


Election Judges Needed

Interested in being an Election Judge at the August 10th Primary Election and the November 2nd General Election for the City of Carver? An application is available on the city's website: (www.cityofcarver.com). Judges responsibilities include greeting voters, ensuring voters are at the correct polling place, registering voters and completing other forms, distributing ballots and demonstrateing how to use the voting machines. Overall, the judges ensure that the voting process runs smoothly. There is a mandatory training session. Judges often work the entire day, but there are partial shifts available. Election judges must be a US citizen, eighteen years of age or older on election day and Carver County residents. Judges must also state their party preference, Democrat, Republican, Independent, Green or other.

State law permits individuals to be absent from work without penalty to serve as an election judge. The employer must be given at least twenty (20) days notice and can choose to reduce an individual's wages by the amount of compensation received from the city for being an election judge.

The American Cancer Society Relay For Life is a life-changing event that gives everyone in communities across the globe a chance to celebrate the lives of people who have battled cancer, remember loved ones lost, and fight back against the disease. At Relay, teams of people camp out at a local high school, park, or fairground and take turns walking or running around a track or path. Each team is asked to have a representative on the track at all times during the event. Because cancer never sleeps, Relays are overnight events up to 24 hours in length.

Although every Relay For Life is different, there are certain traditions at all Relays, no matter where they are held. These traditions help participants celebrate, remember, and fight back.

2009 Audit

The city auditor from Abdo, Eick and Meyers consulted with the council regarding the 2009 audit. The auditor suggested that the fund pertaining to the "Clean Up Day Fund" be put into the General Fund item and be budgeted. Comment also was made concerning the 2002 Improvement Bonds having an adequate balance for pay off. Motion was made and carried with all ayes accepting the 2009 Audit.

The council discussed the resolution authorizing Improvement Bond Funds for the Storm Water Fund., The council reviewed the fact that the 2004 Street and Storm Water Improvements were conducted on SkyView Lane and Mt Hope Road. The project had been financed through a General Obligation Bond. The principal and interest for the project were scheduled for payment with additional tax levy and special assessments. Reviewing the 2009 audit, discovery was made that the revenues for the project had not been appropriately distributed to the Storm Sewer Fund. Transfer was recommended to the Storm Water Fund. The transfer based on the principal and interest scheduled for the bond issue. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution authorizing transfer of general obligation improvement bond funds to the Storm Water Fund.

The administrator explained to the council the resolution being presented for consideration regarding the General Obligation Bonds issued by the city in November of 2002. The bonds were originally issued to finance improvements on Fourth Street. Sufficient funds are available for payment for the existing debt on the issue. By calling this a bond issue, the city will avoid having to make an annual principal and interest payment to service the debt. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution authorizing the call of the outstanding General Obligation Improvement Bonds, Series 2002.

Seal Coating


The council reviewed the 2010 Seal Coating and (road) Crack illing. There were budgeted monies for seal coating in 2010. Quotes had been received. These initial quotes were higher than unticipated. Motion was made and carried with all ayes awarding he seal coat project to the lowest quote.

Sammy's Hide Out

Sammy's Hide Out owner attended the council meeting to discuss noise concerns. The council was updated on the owner's plans to acquire a decibel meter monitoring the noise levels and they have constructed a bar on the deck to control the noise levels. Alternative ideas talked about were a cover over the deck but that would not work because then it becomes non-smoking. A sprinkler system required would be costly. The owner is of the opinion that noise is coming from other events and blame is being put on his establishment. An awning would be another alternative. The council was told that fundraisers are being held to offset upgrades required. A recorder along with the decibel unit was a possible solution. A plan is to be worked out.

The owner requested items for variances to conditions in a city's resolution. The mayor pointed out that the city could only support two of the items with support from neighboring units. The owner also requested tenting the deck for the SteamBoat Days event. One council member was of the opinion that it shouldn't be an issue with the agenda of events scheduled. The administrator commented and suggested drafting a resolution for approval by all parties involved.

Municipal Utilities

A request has been placed with the City of Carver to connect city wastewater to a parcel in Dahlgren Township. A septic system was being put at a home in the township. The City's wastewater system did run next to the property. The city planner stated that the city's policy was to not connect properties outside city limits to utilities. Typically properties were required to be annexed prior to obtaining city services. If properties were allowed to connect to city services then it would discourage future annexation requests. The city planner also commented that changes may be required to the Comprehensive Plan and the Sewer Plan. The decision made was to have the staff work with requestor and invite them to a future council meeting.

City Planner Report

The Administrator was asked to contact RiverBluff Estates regarding future project planning and the fees that are owed to the city. LyleWood Glen needs mowing and the Public Works personnel are working on that issue. Question was asked regarding the truck station and status of project. The city planner stated that it appears that MN/DOT will not be pursuing a connection to the municipal utilities.

Council Meetings

The council discussed a regular "special" meeting each month. Motion was made and carried with all ayes for scheduling a second meeting on the third Monday during the months of June, July and August as work sessions.

2011 General Fund Budget

The council was presented with a preliminary schedule for the 2011 General Fund Budget process for the council's review.

Union Pacific Abandonment

The council reviewed the issue of the Union Pacific Abandonment -Section 106 Review - Mitigation for Adverse Impact to Historic Resources. The council was asked to review the proposal from the Heritage Preservation Resources as a result of abandonment of the Chaska Industrial Line. The council was asked to provide guidance to staff and consultants as to what items are acceptable to the city for mitigation. Motion was made and carried with all ayes accepting mitigation items: 1) Minnesota River Bridge - concur that the bridge should be removed, 2) Main Street Bridge - agree to purchase the bridge for \$ 1 from the Union Pacific, 3) Acquisition of corridor - request a donation of the parcels within the City of Carver currently owned in fee title by Union Pacific to be donated to the city, 4) Depot Park track/Caboose - request that the Union Pacific leave the track in place adjacent to Depot Park, but leave it to the city's future discretion as to whether the caboose remains in its current location or is moved to this location and the staff should cooperate with the Union Pacific to recognize their options.

Metropolitan Council Environmental Services

Interceptor

The city engineer updated the council on the Metropolitan Council Environmental Services Interceptor – Segment A. The contractor has encountered deep pockets of saturated, soft silty solid during the installation

Of the gravity pipe below County Road #40. The depth and extent of the soft soils is greater than anticipated during the design. The council member inquired about soil samples having been taken prior to the beginning of the project.

The council was asked to approve or deny the pay request to SM Hentges for the Carver Interceptor, Segment A. Motion was made and carried with all ayes approving payment for request for the Carver interceptor Segment A. The pay requests information was valuable.

Softball Field - Community Park

The council held an information discussion regarding a Softball Field at the Community Park. The Parks and Recreation Supervisor related that the staff and the park board had created plans for a new softball field in the "green field" area at the Community Park. An increase in field usage was noted and the need for additional playing area for the regular season games, practices and tournaments was necessary. There are many games being played in the "green field" consisting of bases anchored in the grass and moveable backstop. This improvement has been included in the amendment to the 2002 Park Dedication Study. The project costs were to be paid with the Park Dedication Fund currently holding adequate balance. This field would be utilized by kids and adults. Parking was asked about. There is additional parking being planned for in the future, but at the present time the parking lot is adequate. There was no opposition to the proposed improvement.

Fourth Street Bridge

The city engineer introduced their bridge specialist to discuss the city's bridges with the council. The two gentlemen presented background on work on the 4th Street Bridge and possible funding options. The projected project cost was discussed. The bridge is considered structurally deficient and has a sufficiency rating making it eligible for state funding. If state funds are used for the project, and since the bridge is a historic bridge, then a review of the project is required by the State Historic Preservation Office. The preliminary feedback indicated that the State Historic Preservation Commission concerning removal and replacement of the bridge. The bonding bill cycle for bridges is next scheduled for 2012. Suggestion was submitted that the administrator schedule a meeting with the State Historic Preservation Office to discuss the city bridges. Suggestion was also made that special legislation might be option.

City Hall

The administrator drafted a chart displaying information and decision history collection concerning the proposed city hall. The purpose was to initiate discussion to specify goals and objectives to assist the staff in creating a work plan for this project. The Community Development Agency will not be scheduling ground breaking for their new facilities until approximately 2012. The administrator requested direction from the council on their ideas for the next step. One council member was of the opinion that the topic should remain on the back burner at this time. The mayor's opinion was to continue to explore possibilities. Other opinions stated were agreeing that the council should get involved and waiting another year looking from a different perspective to include a combined City Hall and Public Works garage so that a new fire station would not be required. Public meeting and forums was suggested. Residents should be more involved.

The Committee is excited to announce that the Saturday Night Headliner will be none other than the "Johnny Holm Band"! Can you believe it? In down town Carver? What a bonus! Want to be part of the planning, come to the meetings. The meetings are held the second Wednesday of each month at the Village Hall and meetings begin at 6:30 PM. (July 14th) It is also a good way to meet other residents of the community, along with being part of planning the big city event!

Belle Plaine BBQ Days

The Belle Plaine Community and Chamber of Commerce invite eweryone to come and celebrate with them at their 52nd Annual BBQ Days Celebration on July 16, 17, and 18th! "It is one of the greatest town festivals in Minnesota. Our success is due to the incredible n number of volunteers.

Bar-B-Q Days started its celebration in 1959, where the Chamber voted to sponsor the celebration and gave it the name it still has to day. Since 1959, it is estimated that a total of over 270,000 pounds of roast beef has been prepared for the event. The first year, 800 pounds of beef was roasted and they had 50 pounds left over. Today, we prepare NO LESS than 7,000 pounds of beef; errough to make about 18,000 beef sandwiches. That's a lot of beef! The biggest change that Bar-B-Q Days encountered was the relocation of the event from downtown Belle Plaine to South Park. With this change, the number of people attending the event has irn creased over the years."
