

Bluff & Ravine Overlay District Ordinance

The city council held a special work session to discuss the issues of the Bluff and Ravine Overlay District Ordinance that the Planning Commission members have been working on. The city planner explained that the ordinance changes made thus far involve set back changes from the bluff and has an overlay showing the land contours. The council and the audience discussed the proposed bluff and ravine overlay district and how some properties within the existing core city could be affected by the language changes in the proposed ordinance. The Carver County study had been used as a guideline while working on this ordinance. The term "steep slope" definition was questioned. Major concerns regarding the ordinance were expressed at this special work session. Reasoning for amendments to the ordinance was explained.

At the regular council meeting the issue was discussed further. Initial request involved adopting the Ordinance amending code relating to bluffs, ravines, natural resources and steep slopes. Representatives from Centex Homes requested refined criteria to some lots proposed for development on developing property. Development under the unrevised version of the ordinance meant some sections of the property were buildable and would not be so if the new version were adopted. It was the opinion that some of these areas should be grandfathered in that are affected by these amendments. Question was asked what exactly the attempts were to preserve since natural habitat no longer exists in most of the areas and erosion control could be achieved differently.

One council member stated that it was his/her opinion that the council was not ready to adopt the proposed ordinance even though much of the document was useful and good. It was the opinion of another council member that some areas need to be grandfathered in. Motion was nade and carried to return the proposed ordinance for further work to the Planning Commission. Areas requested to be highlighted were the County Road #40 area and define 'steep slope' more clearly.

Did You Know...

...that on November 5th, 1874 Carver Founder Axel Jorgenson put a notice in the *Weekly Valley Herald* newspaper that read, "Notice is hearby given that my wife Ellen M Jorgenson has left my bed and board without cause or provocation and that I will pay no debts of her contracting after this date. Dated August 26, 2874, Axel Jorgenson."

Municipal Utilities

The Public Utilities Supervisor reported to the council that septic tanks had been pumped as required. The city was also told that hydrants had been flushed. The supervisor was unclear as to why one area of the water supply was not consistently of as high-quality as other parts of the city. He told the council that the water treatment plant has made a big difference in the water quality throughout the city. Information has been compiled on the city's website for public review on the municipal utilities systems.

The council discussed and reviewed the issue of the booster station and water tower site locations. The engineer reviewed the issue and presented a summary of the upcoming development along portions of the county road defined as #147 further explaining that these areas cannot be served by the current city water system. The council was told that a booster station and a water tower are necessary and a report was given to the council outlining the costs and possible locations for the booster station.

The council was asked if there was a preference among the five proposed sites for a future water tower. Question was asked how these sites relate to the proposed development. One site preferred related to the proposed industrial construction requiring higher fire flow. This site would be in the middle of a proposed parking lot versus intruding in a residential area.

The council reviewed the proposed booster station that would pump water from the existing system to the new tower. There was further discussion regarding the necessity for both a booster station and water tower, as well as more wells. The council needed to be aware of the necessity of these impending improvements. The capacity of the existing three wells was relayed to the council. Motion failed directing the engineering firm to concentrate on two sites. The firm was directed to return to the council with more information on all five proposed sites and further discussions were held regarding the booster station for Lylewood Glen. The placement of this booster station was continued at great length.

A representative from the Spring Creek Development was present at the meeting and stated that one of the proposed sites by the water treatment plant would be the best site for the booster station because the developpers building in that area could possibly share in costs of the project.

The council discussed expansion, cost effectiveness and efficiency. The utilities supervisor commented that either site would be sufficient. It was the mayor's opinion that if Site D was used then another booster station would be required to be built in five years at the site of the Community Park. The council member commented that their concern was the delay of a parking lot at the park if the booster station would have to be completed first. The engineer recommended the park area. The council instructed the engineering firm to put together cost estimates on the different types of booster stations at different locations. The council discussed bids received for test wells for water supply wells. These test wells would provide information to the city on future water supply sources in the Comprehensive Plan area west of County Road #147. Recommendation was submitted by the engineer to accept the low bid from Traut Wells. Motion was made and carried with all ayes awarding the project to Traut Wells, but if the fourth well was not necessary, the cost would be lowered and if the well were necessary, the issue would be brought back before the council. The mayor reminded that these wells were being dug to provide information, not to provide water. Preference was that all four wells were dug. The council debated the is-sue of digging three or four wells.

The Park and Recreation Board discussed the Booster Station locations. The designer of the water towers and wells for cities was also at the meeting to help clarify the need for a Booster Station and the different options for the location of the station. The station was necessary even with a new water tower located at a higher lever in order to achieve the pressure necessary for the city. There were five sites and one site was on the other side of Highway #212 between County Road #147 and #43. Some of Dahlgren Township is included in the new Comprehensive Plan where there will be a need for utility services in these areas, which are currently being studied. Presently there is a need for a water tower at the intersection of Highway #212 and County Road #147 and there needs to be a way to boost the water up to the tower The booster station would become obsolete in approximately ten years however, the use is projected until 2020 or longer dependent upon the location of the wells. The Park and Recreation Board held a lengthy discussion on this issue submitting their recommendation to the council for the location of the Booster Station

Improvements

The council was presented with a petition requesting city improvements on Elm Drive. The engineering firm had been authorized to proceed with the Feasibility Study report contingent on the financial agreements from the developer. Agreements have been received and schedule of the feasibility report meant scheduling a Public Hearing.

Spring Creek Residential Development

The Spring Creek Residential Development representatives were at the Planning Commission meeting to review the preliminary developmental planning. One comment submitted pertained to concern along County Road #147 and the need for a landscape plan to make the lots more desirable for property owners. It was one individual's opinion that a berm was necessary to buffer the homes on that county road. Trees, landscaping and safety were all issues with this county road. One representative explained that this development was unusual. It was their intent to provide landscaping plans. Additionally, proposal was submitted to clean up the ravine area, a trail system throughout the development and landscaping at the entry points. Tentatively it was scheduled for the purposes of a better visual enhancement the proposed plan would be presented with PowerPoint.

The issue of the ravine was discussed in more detail. Who asked these developers to pursue clean up of the ravine area was questioned. Proposal slated was to restore the ravine to its natural state, in addition to placement of park benches for the residents benefit and to beautify the area. Presently there is a lot of erosion and foreign items littering the ravine. Intent was to restore the ravine with natural vegetation and add visual effects to contribute to erosion control bringing the area back to its natural state.

The Planning Commission members asked about the southern portion of the development visual aspects. How would this development merge with the Heritage Development? Matching the two development is the present plan. Zoning requirements were discussed. This development is not proposing medium density as zoning requires. The City Planner pointed out that the property to the east is commercial, therefore the proposal meets density requirements. It was one member's opinion that this development would benefit the community with the new road interchange. Another member commented on the idea of connecting the development to the downtown area with the trail system and this development was better than a commercial site.

Market Study/Concept Plans

The Planning Commission reviewed details regarding the Concept Plan for commercial/retail along with the benefits of the site located at the interchange of County Road #147 and Highway #212. Question was asked about the feasibility of anything being built with in the next five years. Also questioned was if the north side of Highway #212 would be within the city limits of Carver. Question was also asked if there were any additional sites proposed for commercial or industry.

The city planner stated that presently the city is in the process of reorganizing the Comprehensive Plan and that development in the area being discussed should be started by the time that the Highway #212 proposal is completed and open. The city planner stated further that the north side of Highway #212 should be within the city limits but presently she is still working on these details with the Metropolitan Council. The Planning Commission was also informed that another proposed site for commercial and industry could be the area of County Road #43 and Highway #212. The commissioners talked about the proposed commercial/retail Concept Plan, along with some of the existing and immediate needs of the community that would benefit or be affected by the proposed Concept Plan and Market Study.

The theme proposed for the Concept Plan and Market study was to utilize the river bluff and historic area, along with incorporating colors of nature, use of the prairie concept in the open space and add small touches to blend the area reflecting the aura of the community. Commission was asked for their input on the theme. The two historical homes were brought up. The cost to move of the houses was unfeasible, however use of the bricks could be instituted into some aspect. Commissioner stated the necessity to retain the small community atmosphere with its own identity and utilizing the use of the prairie along with the natural historical theme. The historical theme personified a comfortable feeling and gave a sense of the community. Utilizing the caboose and railroad were suggested to be incorporated into the historical theme. One of the development representatives stated that the work will continue to progress and they would elaborate on the theme with the development.

Comprehensive Plan

The Planning Commission members were updated that the committee has made progress with the annexation issue as far as updating the Comprehensive Plan. The committee is waiting for additional concepts for zoning. The commission was told that there were a lot of developers who wanted their preliminary / concept plans included in the Comprehensive Plan. The city planner stated that there are a lot of studies being conducted behind the scenes. This information from the engineer and the metropolitan council should be available soon. The need to review affordable housing issues was also brought up.


SteamBoat Days

...that in 1878 the eleven year old son of Jonas Anderson of Carver fell into a 126 foot deep well and suffered only a fractured thigh.


