



City Hall Update

The city manager gave a summary to the council regarding the bid award process for the city hall project. Discussion was presented pertaining to prior dialogs of results reviewed being over the estimated budget, recommendations submitted to proceed with work scope bids allowing the project to maintain current start date in early June, bids for the HVAC would be rejected and advertised to rebid. Solutions for funding the remainder of the budget were presented. Representatives from Wold Architect and Kraus Anderson were in attendance to respond to questions.

Council member inquired about earthwork and the temporary retaining wall. Response was given that by reducing the retaining wall and working with the levee would allow the work. Those who assisted with complications that had arisen with overrun of costs were thanked for their efforts and work to assist in resolutions. The city manager asked for an overview of expectations for upcoming weeks. Insurance needs to be procured and contracts executed. Work will begin on the design process for the HVAC, requesting bids and scheduling a bid date. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution awarding and rejecting certain bids for the Broadway City Hall Project.

Ironwood Park

The city engineer discussed with the council the advertisement of bids for the Ironwood Park pedestrian bridges. One bridge would connect the trail to the practice field and the other would provide continuity of existing trails through the site. The council reviewed bridge materials. A steel bridge would not require as much maintenance as a wood bridge but there would be some required maintenance with either in the future. Costs for both materials were relatively close. Maintenance for prefab steel material would occur when weathering or decay is noticed. Question was asked about bidding on both steel and wood materials. Input was given for preference of prefab material. The attorney suggested bidding for the steel material if that was the preferred material type. The city engineer agreed. It was understood that the east bridge was absolutely necessary for crossing. Question was asked if the west bridge was necessary. The Public Works Director stated that the west bridge necessitated access to the practice field. The cost of the project was reviewed. Funds would be from the Park Dedication Fund. Motion was made and carried with all ayes approving plans and specifications and authorizing advertisement of bids for the Ironwood Park Pedestrian Bridges in the Steel Prefab Design.

Solar Energy Systems The consulting planner presented information relating to the Solar Energy Systems. The council had previously adopted an interim ordinance concerning solar energy systems. Advancements in technology and financial incentives encourage these systems. Within the metropolitan area local governments are required by law to include elements related to said systems in Comprehensive Plans. The final draft of the plan is being compiled. Lengthy discussions have been held concerning the issue. Recommendations were reviewed.

Corridor Study The city engineer discussed with the council the resolution of support regarding the County Roads of # 61 and # 41.

A summary of findings were presented. Question was asked if there would be a trail on the north side of Mt Hope Road. It was the engineer's understanding that there would be a trail on the north side connecting with the regional trail. The presented Option 2 traveling on the west side of the collector pond running down would give access to the four homes. The city engineer responded that it was a very high concept as the need to push further west to serve development for the City of Carver. Plus, also serves help to the City of Chaska because otherwise access to the vicinity north would not have access. Question was asked about the bituminous trail over Highway # 212 by Fleet Farm. The perception of one council member was that the pedestrian crossing would be at the intersection of # 61 and # 40. The city engineer related that a pedestrian bridge would go from the north side of Jonathan Carver Parkway and a separate bridge over Highway # 212 and would extend somewhere down the bluff connecting with the regional trail. The city manager clarified that this was a trail on the northern side of # 61, not the trail on Jonathan Carver Parkway. The mayor inquired if the use of the data derived from benchmarking initiated and sustained performance was utilized or just a general development driven initiative. The engineer was unaware of any benchmarks. The mayor requested that it be known that the City of Carver requests benchmarks for the area. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution supporting the find-ings of the county road corridor study.

2019 Improvement Project

The city engineer presented information pertaining to the Feasibility Report plans and the timeline for improvements. Cost of the project is not known at this time. Question was asked regarding wording for city municipal utilities hookups. Connection requirements were asked about. The ordinance requires connections be determined by the council. Question was asked if residents had made any known improvements. The engineer related that all of the septic systems were original. Discussions had occurred about well improvements. Retaining wells was asked about. In the past wells were allowed to be retained for lawns. Previously, residents received notifications pertaining to municipal utilities connections. The verbiage to retain wells should be included for this project. Motion was made and carried with all ayes authorizing the preparation of a feasibility report for the 2019 improvement plan.

2017 Audit

The auditing firm representative presented the overview of the findings of the 2017 audit. The council reviewed the management letter and the annual financial report. Thanks were extended for the performance of the audit and to Ms Elke for her work with the auditors. Concern was expressed regarding the necessity for succession planning regarding the financial activities of the city. Motion was made and carried with all ayes approving the 2017 audit presented.

Meridian Fields

The city planner discussed the Comprehensive plan amendment to reguide property from commercial to low density residential for development of the Meridian Fields site. The overall density requirement is met with the Metropolitan Council with the amendment. Motion was made carried with all ayes adopting the resolution approving the Comprehensive Plan amendment.

At the joint meeting with the council and the planning commission members the city planner discussed the Meridian Fields Profile. The overview given was that the goal of the project profile is to introduce projects prior to decisions are required at a meeting. Development decisions play a major role in appearance of the project, functionality and impacts the success of the project for both the city and the developer. The Median Fields development has progressed through annexation and the Preliminary Plat is being reviewed by staff. The work session provides the opportunity for discussion and review by staff, changes and considerations prior to a Final Plat. The Preliminary Plat and rezoning of the project are scheduled for July.

Hawthorne Ridge Profile The city planner presented an overview and goal for the Hawthorne Ridge Profile. The Hawthorne Ridge development is in the concept review stage and scheduled to be reviewed in July. The discussion of the Comprehensive Plan Amendment will also be discussed so that the project may be developed. The council will be expected to comment on the proposal.

Miscellaneous

The Carver Lions made a donation to the city for the city hall project. Motion was made and carried with roll call vote of all ayes acknowledging and accepting donation from the Carver Lions.

The city manager reviewed the Employee Reference Manual requesting motion to adopt the amendments to the manual. The manual is a document outlining work place rules, leave provisions, fringe benefits and other employee related procedures. There is an annual review to keep current with employment law and changes in the work place.

The city engineer discussed the annual storm water pollution prevention plan and the steps required annually to be completed.

At the council's work session, the city manager presented the 2019 budget expectations. He also presented the Utility Rate Study overview. The council reviewed the municipal utilities and storm water rate study and further consideration will occur in the future. Discussion was held regarding the possibility of community gardens for resident rental.

Inquiry was made regarding the status of the Mills Tax Increment Financing district. The city manager estimated closure in approx.imately 2021. The county would take their portion of the TIF and develop the intersection if this money were to paid off early. However, that payment early is not anticipated to occur.

Meadows at Spring Creek The city planner discussed with the council the request to adopt the ordinance for rezoning regarding the approved final plat for the Meadows at Spring Creek. Historically, properties may not be rezoned until later in the development process ensuring appropriate approvals prior to rezoning for residential development which is very specific for projects. The council had reviewed the rezoning and a resolution had been passed with several conditions prior to rezoning by ordinance. The required conditions have been met and completed.

Bond Issuance

The Springsted representative informed the council that two resolutions were necessary for scheduling sale date and time for the bonds. Motion was made and carried with all ayes approving the resolution providing for the competitive negotiated sale of general obligation capital improvement plan bonds. Motion was made and carried with all ayes approving the resolution providing for the competitive negotiated sale of general obligation utility revenue bonds.

Civil Defense Sirens

The city manager discussed the Civil Defense Sirens with the council. Request was submitted to approve quote installing a new siren at the Levi Griffin Road site and to relocate the siren from Lions Park to the water treatment plant site on Mt Hope Road. The overview was presented regarding the Civil Defense Sirens known as emergency sirens used by public safety agencies and the National Weather Service as a mass notification system for severe weather. The city has four civil defense sirens. An analysis of coverage had been initiated to ensure that the community is appropriately covered. Although all areas receive coverage, recommendations for a new pole and pole relocation will enhance the current system. The relocation on Mt Hope Road strengthens the system in the northeast area of the community including the Meadows at Spring Creek, Christy' Buff and River Bluff neighborhoods. The second recommendation includes enhancing coverage in the northwest including Levi Griffin Freeway district, Carver Elementary and the housing developments adjacent to Jonathan Carver Parkway. Costs and fund allocations details were reviewed and discussed. Motion was made and carried with all aves approving quote for installation and relocation of civil defense sirens.

City Planner

The city planner updated the council on information regarding activities within the city. The Preliminary plat for Meridian Fields is being reviewed by staff. The Comprehensive Plan Amendment has been submitted to the Metropolitan Council for review and annexation is being completed by the state.

Grading at the site of Oak Tree has begun and preconstruction meeting was held for street and utilities. The staff and developer are working with the developer on submittal of phase two of the final plat.

The development team met with staff regarding Hawthorne Ridge on the Redmond property. Submission of the concept is expected by staff soon. Some new city processes were introduced to the developer and were received well.

The Design Carver meeting involving the housing section and districts will be ready for review. Site investigation and cleanup is continuing at the Sixth Street property. Staff is working on a Community Rating System to assist in lowering flood insurance rates.

Solar Ordinance

The council discussed items regarding the solar ordinance. Concerns were expressed regarding clarification of "no longer in operation". The city manager indicated that it would be decommission after twelve months of being inoperable. Favored decommissioning after six months instead. Also, concerns were expressed of not favoring ground use, issues of junk and nuisances, abandonment, agricultural zoning, and equipment disrepair. Motion was made and carried with three ayes and two nays to adopt the ordinance relating to solar energy systems as presented.

Comprehensive Plan

The city planner discussed the process overview of the Comprehensive Plan relating to the Metropolitan Council with the Planning Commission members. The consensus was to move forward with the Plan Design Carver. The future land use map was reviewed at length and discussion held. Density, conservation of critical natural features and economic development were talked about along with relationship to future land use map and the zoning code to accomplish core values of the community. Where portions of the com-munities of Chaska and Victoria and Carver come together the council considered a collective approach.

Lift Station

The city engineer discussed the Storm Water Lift Station project bids. The city had prepared final plans and specifications for the Main Street Storm Water Lift Station project and reviewed the bids received which were significantly higher than estimates projected. Discussions were held with contractors. A variety of factors caused the higher costs. The most significant cause involved the dewatering of the ground water associated with placing of two lift station structures. The Minnesota River remained unusually high throughout most of spring causing the contractors to account for this risk. Evaluations and discussions on multiple options for proceeding forward were reviewed for this improvement. Solutions may include adjustments to the scope of the project, phasing various portions of the project or combining with other projects. Anticipation to rebid mid to late summer. The current situation is not ideal but it is the belief that positive solutions could be achieved moving forward. Recommendation was submitted to reject the bids.

Storm Water Bypass

The city engineer discussed the Jonathan Carver Parkway Storm Water Bypass Project authorization for preparation of plans and specifications. The development of property north of Dahlgren Road within the city highlighted drainage concerns by the surrounding property owners, Dahlgren Township and the Carver County Watershed Management Organization. Developments have been designed and built to meet requirements.

The Oak Tree development plans were to route additional storm water through the development, discharging south of Dahlgren Road on the west side of Carver Square. City plans were to route this additional water to an existing landlocked pond located south of the Fire Station building and expand the basin. The plan would have provided for additional storage and allow reduced flow rates downstream, ultimately reducing the overall flow rates with this watershed. Purchasing or utilizing property were discussed with the property owner who was not interested. Since this option is no longer available, the alternative is to route the water around the land locked pond further downstream requiring routing the piping. The two options will be evaluated.

All of the storm water previously drained to Carver Creek and appropriate rate controls are provided up stream within the developments, so there is not an increased run off, but only bypassing the water to improve drainage upstream. The bypass pipe would also serve future development for a long-term solution for the city. The Oak Tree development would be making the connection across Dahlgren Road over summer, so a bypass pipe from the Fire Department building to Carver Creek should be installed as soon as feasibly possible.

Peter Sterbonic

Many people from the area remember or know Pete Sterbonic formerly from East Union. The East Union Church placed an announcement that bears sharing. "One hundred years ago on June 25, 1918, Peter Sterbonic was born in Wisconsin. In 1946, Pete married Maxine Edberg. After twenty years in the USAF, Pete and Maxine settled in East Union next to Bevins Creek, where they raised their family. (He worked for Shakopee Services Bus Company and if memory serves me correctly, I believe he was also part owner for some time.) After retirement, they moved to Wickenburg, Arizona where Pete still lives today." Anyone interested in contacting Pete or sending birthday wishes, contact East Union Church and see if you can have his address.



He was so flabbergasted that he looked like he had just been deflated.




