Those numbers alone are a "Wow" factor. The game itself is scheduled for February 4<sup>th</sup> at 5:30 PM Central time at the US Bank Stadium in Minneapolis MN. The game will be broadcast on NBC. Sportscasters from ESPN will broadcast from the IDS Center. Another trivia fact found was that this 2018 Championship Game is the 48<sup>th</sup> in modern day era.

And of course, along with the big game itself, there is the allotted fifteen-minute half time stage presenting the featuring performance of Justin Timberlake. Then there is the popular Super Bowl commercials and ads that are always anticipated and rated. Another big Super Bowl entertainment event in the arena is the 2018 Puppy Bowl on the Animal Planet channel. Of course, one cannot forget the Super Bowl parties planned.

St Paul's River Center, the Xcel Energy Center, MN Vikings Winter Park, and the U of MN all have events scheduled around the big event. There will be a "Taste of NFL" which is a fundraiser for food banks will be held in St Paul. The Minneapolis Armory will host a series of concerts and the SMSC Mystic Lake will host a traveling night club. The NFL is presenting the Super Bowl experience at the Minneapolis Convention Center. The fun does not stop here.

## St Paul Winter Carnival

Did you know that the St Paul Winter Carnival is the oldest winter festival in the United States? It predates the Tournament of Roses Festival by two years? This is from the carnival's website.

Since 1885 the St Paul Winter Carnival has brought family-friendly events and community pride to St Paul and the Twin Cities metro area. It is a city-wide festivity with special events, fun activities and so much more.

Since this marks a spot in history for Minnesota, it is important to include these historical facts about the inception of the event. A New York report wrote in 1885 that St Paul was "another Siberia, unfit for human habitation" in winter. A fact Minnesotans often hear in general comments of those not used to cold or frigid temperatures a lot. The St Paul Chamber of Commerce was offended by the comment made and set out to prove how much citizens were very much alive in wintertime. This initiated the beginning of the St Paul Winter Carnival. The first carnivals were held in 1886, 18'87, 1888 and 1896. The event was revived in 1916 and 1917. Beginning again in 1937, continued through 1942. The event resumed on a permanent basis in 1946.

The 2018 year presents a seventeen-day celebration of winter with the St Paul Winter Carnival. This festivity is known as "Coolest Celebration on Earth." There are seventeen days packed full of fun starting on January 25<sup>th</sup> running through February 10<sup>th</sup>. This year the St Paul Festival and Heritage Foundations' goal is to be the Super Showcase.

There is so much to explore and see that it is highly recommended to visit their website and explore all the information. (<a href="www.winter-carnival.com">www.winter-carnival.com</a>) Most events are free, and open to the public occurring in downtown St Paul near Rice Park and Landmark Center, as well as the MN State Fairgrounds.

Rice Park hosts Ice Carving Displays, Pabst Winter Carnival Music Series, Frozen Family Fun Night, From Ice to Spice Cinco Night, "Not Your Father's" Happy Hour, Ice Bar, Multi-Block and Individual Block Competition. Some Signature events already occurred and others are upcoming. There's the Securian Winter Run featuring four races; the Half Marathon, 10K, 5K and Kids Fun Run. Then there's the parades. The Moon Glow Pedestrian Parade, the King Boreas Grand Day Parade and the Vulcan Victory Torchlight Parade. If you interested in more information about the carnival events, check their website for all the dates, times and locations.

There are too many to list without somehow slighting something important. The whole festivity wraps up occurs on the 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> of February with the Vulcan Victory Dance and Barstool Ski Race Finals.

#### Carver's Levee

Karen Wiemeri, a representative from the Mead and Hunt firm attended the council's work session meeting. The firm is a national consulting establishment offering services in the fields of planning, design architecture and engineering. The firm provided an update on the completion of the Phase I data regarding the levee. These included the collection and organization of all the data. If the city decides to proceed, the next phase would be an Engineering Analysis to determine whether the levee can be certified. The city will review the pros and cons, as well as the costs and value statement to consider proceeding with Phase II.

#### Miscellaneous

The city manager provided an overview of information regarding the 2018 General Fund Budget Summary for the residents of Carver.

The manager also is working with the engineer and the Public Services Director regarding relocation of a street light to the new city parking lot on Third Street West.

A Public Hearing was held regarding delinquent utility certifications to the county. Information was reviewed by the council. If the city adopted the certification roll assessment the amounts would be certified with the county auditor. The liens would be payable for a period of one year, certified with the county for payment with the 2018 property taxes. The interest rate would be five percent. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution implementing the certification roll for delinquent utilities.

A Public Hearing was held on the Truth-in-Taxation issue. The city manager gave an overview of the annual presentation for residents and the council. The final budget and levy would be discussed for final consideration.

The City Planner updated the Planning Commission members on developments issues. The Olsen property will be utilizing the Cal Atlantic builders instead of Centra Homes. The final plat will be submitted soon.

Trinity still has the M & I Homes builder on the Butler property. They are working on their final plat, as well.

The city planner is unaware of any plans for the property near Fleet Farm but aware of an Oppidan trailer parked near the site.

Shingobee is working on the redevelopment project on the Sixth Street property. There are some environmental issues being worked through.

Just northwest of the Carver Elementary school has an interested builder.

## Building Inspector Report The building inspector gave the council a report on construction in

The building inspector gave the council a report on construction in the city. The Carver Ridge  $2^{\rm nd}$  Addition only has three lots remaining in this development. At the Copper Hills development there are eight homes under construction and the model home has been completed. One home is being constructed in Christy's Bluff. Hallblade Properties has one house under construction. Riverview Estates currently has four houses under construction.

#### 2018 Elections

The council discussed and reviewed a resolution designating a polling place for the 2018 elections for the City of Carver. The office of the MN Secretary of State released information to municipalities and school districts regarding changes to laws governing polling locations. To lesson confusion, the existing polling location will remain the same as 2016 election location which was the St Nicholas Church Parish Center.

#### Parks Master Plan

The Public Services Director updated the council on a work session held with the Parks Commission regarding the Parks Master Plan. The work session involved introductions and confirmation of the plan project goals, prior strength, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats efforts, as well as the purpose and draft contents. Updates would be discussed to coincide with the 2040 Comprehensive Plan. The next steps to be pursued will include summary review of data, coordinate a review of the 2040 Comprehensive Plan, Parks and Trails Chapter as it is available and plan for a tentative Public Hearing possibly in February.

## City Hall Update

The city manager provided an overview of the preliminary financial analysis for the proposed city hall project. The financial represent-tative reviewed the Capital Improvement Plan bond process with the council. Bidding on the project is scheduled to occur in March. Tentative date for bond sale anticipated mid May. Discussions for a Public Hearing to be held in January. The council held a lengthy discussion on reviewing financial strategies.

The Heritage Preservation Commission discussed the exterior façade of the proposed new city hall with the representative from the Wold Architects and Engineers firm. The city staff has been working on the building design, floor layouts, exterior features and materials for the new city hall.

The design strategy was to break the building into three different mass sizes to give dimension and the appearance of more than one building. The exterior materials would contain two different tan color brick, rock face brick at the base of the tower and some steel roof materials for finishes. The window design would incorporate narrow glazing with mullions and grids and a dark to medium bronze metal trim matching the roof. The commissioners were also told that the cornice design was still being worked on which could include either the use of brick or metal.

The illustration depicts the proposal discussed.



One commissioner expressed dislike for the tower with all the windows and the lack of wide trim boards. It was also the commissioner's opinion that the cornice should be more detailed and brackets across the front.

The building inspector added that the design group designed to allow the appearance of the lower level windows/doors replicated a storefront and the upper windows ratio would appear like other surrounding buildings. Other structures were referenced however the desire was to remain with the city's design guidelines and its building architectural features. Design ideas are still being worked on. Motion was made and carried with all ayes requesting to see another rendering with recommendations to raise the roof front, more detailed cornice drawing, samples of exterior materials, drafted shallower roof pitch on the tower and exterior light details.

## Employee Service Awards

The Ten-Year Service Award was presented to Cathy Elke, City Accountant at a council meeting. Ms Elke celebrated her ten-year anniversary with the City of Carver. The city manager stated his appreciation for her accuracy within all of the financial activities for the city. The mayor stated his appreciation for her timelines. The mayor and the council all took the time to thank her for all of her work.

## The Meadows

The city planner reviewed the final plat for The Meadows at Spring Creek development from Trinity Development and Vincent Bluffs of Carver located south of Spring Creek Drive. The proposal is to plat the first phase of The Meadows at Spring Creek which consists of forty-five villa lots and thirty-two single family lots. The outlots would consist of either storm water ponds, environmentally sensitive resources or areas for future lots/streets. M/I Homes is the proposed builder formerly Hans Hagen Homes.

## Disclaimer

The "unapproved" minutes of the council and the township have been referenced for the purpose of creating this information for residents in the City of Carver and the townships surrounding the city.

### 2018 Fee Schedule

The city clerk/treasurer provided information for the 2018 fee schedule topic. The staff reviews various fee charges and recommends appropriate changes for the upcoming year. Upon adoption the fees take effect on the first of January after publication of the ordinance. The building permit fees increased overall by three percent. The Planning Commission recommended approval for the proposed fees charged for building permits relating to land use matters.

Then the council discussed the questions about the Carver Elementary School fees regarding an agreement. The city manager clarified that the city has a ten-hour priority scheduling agreement for the use of Chaska Park and Recreation Carver's programming use time, but that the school has their own fee schedule. Question was asked about resident use. The School District or Community Edu-cation would have to be contacted directly for scheduling and fees. Question was asked about group requests. The city manager would obtain a fee schedule and categories determining groups and rates.

The city manager reminded the council that municipal services usually were reviewed at this time, as well. However, decision was made to wait until the Utility Rate Study has been received. This is currently being worked on.

Classifications of rentals were inquired about, along with advertising for the Carver Place space. There had not been any changes made as specific policies and fees had been adopted from the Church by the River space. The city manager also pointed out that currently the council does not have authority to change these fees at this time. Due to the limited amount of space for community groups and the like advertising has not been pursued. Recommendation had been made to change the three-hour minimum to four-hour on the fee schedule for short term rentals.

Question was asked about the name change from Church by the River to City Council Chambers. Carver-on-the-Minnesota had named the building. To eliminate the confusion, at a work session the change had been made. The sign in front of the building had also been changed. The final decision was to change the name to City Council Chambers at the Church-by-the-River.

Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the ordinance regarding the fee schedule for 2018.

#### Land Use

The city planner presented the drafted refined future land use map from the Comprehensive Plan Meeting.

Refinements made included some of the previously identified area as Industrial development north of Highway #212 changed to Medium Density Residential. Another area involved south of Highway #212 and east of County Road #43 changed to High Density Residential. The third area identified as west of County Road #11 changed to a dual guidance of either commercial or industrial area. Areas identified as parks and open space were refined, along with some other areas that were marked on the map. MN Valley Lands recently acquired property between Carver Bluffs and County Road #11 for future inclusion in the Rapids Lake Unit of the MN Valley National Wildlife Refuge.

This area was changed to Conservation on the map. The triangle area between County Road # 40 and County Road # 11 was changed from Urban Reserve to Low Density Residential. The properties north of Sixth Street were identified as Low Density Residential. The Parking lot on Third Street was added to the Public Institutional guidance to be consistent with other city properties guidance.



## January Fun Facts

Thanks to the internet and Wikipedia below are some fun facts regarding the month of January.

The Common Sense by Thomas Paine was published on January 10, 1776. On January 10, 1920 the League of Nations was established. January is the first month of the year in the Julian and Gregorian calendars, and one of seven Gregorian months with the length of 31 days. The first day of the month is known as New Year's Day. It is, on average, the coldest month of the year within most of the Northern Hemisphere and the warmest month of the year within most of the Southern Hemisphere.

"January, from the Très Riches Heures du Duc de Berry January is named after Janus (Ianuarius), the god of the doorway; the name has its beginnings in Roman mythology, coming from the Latin word for door (ianua) - January is the door to the year. Traditionally, the original Roman calendar consisted of 10 months, totaling 304 days, winter being considered a monthless period. Around 713 BCE, the semi-mythical successor of Romulus, King Numa Pompilius, is supposed to have added the months of January and February, allowing the calendar to equal a standard lunar year (355 days). Although March was originally the first month in the old Roman Calendar, January became the first month of the calendar year either under Numa or under the Decemvirs about 450 BCE (Roman writers differ). In contrast, years in dates were identified by naming two consuls, who entered office on May 1 and March 15 before 153 BCE when they began to enter office on January 1.'

"Various Christian feast dates were used for the New Year in Europe during the Middle Ages, including March 25 and December 25. However, medieval calendars were still displayed in the Roman fashion of twelve columns from January to December. Beginning in the sixteenth century, European countries began officially making January 1 the start of the New Year once again — sometimes called Circumcision Style because this was the date of the Feast of the Circumcision, being the eighth day from December 25."

"Historical names for January include its original Roman designation, Ianuarius, the Saxon term Wulf-monath (meaning wolf month) and Charlemagne's designation Wintarmanoth (winter / cold month)."

"In Finnish, the month is called tammikuu, meaning month of the oak, but the original meaning was the month of the heart of winter, as tammi has initially meant axis or core. In Czech this month is called leden, meaning ice month In Ukrainian it is січень meaning cutting or slicing perhaps referring to the wind.'



The Ancestry website charges \$ 19.99 per month for six months, if you stay only in the USA searches, after that it's an additional \$ 99. And costs more if you need to search beyond the USA border. If you would like help with your family tree, the charge is only \$ 10.00 per generation for each side of your family, (\$10.00 for your side and \$10.00 per generation on spouse's side ).
