

Contracting Services

The council discussed policing contracting services for the City of Carver with the sheriff at a work session. Criticism had been heard from the community concerning the visibility or lack of thereof of an officer during evening hours. The program is new and everyone is learning and adjusting to valid concerns. The city needs to identify their needs and the sheriff was of the opinion that more officers were needed during the evening shifts. The council discussed probability of the township and the city sharing an officer. It was a council members opinion that the daytime service was not sufficient in achieving the goals necessary. There was some discussion on hiring an evening deputy on a part time basis. The council discussed budget costs concerning the issue of contracting for additional services in the evening hours. The consensus of the council was to not increase the budget but to reallocate funds.

The council discussed approving the resolution to contract police services. One council member disagreed with the agreement since it was their opinion that the service level had not changed. An evening officer being added was considered an increase in service level. The mayor stated that the system was not perfect but thought the city was moving in the right direction. Motion was made and carried with two ayes and one nay approving the resolution contracting for police services in 2006.

Carver Creek WaterShed District

The representative from the Carver Creek WaterShed District was unable to attend the council meeting to answer any questions. The council was told that the county scheduled a Public Hearing relating to proposed changes to the current Carver County Water Rules. These rules deal with the Carver Creek WaterShed area including future growth areas west of County Road #11. The areas discussed are included in the city's draft Storm Water Management Plan and the current county rules are also part of the plan. Motion was made and carried directing the city engineer to draft a letter to the county regarding the proposed water rule changes.

Did You Know...

...that like today, in 1894 the Carver Fire Department was volunteer. It then had a horse-drawn hook and ladder truck, 1000 feet of hose, a hose, a hose cart and one ten gallon Babcock extinguisher that had a hand powered engine capable of throwing two streams of water. Equipment was stored in a firehouse building on the south side of East Fourth Street between Broadway and Oak, with water provided by Carver and Spring Creeks, the Minnesota River, and five public cisterns that were always kept full.

Park & Recreation Board

Volunteers are needed to help organize the Boy's Baseball league for 2006. The Park and Recreation Board are requesting help. One of the jobs of the volunteer is to contact the athletic director inquiring about joining their league in neighboring towns. For additional information contact City Hall, Jane Thon or come to a Park and Recreation Board meeting.

Future Leader's Program and Training

Bob Roepke spoke with the council regarding his efforts of recruiting individual's for a future Leader's Program and Training being offered. This program is part of the Chamber with eight sessions over a nine month period. There is a cost with the program with the goal of building leadership in the communities. Ideally Mr Roepke is seeking to fill a class with fifteen individuals and a session to start the end of September.

County Road #11

The Planning Commission discussed the changing of the name of the county road and recommended to the council to approve the name of "Jonathan Carver Parkway" for County Road #11, south of Highway #212. Motion was made and carried with all ayes to adopt the resolution naming County Road #11 (formerly County Road #147) south of Highway #212 "Jonathan Carver Parkway".

Utility Improvements

The council discussed with the engineer the Mount Hope and SkyView Lane Street Utility Improvements issues. There were several incomplete issues requiring attention. The engineer addressed the topics of tree placement and the timing of the assessment hearing. He recommended scheduling the Assessment Hearing at the first October meeting. The council agreed by motion.

The engineer requested rescheduling the Public Hearing for the assessment of improvements in order to allow sufficient time to complete the proper paperwork and meet advertising requirements. Recommendation was submitted to hold the assessment hearing on November 7th. After further review it was determined that there was not enough time to complete the paperwork nor sufficient time to meet advertising requirements Motion was made and carried with all ayes rescheduling an assessment hearing for the Mount Hope Road/Lime Street and SkyView Lane project.

Water Tower

The council inquired about the completion of the Water Treatment Plant. There were issues requiring completion but they were getting done. There were no safety issues involving residents.

Mr Mark Wallis from Bonestroo discussed the Water Tower Preliminary Design Site Evaluation and Study with the council. The different aspects of the proposed sites was reflected upon, along with the receipt of the soil boring report. Four locations for the new water tower had been evaluated. Bonestroo representatives were recommending the selection of site "C1" since this site was the best location for proposed future growth of the city if the city were to grow north of Highway #212. If growth were not to occur north of Highway #212 then the recommended site was site "B". Both sites chosen were outside of the city limits requireing land acquisitions. The mayor questioned the reasoning for choosing "C1". Explanation was given that this site would give good service due to its location giving good fire flows and cut water main costs. The city planner pointed out that the location would give the city identity. The site was also designated for commercial use. Motion was made and carried with all ayes approving site 'C1" for the next water tower.

Booster Station

The engineer reported that the Booster Station at the Water Treatment Plan would provide the necessary pressure to growth areas in the northwest part of the city. Bids for this project had been tabulated. The council reviewed the bid results. The low bidder was Magney Construction. Motion was made and carried with all ayes to award the project to the low bidder constructing the booster station in the northwest area of the city.

Main Street Lift Station

It was the engineer's opinion that the city had not received any bids for the Main Street Lift Station and Utility Improvements Project because contactors are too busy. The project would have to be delayed until spring. Motion was made and carried with all ayes to rebid this project.

Did You Know...

...that on June 2nd 1925 Kristina Nelson and two tourists were killed in Carver's beautiful Victorian pavilion in RiverSide Park when a tornado dropped a large tree on the building. Kristina, sixty-eight years old, was a window of Carver Postmaster and druggist John S Nelson.

Test Wells

The city engineer updated the council on the test well drilling occurring for water supply. The original budget was discussed. Originally developed for three test wells with a fourth proposed dependent upon costs. The project was scheduled for four test wells in order to explore for the Jordan in the northwest, to explore for sand and gravel in the southwest and two FIG test wells to determine transmissivity in these two areas. The engineer recommended continuance of the original plans for the proposed testing of four wells.

Heritage Development

The Planning Commission held a Public Hearing for the purpose of approving or denying request for high-density residential development in LyleWood Glen Second Addition. The Planning Commission reviewed the Comprehensive Plan Amendment, Rezoning, Conditional Use Permit and Preliminary plat issues. The Heritage Development proposes to develop approximately forty plus acres on the east side of County Road #11 with townhomes and condominiums for residential units. The Planning Commission reviewed the site plan. The developer requested approval for the Comprehensive Plan Amendment from Commercial High Density Residential to High Density Residential, rezoning the property from agricultural, a Planned Residential District, Conditional Use Permit for townhomes and multi-family homes and the preliminary plat for a development consisting of single-family detached homes, right-of-way, conservation area and related improvements.

The City Planner reviewed the request concerning rezoning. The zoning district is compatible with the Comprehensive Plan guidance of high density residential. She further stated that the city may authorize changes from the strict requirements of the underlying zoning district after determining that the proposal is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan, the general purpose of the Zoning Ordinance and the project complies with the requirements. The developer has requested variances from the standard zoning requirements, which the Planning Commission reviewed. The developer has chosen to pursue bluff protection within the Planned Residential Districts' requirements option. The board was told that Outlot 'D' would require a Conservation Easement. The city planner explained that the requested dwellings were a conditional use would mean the city would address any adverse impact of the land use and determine additional requirements necessary to reduce these adverse effects.

The board listened to the city planner's explanation of Preliminary Plat, which provides a layout of lots and blocks for future sales and ownership of specific parcels. This plat approval gives the property rights by State law. This plan includes both public and private streets. Challenger Lane would be extended and shared with the Centex development to the north. Sidewalks were included, a trail along the county road with an additional trail connecting the county road to the property on the east side. The Park and Recreation Board recommended payment in lieu of land dedication was preferred for this particular development. There were additional items needing to be addressed, which included appropriate easements, ownership and maintenance of common areas and homeowner's association documents.

An overview of the proposal was presented to the Planning Commission. The development consists of approximately forty plus acres with ten acres of open space including wetlands. There were proposed to be two hundred twenty one condos and townhome units. Extra precautions were being taken to protect the woods and bluffs. A Homeowners Association was also proposed to be put into place for the development.

The Planning Commission discussed costs of these units and if these units were being built in other communities. The answer was no, however the design is now being proposed in other communities. Colors of the units, parking and landscaping were all reviewed by the Planning Commission. Removal of trees was discussed. The members preferred that no more trees be removed, but expressed the desire to see more screening by additional landscaping. One member inquired about the trails and the garden area in the center of the development. The trails within the development would all be private and maintained by the association, along with the proposed garden, which would also have an irrigation system. Parking and street widths were discussed. They reviewed and discussed the Conservation and Utility Easements.

Proposed Bus Garage

There was a discussion regarding the proposed bus garage that occurred at the school board meeting of District #112. It appears that there were a number of issues involving this proposal, which the school board was unaware of inclusive of the necessity of a municipal sewer system that in the township does not exist. There is no policing available in the township. This site is zoned agricultural, along with a resolution disallowing buildings without residences on the property. Land values differ in the township versus the city. The school board was also unaware that the proposed site is located on a gravel road. Water drainage would also have to be retained on site versus run-off. The issue was tabled at the school board meeting. Notification would be forwarded to interested individuals in attendance when the discussion would be pursued.

Council Vacancy

The city council is experiencing an unexpected vacancy due to employment relocation for one of its members. An appointment by the city council will occur until December 31st 2006. The term for the vacancy is to December 31st 2008. The State Law requires that if more than two years remain in the unexpired term, the city must hold a special lection to fill the vacancy at or before the next regular city election in November of 2006. The city accepted applications for this vacancy.

Their next meeting for 2006 events will be held in January.

Spring Creek

The council discussed the Spring Creek restoration proposal. The Planning Commission recommended approval of the final plat for the Spring Creek Addition, but the creek restoration project was an ongoing discussion. The city council needed to determine whether or not they would be interested in proceeding with the creek restoration and if so, how much funding the city would be willing to contribute. The engineer had met with the developer. Costs were reviewed and the amount coincided with the Park and Recreation Board's amounts approved. The developer would review proposed changes forwarding original bids to the engineeering firms office for review. If the city commits to the said amounts approved by the Park and Recreation Board then the developer discussed covering costs above that agreed amount. Motion was made and denied adopting the resolution approving the final plat for Spring Creek Addition. There was discussion regarding the booster station which without this the homes would not have water pressure. The engineer pointed out that no 'Certificates of Occupancy' should be issued before the booster station is complete as the pressure would be necessary for fire protection. Motion was made and carried adopting the resolution amending approval of the final plat for Spring Creek Addition with one item regarding landscaping to be reviewed again by the appropriate committees.

Mt Hope Cemetery

The city council discussed policies regarding artificial flower placement at the cemetery. The caretaker stated that these flowers place on the gravesites are left until the fourth of July at which time they are removed. After that length of time the caretaker maintains that the are disintergrating, weeds have grown up around the arrangement and grass mowing and trimming are done. The administrator was directed to check other cemetery policies. The present ordinance perhaps should include date restrictions, along with description of allowable receptacles or containers to hold the artificial arrangements.

School Board Elections

School Board elections are scheduled for November 8th 2005. There are six candidates who have set their sights on the seats for the school board and only four positions to be filled in the District #112 School District. The candidates are John Bell, Rod Franks and Sally Stuckey, all from Chanhassen, Craig Cook and Michele Helgen both from Chaska, and Diane Koban from Victoria. The Eastern Carver County League of Women Voters is planning on hosting a School Board Forum on Tuesday, October 25th at the Chaska High School. This forum starts at 7 PM.


