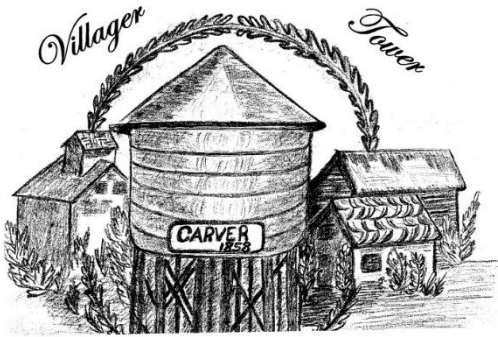

City of Carver

The general election is November 6, 2018 (Tuesday). The polls are open from 7 AM to 8 PM. City elections are held in conjunction with the General Election. Their plans are to decorate the gazebo, the park and a tree for the holidays. They had so much fun last year, it is well worth repeating was the decision.

The highlight of the day will be lighting of the tree at 6 PM.

Lakeview Industries

The city engineer discussed Lakeview Industries Infrastructure Improvements and the ordering of Feasibility Report as well as scheduling a Public Hearing. The council reviewed the drafted resolution. The preliminary plat from Lakeview Industries were submitted to the city. The proposal is located directly north of the existing Fleet Farm facility requiring construction of a new city street, storm sewer, watermain and sanitary sewer to serve the current and future buildings to the north. Bid and design for street and utilities would be done by the city in the fall of 2018 with potential partial completion late in the fall and the balance of the work completed in the summer of 2019. Financing would be partially handled through a DEED Grant received by the city funding half of the projects costs. The balance would be funded through a Tax Increment Financing District.

The city planner reviewed the history relating to Lakeview Industries who has been seeking expansion identifying land in Carver as their new headquarters. The facility presently located in Chaska would be completely moved to the new Carver site with future expansion plans. The proposed site had already been annexed into the city. The default zoning is agriculture until proposed application for rezoning is submitted. The property was identified in the Comprehensive Plan as industrial. The project would fulfill the necessity for a diversified land use within the city. The council is requested to rezone the property. The land use and building are consistent with the city code. The staff completed the review of the Preliminary Plat working with the development team addressing city requirements. The consensus of the staff approved thus far of the plans and will continue working with the development team on their Final Plat application to be reviewed by the Planning Commission. Parking was also reviewed.

The city will be constructing a north/south road along the east property line of the Lakeview site. Access to the properties north of Mills Fleet Farm will be challenging. Commerce Drive will be the name of the new street allowing access to several surrounding property owners if they choose. Grant funding from the Department of Employment and Economic Development were applied for. Construction of the new street will coincide with the Lakeview project. Anticipated construction completion to be mid-year 2019. The existing collector has the capacity for the proposal. Park dedication is required and will be collected at the Final Plat stage. Significant buffering is proposed meeting requirements. Determination was made that there will be an increased traffic impact with the development.

Formal comments have been received from property owners. Property owners discussed concerns with the staff. The Planning Commission held a Public Hearing. Topics included land use guidance, zoning, environmental impact and screening. One property owner opposed the proposal stating opinion of commercial user was more fitted for property. The Planning Commission recommended approval of the Preliminary Plat for Lakeview Industries and recommended approval for rezoning property. The Planning Commission also approved the resolution finding the proposed development program modification and Tax Increment Financing plan in conformance with the Comprehensive Plan and development of the community.

The Planning Commission discussed the rezoning and Preliminary Plat for Lakeview Industries. The city planner presented information relating to the rezoning request, the Preliminary Plat and the Tax Increment Financing review as they related to the Comprehensive Plan. Clarification was asked about industrial versus commercial/industrial zoning. Building size and expansion were reviewed. Access was reviewed. A north/south road would be constructed on the east property line with the proposed name of that street being Commerce Drive providing truck access to the site.

The Planning Commission held a Public Hearing. Neighboring property owners discussed their concerns and questions with the Planning Commission members. Concerns were expressed regarding lighting and environmental impacts. The extension of Dauwalter Road (Commerce Drive) is not anticipated to connect with Creekridge Lane at this time. The topography of the area was discussed. The watershed district will be regulating the water run off. Another citizen voiced disappointment in allowing industrial business into "Freeway Commercial District", as well as the residential development south of the highway. Had Chaska annexed the area, plan possibly would be something different. Suggestion was submitted to locate the facility further behind Fleet Farm. The 2030 Comprehensive Plan allotted area as commercial property. The term of 'Freeway Commercial District' was an unofficial panning term as a way to incite interest in the area. Another citizen expressed concern regarding pollution to the ground water. Truck traffic was also a concern. The objective was to limit the majority of the truck traffic to an 8 AM to 5 PM window. Another property owner recently moved to the area and cherishes the quiet area and does not want that quietness disrupted. Emergency training was inquired about if there were any type or prevention of any type of disaster.

The President of Lakeview Industries relayed their eagerness to preserve the area and willing to adjust to save mature trees. However, a new property owner to the east could potentially remove the trees. Truck traffic outside said hours was a rare occurrence. The facility is designed for fabrication and storage. Tenants would be temporary as the future plans are to reclaim the space in one to two years. Water jet cutting is done at the facility and the water gets reclaimed. Material remaining at the bottom of the tank is removed by specialized company.

The Planning Commission recommended approval by motion with all ayes of the Preliminary Plat for development of the proposed by Lakeview Industries. The city manager also presented information regarding the Tax Increment Financing for Lakeview Industries. The project aligns with the funding guidelines. Motion was made and carried with all ayes recommending approval of modification for Development District 1 and the TIF Financing Plan for development of Lakeview Industries.

Editor note: in researching some information regarding the Lakeview Industries, I was surprised that no one has mentioned that this is a woman owned company. Their website states that they are small enough to care about your individual needs, yet large enough to handle large customer and large volume orders. Their mission statement is also posted on their website. Thought this information was interesting.

The Jack-o-Lantern Carving Contest involves entering your pumpkin for a chance to win prizes. Ribbons for best in show will also be awarded. All participants must register to have their pumpkin entered. Registration is free and you register at www.chaskacommunitycenter.com under activities titled "Jack-o-Lantern Carving Contest. The deadline for registration is October 15th. Then you drop off your pumpkins at the community center's front desk on October 18th between noon and 2 PM.

The Trail of Fun is scheduled for October 19th at 6 PM until 8:30 PM at the Chaska Athletic Park and is only \$ 1 per person. Climb aboard the hay ride as they wander down the MN River Bluff regional trail. Along the way riders will be surrounded by Jack-o-Lanterns carved by the community. At the end of the trail there will be s'more's cookout over an open fire, archery pumpkin shoot-out and lot more fun. Cash only at the gate.

Trident Development

The city planner discussed with the council the Trident Development Concept Plan and the Comprehensive Plan Amendment. The city planner reviewed the overview of past comments regarding the history of the property. The Planning Commission had drafted guiding principles for redevelopment of the site on Sixth Street. These guides included preference for senior living facility. Two proposals had been received to construct a two-story facility on the site. Shingobee recently partnered with Trident Development for redevelopment of the property. The proposal consists of a 70-unit senior facility including mix of assisted living and memory care spaces. The breakdown of the units would be twenty-one memory care units and 49 assisted living units. Recent project includes facilities in Fridley, Chaska, Maple Grove, Apple Valley and Chanhassen for Trident Development. There are also other facilities in the metro area. Trident partners with Tealwood Senior Living for property management once completed. Several senior facilities throughout the state are operated by Tealwood. Tealwood would be the management team in Carver. The project would also include a common dining room, commercial kitchen, administrative offices, wellness/fitness area and an outdoor recreation area.

Currently the property is zoned agriculture. Part of the development will include rezoning to a Planned Residential District. Possible reduced setbacks may be requested. Rezoning will likely occur with the Planning Commission and council at the same time as the Preliminary Plat. Context with existing single-family residential development surrounding the site has been considered with development of the concept plan. The proposed project will create continuity with the existing neighborhoods.

The property requires a Comprehensive Plan Amendment for the proposed project. Redevelopment of the site was not anticipated in the drafting of the 2030 plan. Identification for the drafted 2040 Design Carver future land use plan the proposal is considered high density. As part of the amendment process, adjacent communities and municipalities must be notified of changes to the current plan. The required time frame closed and there had not been any formal opposition comments received. The council will review the amendment and if favorable, the submission of an application will be submitted to the Metropolitan Council for their review and approval of the change. The Met Council must approve the amendment prior to the project seeking Preliminary Plat approval by the Planning Commission and the council.

“The site has required investigation and clean-up of hazardous materials on the site. The city received grant funding from the Department of Employment of Economic Development, Terracon and Carver County for the clean-up efforts. Site investigation has led to a Response Action Plan (RAP) that will address and mitigate all required mitigation. The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency will review the cleanup work completed on the site to ensure compliance with their regulations. Staff and the development team are working to ensure Environmental cleanup of the site is completed prior to work on the site.”

Access to the proposed facility on Sixth Street will be directly across from the Lylewood Parkway allowing for controlled traffic patterns. Discussion have been held regarding trails and sidewalks. Direct and improved access to the Community Park from the site have been encouraged. The city’s Fire Marshal’s evaluation of the Concept Plan indicated a fire access requirement around the entire building.

The Planning Commission hosted a neighborhood meeting pertaining to the project. Concerns of lighting, sounds from both, construction and operations were reviewed. Collectively the project was met with favorability. The Planning Commission held the required Public Hearing relating to the Comprehensive Plan Amendment. The commission recommended regarding of the property from low-density to high-density.

The council reviewed the information involving the property on Sixth Street. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution approving the Comprehensive Plan Amendment regarding the Sixth Street property from low density residential to high density residential.

Meridian Fields

The Planning Commission reviewed the final Plat request for Meridian Fields. Property is located south of Highway # 212, west of Jonathan Carver Parkway and northwest of the elementary school. Property consists of approximately forty-six acres and recently annexed into the City of Carver. The net density for the property is about three units per acre. The Comprehensive Plan current zoning includes the property proposal is agriculture/single family, north of Fleet Farm, commercial, south, agriculture/low density single-family township, east, agriculture/commercial township and west, agriculture/medium density residential township.

The proposal has been reviewed for various requests including the concept plan, annexation, Comprehensive Plan Amendment, Preliminary Plat and rezoning with both the Planning Commission and the council. The Final Plat application includes eighty-three single-family homes with access from an extension of Minnesota Drive. The Planning Commission is asked to review Phase One of the development with thirty-six lots. The forty-seven lots will be reviewed at a later date. An existing property owner adjacent to the site will continue residency and not interested in being included in the development at this time. A ghost plan has been prepared if in the future the property owner is interested in the future. The Final Plat is the last step in the development process and consistent with the city code.

An agreement has been entered regarding the access into the development from an extension of Minnesota Drive. This agreement will allow access into Meridian Fields through private property that is currently in the township. Street naming within the development has been a point of conversation at the city council level. The names had changed from the Preliminary Plat time. The street names included are Meridian Curve, Fields Drive, Dauwalter Circle and the extension of Minnesota Drive west of Jonathan Carver Parkway. Dauwalter is a current street name but staff is working on considerations. The city and the county continue working on the traffic study for Jonathan Carver Parkway. The consulting team have reviewed the Meridian Fields project as part of the development process. Sidewalks and trail will be included. Utilities will be extended.

The city planner submitted the information for the Final Plat request for Meridian Fields to the Planning Commission for discussion. Was a roundabout planned at Minnesota Drive and Fields Drive? The city planner responded that a study identified that this would clog quickly and that a controlled four-way was a better option. The present service road has been ghost platted anticipating access in the future will not be necessary. A sound barrier has not been indicated. When Highway #212 is widened an independent noise study may be conducted at that time. Currently there is not a tree preservation plans for the property. Minnesota Drive will serve the Meridian Fields property. The property owner resides on the property will remain. There are thirty-six lots proposed for the development in Phase I and forty-seven lots for Phase II. The intersection design was discussed. Motion was made and carried with all ayes by the Planning Commission recommending approval of the Final Plat for Meridian Fields.

The city planner discussed the Final Plat for Meridian Fields with the council reviewing the resolution approving the Final Plat. The development had previously been reviewed by the council and the Planning Commission member for various requests involving the concept plan, annexation, Comprehensive Plan Amendment, Preliminary Plat and rezoning.

This project includes eighty-three single-family homes with access from an extension of Minnesota Drive. At this time, the council is considering the Phase I development with the Phase II portion to be reviewed in the future for Final Plat. The Final Plat approval is the final step in the development process for Phase I. There are several outlots throughout the property. Five outlots will be maintained by the city which is typical. Two other outlots will be transferred to the owner with the exception property remaining through construction. An agreement is in place allowing access into the Meridian Fields site through their property currently within the township. Street naming has been a point of conversation. Street names have changed from the time of the Preliminary Plat.

Edith-Anne Award

The city planner stated that the Edith-Anne Award has been celebrated since 2015 in honor of Edith Herman and Anne Neils who were both instrumental in the creation of the Carver-On-the-Minnesota's vision of "stop the wasteful deterioration of a typical 19th Century River Town." Credit was also given to Edie and Anne for their restoring and preserving many historic buildings in Carver. This also led to the placement on the National Register of Historic Places in 1980. The Planning Commission reviewed the nominees for the award and selected the home on Debbie Lane as the winner, Karen Brinkman and her husband, Lynn Gregory were at the council meeting where the mayor presented the award to them.

Community Rating System

The city planner stated that the city participates in the Community Rating System. This program recognizes and encourages floodplain management that exceed the standards set in the National Flood Insurance Program. The program is administered through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). Through this management communities are able to reduce flood insurance premium rates for those required to participate. Staff has worked on the activities for several months. The City of Carver was successful in a five percent reduction in premiums. To date, staff have reduced premiums by twenty percent through participation in this program. Question was asked how residents would be notified of changes. Insurance companies are aware of the changes and FEMA will be providing updates to policy owners.

Future Land Use

At the joint session with the council and the planning commission members the city planner provided a brief overview of the proposed changes to the Future Land Use map draft. The Steering Committee identified land use classifications for specific growth areas. Each growth area had multiple land use options and the Steering Committee determined appropriate uses for each property Survey results recorded to date were looked at and briefly discussed the drafted housing section of the Comprehensive Plan.

Carver Creek Lift Station

The Public Services Director discussed with the council the approval of the purchase and installation of a new sewer grinder in the Carver Creek lift station. The grinder would be installed in the incoming sewer line and grind up all material entering the lift station before damaging or plugging pumps. Safety benefits were discussed. The item was planned for in the 2018 budget.

Broadway City Hall Project

The city manager discussed with the council the access control system for the Broadway City Hall project. This project calls for door access system controls. The city solicited proposals for door access controls not included in the primary work scopes. The council reviewed the TAMS (Total Access Management and Security) proposal.

2019 Preliminary Levy

The city reviewed the resolution involving certification of the 2019 Preliminary Levy. The city must certify a preliminary levy to the county by the end of September. In preparation, the council had conducted a series of budget meetings discussing various expenditures related to the General Fund guiding the amounts necessary to fund operations. Once the levy is certified, it cannot be increased. The Truth-in-Taxation hearing is held in December to determine the final levy and budget.

2018 Storm Sewer Improvements

The city engineer discussed with the council the resolution involving the 2018 Storm Sewer Improvements and awarding the contract to Kusske Construction Company. The final plans and specifications have been prepared for the project. Seven bids were received. Several items were bid as optional alternates to be chosen at the city's discretion. These included sump structures and backflow preventers. Based on competitive bids received, recommendation was submitted to proceed with the options. The city bonded for the Main Street Lift Station project, and the 2018 storm sewer project. The Lower Minnesota River Watershed District was awarded a grant to share in the costs of some alternatives.

Southwest Transit

The Southwest Transit's Summer Adventures and Twins Express busses are done for the 2018 season. Their Concert Express has one more run to make. The last bus for that event will be to the US Bank Stadium to see Ed Sheeran on October 20th.



As many summer events closed out for the year, two other busing events were added. The MN Vikings Home Games for their regular season will be offering busing through December 30th season. All information related to times and pick-ups can be found on their website (www.swtransit.org). Drop off site is the Gateway Ramp at 5th Avenue and Third Street. Return trip is the same spot and thirty minutes after the end of the game is boarding time. If there are more than ten in the group, you are asked to call ahead at 952.949.2287.

Interested in the Gophers Football Games? Busing through November 17th is available to their games. Check their website for more information. Drop off site and boarding site is Oak and Delaware and again thirty minutes after the end of the game.

Don't forget about SW Prime, which offers transportation services throughout the cities of Chaska, Carver, Chanhassen, Eden Prairie and Victoria Monday through Friday from 6:30 AM to 6:30 PM. There is also service to Southdale on Saturdays from 8 AM to 6 PM. Three ways to request these rides, by computer, smartphone app, or call to 952.797.7463.

In common years, January starts on the same day of the week as October, but no other month starts on the same day of the week as October in leap years. October ends on the same day of the week as February every year and January in common years only. In leap years, October starts on the same day as August of the previous year. October ends on the same day of the week as February every year.

For Anglo-Saxons the month of October was known by Winterfylleth (Winter full moon), and Wyn Monath which meant wine month. In Roman Catholic countries, in the nineteenth century, the month was dedicated to the devotion of the rosary. More American presidents were born in the month of October than any other month. In the US it is the month for National Filipino American History, LGBT History, National Breast Cancer Awareness, National Arts and Humanities and National Cyber Security Awareness Month, Fair Trade Month, Dwarfism Awareness Month and World Blindness Awareness Month.

Cultural celebrations honored during October include: German American Heritage Month, National Hispanic Heritage Month, Italian American Heritage and Culture Month, Polish American Heritage Month and Mantee Awareness Month. Then there are also the weekly events such as National Fire Prevention Week and Chil-dren's Book Week, National Wildlife Refuge Week and Wolf Awareness Week. On specific days there is International Day of Non-Violence, International World Teachers' Day, Leif Erikson Day, Free Thought Day, Columbus Day, Infant Loss Remembrance Day, World Food Day, Alaska Day, Apple Day, United Nations Day, Navy Day, and of course, last but not least, Halloween Day.

Armistice Day is commemorated every year on the 11th of November to mark the armistice signed between the Allies of World War I and Germany. On the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918 an armistice came into effect. President Wilson in 1919 proclaimed the day should be "filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory." This date is a national holiday in France, declared a national holiday in many allied nations. In some countries the day coincides with Remembrance Day and Veterans Day. Armistice Day is not celebrated in Germany, but a German national day of mourning Volkstrauertag has, since 1952.

In the United States, Veterans Day annually falls on November 11th. Veterans are thanked for their services to the US on Veterans Day. Officially, Veterans Day is observed on November 11th. If the day falls on a week day, many communities celebrate on the weekend closest to this date. If Veterans Day falls on a Sunday, Federal Government office are closed on May, November 12th.

Pumpkins

Do you know why pumpkins are associated with Halloween? Rumor has it that pumpkins carved into what is called 'jack-o'-lanterns' became lanterns when an Atlanta mayor decorated his home with them for a Halloween party.



Then there was the question of "Why are Pumpkins Associated with Halloween"?

"According to the folktale, Stingy Jack invited the Devil to have a drink. Not wanting to pay, he convinced the Devil to turn himself into a coin. However, rather than use the coin to pay for the drinks, Jack kept it for himself. Eventually Jack freed the Devil who promised not to take his soul to Hell. Instead, he gave Jack an ember that he placed in a hollowed-out turnip and carried as he walked the Earth forever. The legend of Stingy Jack and his turnip lantern traveled to the United States with Irish immigrants. It was not long before children began making their own vegetable lanterns using pumpkins, which were plentiful in America. Over the years, children began carving faces into the pumpkin lanterns to frighten each other. Throughout the late 19th century, jack-o'-lanterns became more common as decorations at Halloween until they became part of the holiday itself."

Why do we have Halloween?

Modern Halloween consists of traditions including costumes, ghosts, trick-or-treat, etc. It is said that these come from a number of ancient civilizations. According to the history website, experts credit the holiday stemming from the Celtic festival of Samhain. The Celts celebrated their new year on November 1st which was the date symbolizing death because it was the beginning of the wintry darkness. Consequently, believing that the border between life and death was softened on the night before their new year, October 31st. The Celts believed that the spirits of the dead returned to Earth to destroy their crops and cause mischief. Their resolution was to wear animal-themed costumes and throw the crops and animals into a raging bonfire to summon the protection of the deities.

Then Pope Gregory III in the 8th century deemed November 1st a holiday to remember saints and martyrs, All Saint's Day which included a few Samhain customs. The even before also called "All Hallows' Eve eventually became Halloween. A pagan festival of the Dead and All Souls Day contributing to modern Halloween customs. There are some who attribute trick-or-treating to the All Souls Day parades in England where the poor begged attendees for food.

Did you know apples are also associated with Halloween? "Apples were also part of another form of marriage prophecy. According to legend, on Halloween (sometimes at the stroke of midnight), young women would peel an apple into one continuous strip and throw it over her shoulder. The apple skin would supposedly land in the shape of the first letter of her future husband's name."


