gave background information on the project to residents present. Residents had been notified regarding connections to the municipal utilities system who had not been included on the May 2002 project list. Connections would be required by August of 2002. The connection fee could be added to the assessment, but was not necessary. There was also the possibility that fees would increase in the following year.

One resident expressed doubts that the property value would increase with improvements of the project or be comparable to the assessment being made. The council was also reminded of the Sixth Street assessment. Administrator pointed out that contesting the assessment steps was outlined in their legal notices. Another resident expressed concern regarding speeding since the improvements. Resident also inquired about sanitary sewer, manhole replacement and removal of septic tanks with the project. This work should be considered maintenance. Engineer explained connection charges and how these funds would be used. There was also concern expressed regarding municipal utilities stub installations for future expansion. The depth of the sewer line was also discussed. A citizen asked why homeowners are being assessed for maintenance items. The manhole costs and connection funds were discussed. Suggestion was submitted to delay vote until actual costs were determined. One citizen was of the impression that his assessment was more than his neighbor's. Then there was discussion of a collector street being of citywide benefit, however of the opinion that the abutting residents are paying more than their share. Possibly the city should pay more of the cost. Interest rates, issue of manhole and percentage of street improvement to be assessed to property owners should all be discussed further. Interest rate of 6% was considered to be reasonable. The Administrator commented that everyone within the city benefits from better streets to drive on.

Adult Business Ordinance

The city discussed the need for an ordinance regarding Adult Businesses in the community. The attorney and administrator discussed the drafting of an ordinance pertaining to "adult entertainment" business within the city. The attorney recommended adopting an interim ordinance enacting a moratorium on adult businesses until a permanent ordinance is drafted and approved. Motion was made and carried directing the attorney to prepare proposed temporary interim ordinance for the Planning Commission's reviewal enacting a moratorium on adult entertainment businesses.



Accessory Buildings

A resident requested permission to erect a temporary storage shelter. One other temporary structure exists. Motion was made and carried directing staff to draft an ordinance prohibiting some types of temporary storage structures.

Speeding

The council discussed speeding on County Road #40 west of the city. Change in speed zones and signs was discussed by the council. This matter would have to be discussed with the county. Motion was made proposing to remove 50 MPH sign, erecting 40 MPH speed sign west of the apartment building at city limits and moving the 30 MPH out further west from present site.

Dear Editor:

After viewing the November 5th council meeting on cable TV, as residents of Carver for more years than as old as you are, Bob Jordan. 


