Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting resolution receiving the Feasibility Report for the Lakeview Industries Infrastructure Improvement Project. Second motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution ordering Improvement and Preparation of Plans for the Lakeview Industries Infrastructure Improvements.

Vacations

The city planner provided information regarding the street and alley vacations discussed in the past. The council held a Public Hearing on the issue. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution vacating streets and alleys as presented in the Public Hearing.

2019 Improvement Project

The city manager provided the overview relating to the 2019 Improvement The work provement Project and expectations during the project. The work plan involves reviewing existing and adjacent streets, emergency vehicle access with appropriate personnel, review sidewalks, downtown traffic, review financial input, project summaries updates, and the collection of data to develop plans and specifications for the council approval on final decisions. Future considerations for sidewalks was highlighted to be more aware of. Inquiry was made about design plans that did not include sidewalks. This was an option moving forward. Consideration should be given in the future in areas where there are presently no sidewalks to placing the sidewalk closer to the curb to save space.

2019 Tax Levy and Budget

Motions were made and carried with all ayes adopting resolutions to certify the tax levy and approve the 2019 budget.

Hawthorne Ridge

The city planner discussed the overview involving the Land Use Applications regarding Hawthorne Ridge development. Question was asked about saving trees. The response was given that as many trees as possible will be saved. Question was asked about the design of the homes being similar as the ones seen in the Chaska development.

The response was yes. Custom lots were asked about. DR Horton indicated that lots would not be available to accommodate custombuilt homes. Bluffs and deck hindrance were asked about. The response given was the ability to construct decks should not be hindered or impacted. There would also be signage indicating setbacks. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the ordinance rezoning property from agricultural to residential. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution approving the preliminary plat for Hawthorne Ridge.

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Fund Transfer Policy

The city clerk/treasurer submitted information relating to Electronic Fund Transfer Policy. The purpose and primary goal of the policy ensures initiation, execution and approval in a secure fashion. Recommendation had been submitted during the audit conducted to implement the said policy. The council discussed and reviewed the item.

United Properties Annexation

The city planner discussed annexation and United Properties annexation as well as the drafted resolution approving the Orderly Annexation Agreement. In the past the agreement with Dahlgren Township had been entered describing land area agreed upon. The agreement had additionally outlined the steps required including review by the township, fees collected and required review by the Office of Administrative Hearings. The location of the proposed area is located in the southwest corner of Jonathan Carver Parkway and Highway # 212 owned by United Properties. The early concept plan had been included for council review. Work is presently being done involving a gas and convenience store planned as the first platted project. Additional commercial space is planned to be reserved for a future outlot in the development. Presently, joint efforts on the parts of United Properties and DR Horton are being worked on for construction of Monroe Drive allowing access to both properties, as well as the Meridian Fields development.

"At this time, both the City of Carver and Dahlgren Township received all necessary information to have a complete petition for annexation based on the Orderly Annexation Agreement from Westwood, United Properties development partner for the project. Both City Staff and Township staff have completed necessary steps as outlined by the Orderly Annexation Agreement." Upon council approval, information would be sent to the State office for final review and approval which could only take approximately thirty days. Upon completion of the State's review then the land use control can move forward for approval of rezoning and the preliminary plat. Compliance ensurance has been completed by the staff and the city attorney relating to the Orderly Annexation Agreement and resolution. Annexation expansion to the city's tax base does not have any direct financial impact.

The council reviewed the United Properties annexation issue with a question asking if it met the requirements of the orderly annexation agreement. The attorney indicated that it did. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution approving the annexation of property described as in accordance with the orderly annexation agreement.

Oak Tree Phase III

The city planner presented drafted resolution approving Oak Tree Phase III final plat for council review. Reminder was stated that as part of the Preliminary Plat, the builder for Oak Tree indicated the project would be completed in four phases approach. Reviewal of past phases was given at the council meeting. Approval for Phase III involves lots and rezoning, streets, access and sidewalks, utilities, park land dedication, improvement fee, buffers and landscaping.

The city planner discussed the Oak Tree third stage planning of the development. The council inquired about the traffic off of Dahlgren Road. A traffic study had been submitted with the Preliminary Plat. There are approximately twenty lot involved in the Phase Four plans. The council discussed the landscape of trees. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution approving Oak Tree Phase III Final Plat.

Council Appointment

The city council held a special meeting to interview applicants for the vacant council seat as a result of the election.

There were nine interested individuals seeking to serve the vacancy. Interviews were held with each applicant at a special meeting created as a result of mayor elect taking the "Oath of Office" on January 7th, 2019. Motion was made and carried with all ayes appointing Joy McKnight to the city council position vacancy. Ms McKnight has served on the Planning Commission Board for almost fifteen years and has also been a Carver resident for twenty years.

Congratulations to Ms McKnight extended.

Commerce Drive

The city manager presented the council with the drafted resolution establishing and allocating monies involving Commerce Drive construction fund and DEED (Department of Employment and Economic Development) Grant. Authorization had been previously granted to authorize the grant application for the Innovative Business Development Infrastructure Application to DEED relating to costs of construction for Commerce Drive. Commerce Drive is a north/south street to be constructed in conjunction with Lakeview Industries project in the spring of 2019.

Completion of two additional steps is required to secure grant funding. These include establishing and allocation fifty percent of project costs in a construction fund for the project and acknowledge grant requirements. The final step includes review and execution of a grant agreement with DEED. The estimated costs were reviewed. Local match to the DEED grant may be applied and the additional fifty percent of project costs beyond the grant and city's match will be allocated by Tax Increment Financing of the project. Generated proceeds from the Lakeview development would be utilized to pay the debt service on the bond. Further discussion involved securing bond proceeds in August versus early in 2019 would save the city in capitalized interest.

The council discussed questions relating to the DEED grant for Commerce Drive at the council meeting. One question related to the definition of "innovative business" and what was included if commercial does not qualify. The city manager explained that it includes Lakeview Industries, but would not include businesses like grocery stores, theatres or gas stations. The restriction relates to only infrastructure that is funded by this grant. For this project that is approximately the first nine hundred feet of Commerce Drive and is applicable for the next twenty years.

Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution establishing and allocating monies to the Commerce Drive construction fund.

Design Carver

The Parks Commission reviewed the parks and trails section of the 2040 Comprehensive Plan/Design Carver with the city planner at their meeting. There were not any changes or additions. Future vision of parks was reviewed. Suggestions were broken down to large, medium and small projects.

The commissioners then reviewed timelines and projects for new Park Dedication policy. Prioritizing and realistic timelines were also discussed.

We Cab

The president of WeCab attended the council meeting providing an overview of the organization. WeCab is comprised of a network of volunteers providing safe, affordable and flexible supplemental transportation. The organization is dependent on volunteers and donations. The city was thanked for their monetary support over the past five years. Question was asked about its inception. The response was that they began service in 2011 and have been in Carver County since October of 2014. How many residents used the service was not available. Several residents of the city volunteer. Use of private vehicles is used and mileage reimbursement is submitted. It was pointed out that all volunteers submit reimbursement requests. The majority of the destinations are for medical appointments. Other activities would include food shelf trips and attending social activities. There is always a call for volunteers. The WeCab was thanks by the council for their work and service.

Carver Fire Department

The Carver Fire Department on their Facebook page extended congratulations to Fire Marshal/Firefighter Ryan Gill for the city's recognition of 2018 part-time Employee of the Year. They further state that Ryan has transformed the Fire Marshal position for the city and



prepared Carver for their rapid growth plan. He enjoys organizing the station. It was the department's statement that "We are fortunate to have Ryan on staff for us."

Organization Representation

The council reviewed the drafted resolution regarding organization appointments. Open positions were discussed. The council representation proposed was Kristy Mock, Acting Mayor, Heritage Preservation Commission Southwest Transportation Alliance and the Township Fire Board; Laurie Sayre, Parks Commission and Carver County Leaders; Glen Henry, Planning Commission and Courtney Johnson, South West Transit Board, Fire Relief Trustees', District 112 Community Leaders and Regional Council of Mayors. The City Manager, Brent Mareck was the second representative for the Fire Relief Trustees. The Electronic Fund Transfer Authority: Brent Mareck. The two organizations to be determined representing were the second council member on the Township Fire Board and the Carver Business Council. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution for organization appointments. The City Attorney named was Larry Harries. The city's official newspaper is the Chaska Herald.





The picture, above, of the card is an English Victorian era Valentine card and is located in the Museum of London.



Almanac Trivia Information

Did you know that January was named for the Roman god Janus, protector of gates and doorways? Janus is depicted with two faces, one looking into the past, the other into the future. February comes from the Latin word februa, which means "to cleanse." The month was named after the Roman Februalia, which was a monthlong festival of purification and atonement.

 $Did \ you \ know \ or \ do \ you \ know \ the \ meaning, history \ and \ folklore \ of \ Ground \ Hog \ Day?$

Will the groundhog see his shadow this year? What is the meaning of Groundhog Day – and why do we celebrate weather predictions form a plump marmot? When Is Groundhog Day 2019? Groundhog Day always falls on February 2nd. This traditionally marks the midpoint between the winter solstice and spring equinox.

What is the connection to the Weather to Ground Hog Day? Around this time, farmer needed to determine when to plat their crops, so they tried to forecast whether there would be an early spring or a lingering winter. Sunshine on Candlemas (February 2) was said to indicate the return of winter. Similarly, "When the wind's in the east on Candlemas Day, there it will stick till the 2^{nd} of May."

It was not held as a good omen if the day itself was bright and sunny. For that betokened snow and frost to continue to the hiring of the laborers six weeks later on Lady Day. If it was cloudy and dark, warmth and rain would thaw out the fields and have them ready for planting.

Our Groundhog Day is a remote survivor of that belief. According to legend, if a groundhog sees its shadow on this day, there will be six more weeks of winter, if it doesn't, then spring is right around the corner.

For centuries, farmers in France and England looked to a bear; in Germany, they kept their eye on the badger. In the 1800's, German immigrants to Pennsylvania brought the tradition with them. Finding no badgers there, they adopted the groundhog to fit the lore. Pennsylvania's Punxsutawney Phil has announced spring's arrival since 1887. Other groundhogs also have carried on the tradition, including Ontario's Wiarton Willie.

Though we recognize that animal behavior isn't the only way to judge planting dates, the tradition continues often with a wink and a smile.

So, will the groundhog see his shadow this 2019? It depends on whether February 2 is sunny or cloudy!






