





# United States Midterm Elections, 2018

2018 elections in the United States will be held on Tuesday, November 6, 2018, except for certain <u>special elections</u>. All these races, regardless if it is for a federal, state, or local office, are being administered by the individual state and local governments instead of at the national or federal level. These <u>midterm elections</u> will take place in the middle of <u>Republican</u> President <u>Donald Trump</u>'s first term. All 435 seats in the <u>United States House of Representatives</u> and 35 of the 100 seats in the <u>United States Senate</u> will be contested. In addition, 39 state and territorial <u>governorships</u> as well as numerous other state and local elections will also be contested.

#### What about ballot initiatives?

There are no statewide ballot questions this year, but the back of your ballot could include a number of local ballot questions, including local school levies, city charter amendments and more.

#### How do elections work?

Have you ever really wondered how the election process really works? Or how someone got onto the ballot in the first place? Or how political parties decide who will represent their party?

An individual is required to be nominated first of all. On the state level in MN there are two major political parties and five minor. The major parties are the Republican (GOP – Grand Old Party) and Democratic-Farmer-Labor Party. The minor parties are Grassroots-legalize Cannabis Party, Green Party of MN, Independence Party of MN, Legal Marijuana Now Party and Libertarian Party of MN. There is a form for a group to request by petition for major political party.

Then the next step in the process is the precinct caucuses. This is to support the preferred candidates by participating in the candidate endorsement process leading up to the state party conventions. Basically, precinct caucuses are series of meetings held by political parties to endorse candidates, select delegates and set goals and values (platforms). To participate in caucuses, one must be eligible to vote and live in the precinct, as well as agree with party values. The primary election determines which candidates will be on the ballot in the November general election.

The next step would be to file for office. "Candidates are placed on a ballot in Minnesota after they file for office. The most common way to file for office is to complete an affidavit of candidacy and pay a filing fee to the appropriate filing officer during the two-week filing period."

There is so much more to the process, reminder, this is only a mere summarization with generalities. There are rules, there are sources to find the entire process and all of the information at the state's website. (<u>www.sos.state.mn.us</u>) Information can be found under elections.

Election results can be found either at the state website or county website, and, of course, major newspapers and televised news.

### Register to Vote

Obviously, a person is required to register to vote before you can actually vote. You may ask, who can vote in MN? One is required to be a US citizen, 18 years old on the day of election, a resident of the State of MN for twenty days, completed all parts of any felony sentence. You cannot vote if a judge revoked your right or it has been ruled that you are legally incompetent. How to register? You can register online. You will need your MN Driver's License or MN identification card number or the last four digits of your Social Security number. Register on paper with application. Or you can register on election day. You will need proof of residence to register. If you have questions or need any assistance, contact your county election office.

#### Other Ways to Vote

You can also vote in other ways than on the day of elections. There is voting early with an absentee ballot starting forty-six days prior to Election Day. You can vote early by mail with an absentee ballot. Be sure to check the state's election page on their website and read all the rules.

You can "have an agent pick up your ballot (agent delivery).

In special situations, you may ask an agent to pick up and return an absentee ballot for you. This is called 'agent delivery.' Read more about agent delivery

To qualify for agent delivery, you must live in a:

nursing home

assisted living facility

residential treatment center

group home

battered women's shelter

or, be hospitalized or unable to go to the polling place due to incapacitating health reasons or a disability.

Your agent must be at least 18 years old, have a pre-existing relationship with you and cannot be a candidate. An individual cannot be an agent of more than three voters in an election.

Give your agent a completed <u>absentee ballot application</u> and a <u>request for agent delivery of absentee ballot</u> form. Have your agent take both forms to the local election office to receive your ballot.

Your agent can pick up your ballot starting seven days before the election until 2 p.m. on Election Day. Your agent or someone else you designate must return your ballot by 3 p.m. on Election Day. You can also return your ballot by mail. Election officials must receive your ballot on or before Election Day."

# Length of terms of state senators

The length of terms in state senates in the 50 American state senates is either two years or four years.

Senators in 31 states have a four-year term. Senators in 12 states have a two-year term. Senators in seven states (Arkansas, Delaware, Florida, Illinois, Minnesota, New Jersey and Texas) have terms that are sometimes two years and sometimes four years, depending on the proximity of the election to the <u>legislative re-apportionments</u> that occur every 10 years after a federal census. A system with senators who serve one two-year term and two four-year terms every ten years is considered a 2-4-4 term system. In the 12 states where the length of the term is two years, all state senate seats are up for re-election every two years.

Arizona, Connecticut, Georgia, Idaho, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New York, North Carolina, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Vermont

In the 38 states with either a four-year term or a 2-4-4 term, 27 states have staggered elections so that approximately half of state senate seats are up for re-election during the state's general elections that take place every two years.

Alaska, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Delaware, Florida, Hawaii, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Washington, West Virginia, Wisconsin, Wyoming

In the 11 other states where the term is either four years or a 2-4-4, all seats come up for re-election during the same year. In those states, there are general election years where no state senate seats are at stake.

Alabama, Kansas, Louisiana, Maryland, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, New Jersey, New Mexico, South Carolina, Virginia
