

Charitable Gambling Ordinance

During the recodification process of the city codes for the city an issue arose regarding the Charitable Gambling regulations within the city. The existing code regulations regarding gambling envisions a local permit process and reporting. There is an existing comprehensive state regulatory scheme involving charitable gambling that must be complied with and the city staff questions necessity of the city's retaining regulations given the state regulatory scheme in place. The state had established the Gambling Control Board. In order to conduct charitable gambling a license is required from this board. A premises permit from the city would not be valid unless there was an adopted resolution in place. In the city code there are two separate reporting requirements. The council reviewed the analysis of maintaining local resolution. Maintenance and operation of the gambling permitting process requires an expenditure of effort of city staff which is not necessary because of the state regulation. Decisions of varying types will be necessary. Should existing ordinance remain in place? If the ordinance is to be modified, local expenditure requirement within trade area or makeup of organization conducting charitable gambling and/or reporting requirements. Does the city want to be involved in licenses/permits if the state deals with these issues with the realization that the state effectively requires local consent as a condition? The attorney commented that the city needs to decide what the code will cover in the future since the state already has regulatory requirements. The Carver Lions and the City Planner will discuss the issue and their position.

Metropolitan Council Meeting

An update on the Metropolitan Council meeting was requested. Comment was expressed regarding the importance of the attendance and involvement of the city's representative. The administrator and the city planner were in attendance. Report was summarized report. Concerns had been expressed regarding the methodology being utilized in the Metropolitan's Council's processes. Main concerns involved population forecasts. Updates will be given to the council. Mention was again expressed regarding the importance of attendance and involvement.

Preliminary Local Forecasts

These preliminary forecasts are revised by spring of 2014. The 2040 Preliminary Local Forecasts are works in progress. After discussing the forecasts with local governments, the Council (Metropolitan) reviews additional data, and revises the forecasts to reflect shared expectations of future growth and development. The forecasts should be reviewed and input returned.

The administrator updated the council on the Metropolitan Council Population Forecast. The staff has been collaborating with other cities and the county in the review of the forecasts. Public comments are requested. Once the Metropolitan council has reviewed all the input changes will be made. These forecasts will be used in the development of the regional plan. The city planner drafted a letter providing data supporting the City of Carver's projected population growth count for 2040. The county will also be coordinating data and preparing a combined document to be forwarded. Motion was made and carried with all ayes authorizing the drafted letter to be sent directly to the Metropolitan Council pertaining to the preliminary forecasts.

Long Range Financial Plan

The administrator presented background on the process resulting in the development of the long range planning model. Four components comprise the model to include capital planning, tax impact, revenue and expenditure and growth. This flexible financial planning tool will allow the city to establish priorities to better serve the needs of the city as it continues to grow. It will also allow the city to take a new approach in the long term allowing certain components within the model to be adjusted.

2014 Enterprise Fund Budgets

The administrator presented background on the 2014 budget process. Some new shared expenses within the Enterprise Fund involving the Public Utilities and the Public works. Upcoming in the process will be a work session, the Truth-in-Taxation Public Hearing, adoption of the 2014 budget and certification of the 2014 Tax Levy.

South West Metro Chamber of Commerce

The President of the SouthWest Metro Chamber of Commerce attended the council meeting to introduce herself. The city and the chamber are working together on opportunities to bring more awareness and promote downtown Carver. The administrator and the chamber president in an effort to coordinate communications with small businesses visited the Occasional Shops gathering contact information.

Fire Department

The Carver Fire Department extended "a thank you" to everyone involved at the Carver Fire Open House held recently. They reported that it was a fun night packed full of lots of things for everyone of all ages. Next year's Open House is scheduled for October 7th 2014.


The Officer Selection process is in the works. Watch for details or ask a fireman.

Housing Developments

The city planner updated the council on the housing developments. Highlighted details noted that the orderly annexation of the Finkel property was proceeding. Rezoning was necessary for portions of Christys Bluff and Copper Hills to be rezoned as Planned Residential Districts. Staff had recommended approval.

River Bluff Estates

The council was updated by the city planner regarding the Chestnut Group's request for an extension to file an application for the Final Plat for the River Bluff Estates. Motion was made and carried with four ayes and one naye adopting the resolution for amending and replacing the resolution approving a preliminary plat for the River Bluff Estates development.






2014 Patrol Coverage Direction was required on patrol coverage necessary for the 2014 year from the Carver County Sheriff's Office to be included in the 2014 budget. For several years the city has operated under a 'town cop' model, providing patrol coverage through specific times. Recently, the city had collaborated to provide additional coverage throughout the summer months. Some coverage had been eliminated as a result of government aid cuts.

The council had requested that a future law enforcement plan be created. The purpose for encouraging discussions of current and future patrolling needs and costs associated with providing these services. There has been a series of discussion regarding expanding patrol coverage. The evening patrol shift would conceptually be shared with the deputy spending patrol time on each shift proportionate to the amount of coverage paid for. The council reviewed the analysis and recommendations for coverage of the sheriff's office.

RiverSide Pavilion

The council discussed the review and analysis of the Riverside Pavilion project. Decision is required whether or not to include the historic Riverside Park Pavilion in the Park Dedication Study, maintain current plans for a park shelter at the park in the study or consider the concept of a community pavilion at an alternate location during the next review of the study. The council was petitioned at the beginning the year to consider rebuilding a historic pavilion a the Riverside Park location. Submittal was made that the pavilion be modeled after the original pavilion built in the 1890's while adhering to present day building and FEMA standards for flood plain construction. The Park board reviewed the proposal, created a subcommittee reviewing design, consultation, discussions, updated cost estimates and a SWOT (Strengths - Weaknesses - Opportunities - Threats) analysis.

The council reviewed and discussed the construction estimate provided. The estimate was based off of the original architectural drawings.

The Park Dedication study favored an undefined park shelter at a lesser cost than the request for a pavilion at a much higher cost. The Carver-On-The-Minnesota idea considered donations as a main option for funding a historic pavilion.

The Park Boards recommendation was that the concept was acceptable however the location and the costs were not and the location equals the significance of the project with the challenges making the project unfeasible. Certain challenges identified included the construction costs, floodplain standards, general operation and maintenance, as well as the costs associated with these and the threat of flooding.

Carver-on-the-Minnesota countered with their opinion. All interested parties expressed their desires for the best for its city. "All want the best for Carver, and know that the best way for downtown Carver to economically survive and thrive is by attracting downtown visitors and reconnecting Carver to the Minnesota River. This concept is nothing new; it was known by the town's early setters when they built their Riverside Park Pavilion in the 1890's to bring tourists to the park and to town. Heritage tourism is the fastest growing industry in America and brings back many dollars for every dollar invested."


Both groups pros and cons were reviewed by the council. The Carver-on-the-Minnesota petitioned the council to retain the Riverside Park Pavilion project and place it firmly on the city's short or long term goal plan list. "It's been forty-four years since a flood wall has separated Carver from the Minnesota River barred Carver from being the best it can be.'

City Council Compensation

Any changes in elected officials compensation per statutory requirements must be adopted prior to the election and take effect after election at the start of the new terms. As a result, any increase in an elected official's pay acted upon in 2013 will not be effective until January 1st 2015. Increases for any council members was previously decided in 2003.

Economic Development Committee

The administrator presented the overview of the goals and the work plan that the Economic Development Committee established. The plan included creating an economic development environment providing the best possible opportunity for private investment in the Freeway Commercial District, develop strategies encouraging housing development, at the same time preserving the city's ability to finance infrastructure necessary to accommodate growth and promote and develop projects and programs leading to investment and tourism in the downtown historic district.





Waste Water Treatment Plant

The council reviewed the decommissioning plant with some background information. The switch to the MCES WasteWater System occurred in September of 2012. The remaining step of the MCES Interceptor Project is the decommissioning of the waste water treatment plant. One of the first steps required is removing of the bio-solids.

It was the city's opinion that it was not in the best interest of the city to act as the MCES agent for specified work. The city would prefer that the decommissioning proceed with the city and MCES handle respective responsibilities independently. This involved the city's demolition of specified items, Motion was made and carried with all ayes approving the waste water treatment facility decommissioning with both entities handling respective responsebilities not exceeding specified amount.

2014 Fee Ordinance

Annually each fall the council reviews various fee charges established by the council and determined appropriate fee structures necessary for the upcoming year. An ordinance each December is adopted and takes effect in January following publication. This year some fees were reviewed for increases and/or changes.

Wetland Conservation Hot

The council reviewed the information regarding the wetland Conservation Act Action for Copper Hills 2nd Addition. Mattamny Homes proposes construction of Copper Hills 2nd Addition consisting of single family homes on agricultural land. Some of this property has an unavoidable impact to the Type 1 Wetland to accommodate an effective storm water management system on the site and/or facilitate the adequate separation between home basement elevations and normal water levels. The applicant proposes to meet with the Water Conservation Act replacement requirements through the purchase of additional acreage of wetland bank credits from an approved wetland bank. Agency representatives who review wetland issues collaborated on this application. The costs are the responsibility of the developer. The council reviewed the information and analysis given to the council and determination was made that the proposed wetland fill and replacement meet the requirements of the wetland act. Recommendation was submitted to permit approval of the application for the for the Copper Hills 2nd Addition.



Merry Christmas

Copper Hills 2nd Addition

The council reviewed the request from Mattamy Homes for Copper Hills 2nd Addition regarding rezoning, Planned Residential District, and preliminary plat approval. A Public Hearing was held by the Planning Commission. The council reviewed resolutions regarding the requests received.

Property has been annexed to the city and is automatically zoned agricultural. Rezoning to Planned Residential District results in compatibleness with the Comprehensive Plan guidance. The Planned Residential District is intended to allow for the development of residential areas under a flexible regulatory process allowing for joint planning design efforts by the developer and the city. The process should result in benefits that preserve natural resourcees and amenities, assure a higher quality living environment and develop a variety of housing types and densities as a single planned entity.

The Planning Commission and the city planner recommended approval of the rezoning subject to conditions. The city engineer reviewed the revised preliminary plans for the development. A developer's agreement is necessary to be prepared for the addition.

Conditional Use Permit Amendment

The council reviewed information for request to amend the Conditional Use Permit for property on 6th Street West. Purchasers of the proposed property requested an amendment to the existing Conditional Permit to extend the time frame allowed to complete some capital improvement to the property. Staff support generally approved providing compliance with other provisions of the permit The Planning Commission held a Public Hearing. Several neighboring properties stated that the site is not being operated in conformance with the conditions of the existing permit. Public input focused on noise, operating hours, operating businesses, and storage. There was no denial of this occurring. The Planning Commission recommended denial of the amendment for the reasons that it was their opinion regardless the property would not be in compliance with or without the amendment.

The staff requested direction for drafting the resolution for approval or denial for the future meeting. The council reviewed the contents of the analysis of the Conditional Use Permit. The purpose of the permit is for the city to place conditions to address any adverse impacts of the land use and determine what additional requirements may be necessary to reduce adverse effects.

"The CUP request should be reviewed in terms of the proposed use on the health, safety, and welfare of the community, existing and anticipated traffic impacts, and whether or not it is in harmony with the general purpose of the Zoning Ordinance and the Comprehensive Plan. Typical conditions for a CUP for business uses adjacent to residential would relate to ensuring that the business use is compatible with the surrounding uses and minimize the impacts of this use to surrounding properties."

The council reviewed the background history of the site. The building was constructed in 1975 with continued businesses use since. Since that time development has occurred around the site that originally was agricultural zoning. Businesses have been allowed to operate at the site for the past thirty eight years. Currently the property is subject to a conditional use permit allowing limited types of specific businesses.

Conditional Use Permits run with the property, not with the applicant and the comment was clarified audibly. Conditions put into place are recommended to be specific and enforceable, particularly recognizing areas not originally addressed since it is difficult to address after the fact. New applications typically allow enforcers the opportunity to address any items that were unforeseen in the past. The Zoning Ordinance standards for Conditional Use Permits were also reviewed and discussed. The council reviewed the use of the property.

The council reviewed and discussed at length that if approval were to be considered to amend the Conditional Use Permit then extensive listed conditions would be required to be amended and implemented in the resolution with revocation for non-compliance as an ending result for non-compliance.




