Not only the family but the City of Carver is deeply saddened with the loss a former mayor who fought a diligent fight against a disease, leukemia. Greg Osterdyk's CaringBridge site stated, "After a nineteen-month battle of fighting Leukemia, Greg passed away from complications due to pneumonia."

Greg, an entrepreneur grew up in Shakopee, served on the city council before taking on the role of mayor. Had always been involved in the community since moving to Carver in 2005. During his residency, he served as the president of the Carver Lions, chairperson for the Steamboat Committee, president of the Homeowners Association for Carver Bluffs and involved with various local fundraisers.

Per Greg's website, his own words, "I have been a mayor, been in a near-death accident and started and closed a couple of businesses. You don't learn if you don't try." How many others did he inspire with those words?

Greg once told a reporter in an interview that his favorite quote was, "Everything happens for a reason." Deepest sympathies are extended to Lori and Sydney and their families.

Elm Drive Closure

Traffic Alert from the City of Carver relating to Elm Drive Closure which began July 22nd and will be closed for approximately four to six weeks.

"Construction activities are scheduled to begin in the Elm Drive area. Elm Drive will be closed during the construction, expected to last about 4 to 6 weeks. Access will be maintained to properties adjacent to the project during non-working hours. There will be times during the project in which access will be temporarily restricted due to construction activities. Residents are suggested to have vehicles parked on side streets off of Elm Drive on workdays prior to 7am to avoid access inconveniences."

Community Development Hgency

The city planner told the council about plans for Carver County Community Development Agency which is in the early stages of developing a concept of independent senior and multi-family apartments. The proposal would be located on property currently owned by the agency and is south of the Carver Crossing site. An open house for the project had been held. The next steps include reviewal by the Planning Commission and the city council.

The Planning Commissioners were introduced to information relating to the Community Development Agency's Apartment Concept proposal. The concept plan proposes general occupancy apartments and senior living apartments. The project is in line with the guidance of the Comprehensive Plan and allows for construction of additional units. An open house had been held.

Development Hyreements

The city attorney reviewed Development Agreements with the city. The attorney presented an overview including the general background, authority, purpose and specific issues to be addressed.

City Park Food Trucks

The council reviewed the letter from the city attorney concerning the consideration of licensing food trucks in city parks. The council has been reviewing the issue of licensing food trucks that would allow operations in a municipal parking lot of a city park. The proposed ordinance will continue to be discussed at a future meeting.

Mt Hope Road Parking

The city engineer reviewed the parking restrictions and widths on Mount Hope Road from downtown to Spring Creek Drive. The recommended parking restrictions proposal were based on widths, applicable codes and engineering standards. There was not any public comment at the meeting. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting additional parking restrictions along Mount Hope Road as presented.

Storm Water

The city engineer presented the overview of the 218 Storm Sewer Improvements for the Jonathan Carver Parkway coordination project. The presentation covered a summary, background, goals and current status, as well as the review of current options and the next steps in the project plans. Cost options will be discussed in the future.

The city held a Public Hearing regarding the Municipal Storm Water System where the city engineer presented information related to the annual meeting and the Municipal separate Storm Sewer System Permit. The purpose of the hearing was to inform the public of the impact stormwater discharges have on local water resources, offer the opportunity for input and give updates on compliance status. Question was asked about the MN Pollution Control Agency requesting input regarding the permit reissuance. Response was given that the information would be relayed prior to reissuance. Reissuance steps could change regarding permit. Expenses and reviewal of the rules were inquired about. The engineer relayed expenses incurred are to the city, developers and other parties involved. It is a five-year cycle for the rule reviewal. There was not any public input at the hearing.

Council member asked if the challenge for stormwater management involved news construction or existing developments. The city engineer stated that existing infrastructure presented the biggest challenge due to limited space and retrofitting solutions into these areas. The Public Services Director agreed with this assessment. The city manager requested conversation explaining day-to-day operations of stormwater ponds, inventories and inspection. The Public Services Department relayed working with GIS program keeping track of ponds. Annual inspections are tracked and different ponds inspected each year. Question was then asked about costs being retroactive or upfront costs. Costs are the result of not meeting standards. Inspections are rotated and work is done with the firm of Bolten & Menk.

2019 Bonds

Baker Tilly financial advisory firm representative presented information concerning the city's 2019 AB series bonds which included the basics of bonds, and specific details and the recommendations for Issuance of Bonds. In the past, the city manager contacted the mayor solely for acceptance or decline of a bond premium. The manager would not be able to contact each individual requesting a decision and this reasoning due to open meeting laws. There were further discussions on details on revenues and terminations. The city attorney stated that the city works with Briggs and Morgan for bond counsel and specialized opinion is required from a bond counsel. The city has worked with this firm for over forty years. Motions was made and carried with all ayes approving the resolutions providing for the competitive negotiated sale of General Obligation and Tax Increment Revenue Bonds Series amounts.

2019 Budget Hmendment

Balancing the General Fund Expenditures and Revenues required an adjustment to correct a mathematical error to the budget. The information pertaining to the 2019 proposed budget amendments were presented by the city manager. The items related to the proposal included the General Fund relating to building permit revenue, SouthWest Prime, Pay Grade Adjustments and the Street Maintenance Fund. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution amending the 2019 Budget.

Ironwood Park Expansion

The Parks Commission was given an overview by the city planning concerning the property identified as the Song Concept by Summergate. Part of this concept provides a possible opportunity for expansion of the Ironwood Park. The members discussed preferences towards a feature that could serve visitors to the park which are not available for organized recreational programs. They supported additional parking in the park. There was mention of a nature-based play area, a splash pad or an option of additional fields. Preference was voiced maintaining sight lines throughout the park.

Miscellaneous

The Public Services Department presented request for a new Kubota tractor to replace the older unit. The primary usage of the equipment involves winter use to run the Zamboni, run the weed spraying equipment maintaining the parks and levees and also used to operate some of the larger mowing equipment. The cost of the purchase had been planned for within the 2019 budget.

The Public Services Director with the council toured the Riverside Park area as he informed them of the damage caused by recent flooding. These repairs could be costly. Direction on proceeding will be sought from the council.

The council reviewed the discussion involving the annual 2020 Service Agreement for Joint Assessment with Carver County with services performed by the Carver County Assessor personnel. Increases were also reviewed.

The Carver County Water Management representative attended the Planning Commission meeting to present information pertaining to watersheds, management of land and how it affects water, water pollution, the roles of the Planning Commission, and water management tools.

Corridor Study

The representative from WSB & Associates presented background information relating to the Jonathan Carver Parkway Corridor Study. The city and the county had entered into an agreement to study Jonathan Carver Parkway between Highway 212 and County Road # 40. The purpose of the study was to identify the short, mid and long-term improvements along the corridor so as to address the transportation needs to the community for the next twenty years. The study also was expected to address the local supporting roadway network feeding into and parallel to the initial roadway. At the meeting their purpose was to update the council, provide an overview of the final plans presented for adoption and to discuss the next steps in the process. The final report contains an overview of the study objective and goals and processes to develop the plan.

The full report is available on the city's website for review.

Additional topics were discussed at the council meeting at length. Another topic touched on was the speed limits and changing the speed limit. Intersection changes will dictate how drivers on the corridor will adapt accordingly. In order to change a speed limit, a speed study would be required by the MN Department of Transportation. There is a potential with additional stopping and more urbanizations of the corridor that the study could change speed. Many factors are considered. Studies are conducted on operating speeds. Normally, what occurs is that a road construction project has a designed speed limit and when the project is completed, MNDOT would then conduct a study and evaluate it.

Question was asked whether the study would be updated when the 2016 statistics were made available. Response was given that when the data is available it would be looked at. Emergency personnel were talked to as part of the study, but that information was not included reflecting crashes that had occurred. The information had not differed from the information received from the sheriff's office. Three years of data is required in order to be accurate. The discussions relating to the Jonathan Carver Parkway does not adhere to that criteria. This transition period is almost over, therefore data should become available in a few months. Additionally, the county has a new county roadway safety tool and working with Bolten and Menk to produce the data when available. Continuous traffic counts are done every two years. The regional model is also being updated and will be launched reflecting updated forecasted numbers.

Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution approving the Jonathan Carver Parkway, County Highway 11, Corridor Study.

Facilities Rental Hyreement

The city clerk/treasurer presented a drafted facility rental agreement for council review and discussion regarding the drafted policy. The city will offer rental space in the new City Hall located in Carver's historic downtown area.

The facility includes Village Hall considered a community space with an outdoor patio area and a commercial kitchen and a small conference room. Additional rental availability would be the historic church. The Facility Rental Agreement would be a contract between the city and the rental party. The draft had been reviewed by the city attorney and the League of MN Cities Insurance Trust.

The use of alcohol was addressed in the agreement for discussion, if the city were to pursue allowance. This would require additional verbiage and options were presented in the drafted policy for discussion. The fee schedule would encompass fees involved for potential rental factions. As a way to streamline and provide consistency, categories are presented should the council choose different group ratings. This type of new structuring would eliminate the necessity for adding or removal with community growth. For comparison purposes, other community charges were also presented, along with possible fee options. Consideration for rental fee philosophy should be included in decision for fee setting. Several pricing strategies could also be utilized to include market matching, increase or decrease market strategies, promotion of community engagement, support of non-profits and different rates for differing assemblages.

The council further discussed the issue involving alcohol and insurance necessary. The liquor liability written into the agreements requires an amount combined single limit. Most of the current liquor license holders possess the said policy listing the city as an additional insured. If the liquor license holder is not in the city limits, the current ordinance requires change. This cannot be addressed in the Facility Rental Agreement. In the meantime, if alcohol were to be sold at facilities, requirement would be to either obtain a liquor license or work with an organization who qualifies. The city supported the general liability insurance where alcohol was to be served. They also supported serving of alcohol limited to the Village Hall rental. The drafted policy would reflect these changes accordingly. In addition to allowance of alcohol, a building monitor assignment would be necessary with authority.

The council also discussed proposed group structures and associated fees that would still need to be adopted by the city. The types of group structures were discussed with council consensus in agreement with definitions. Deposits and fees associated with group structuring were reviewed determining also a fee schedule.

Parks Master Plan

At their meeting the Pars Commission members reviewed the draft of the Parks Master Plan. They discussed former studies and maps that will be included in the Master Plan. The members were supportive of the direction of the drafted plan. They will continue to review the document in the future.

Park Gignage

The city planner presented information to the Parks Commission concerning uniform street design and consistency of design imprints throughout the city. Recent sign installations have been aged metal. Examples for identification purposes include historic Carver signs and the Carver sign at the intersection of Jonathan Carver Parkway and Levi Griffin Road. If the commission were supportive of changes there were examples for their review available. The city planner stated that as the park signs require replacement, they will be updated to match the metal signs. The consensus of the members supported having uniform signage throughout the community. Ironwood Park would be the first to receive the new sign.

Sixth Street

The council was updated by the city manage and the engineer regarding the necessity recently to close Sixth Street for repairs due to runoff of sediment during the recent storm. The engineer reported that there had been a clog in the pipe underneath the old railroad embankment. The developer had been working to unclog the pipe involving opening, exposing and breaking into the pipe to allow cleaning. During that time as the storm passed, sediment was allowed to run off onto the street impacting property owner already experiencing issues with drainage causing a short duration of closure on Sixth Street. The issue had been resolved. Question was posed if this repair would be enough to resolve the issue in the future. The engineer stated that the new culvert will be a big improvement over how operations had been working for many years. Easement discussions were also a result of the issue. The developer also was willing to work with the cleanup. The property owner will be involved in the process.

United Properties

The Planning Commission held a Public Hearing on the preliminary and Final Plat Rezoning for United Properties. The property is east of Meridian Fields and north of Carver Elementary anticipated to develop with commercial users. Question was asked if the roads utilized by the commercial use were typically managed by the city. The response given was that the streets would function under a business HOA and be privately maintained, but the city utilities will run below streets with easements over the utilities. Motion was made and carried with all ayes recommending approval of the Preliminary and Final Plat for the Carver Commons. Motion was made and carried with all ayes recommending approval of rezoning for Carver Commons.

Song Property Concept

The city planner presented the Planning Commission with the Concept Plan for the Song Property. This property currently is in Dahlgren Township requiring annexation before applications can go forward with the required planning processes. Proposal involves a mix of single-family homes, and townhome units. Due to the housing types request has been made to review the Planned Residential Development which allows deviation from the city's zoning code. The proposal does acclimate within the adopted range determined by the Comprehensive Plan.

Question was asked about the city's strategy to get from Jonathan Carver Parkway to County Road # 43. The city planner explained that Monroe Drive and Ironwood Drive are collectors and will serve as the traffic carriers. Dahlgren Road may connect in the future, but improvements would be necessary for that option.

Comment was made regarding Ironwood Drive being busy before and after school hours. Question was asked regarding the long-term plan from the county's standpoint regarding Jonathan Carver Parkway. The city planner responded that the growth area has been anticipated in the Jonathan Carver Parkway study. A stoplight will be at Monroe Drive and Jonathan Carver Parkway when the Carver Commons area is developed providing traffic relief. Question was asked regarding added growth impacts on city services. The Concept Plan is forwarded to city departments providing continuous input throughout the process. An additional question was asked regarding whether or not a traffic study would be required. The city planner stated that the Comprehensive Plan identifies Monroe and Ironwood Drives as collector roads. In addition, the Environmental Assessment Worksheet includes a traffic component which has this traffic information.

Commissioner inquired about park plans. Ironwood Park expansion has been contemplated for quite some time. An additional park space at Ironwood Park has been discussed along with reconfiguring the fields. More details will be developed as they work through the process. The ravine in the area is being reviewed for a potential nature-based trail.

Carver Business Hlliance

The Carver Business Alliance, Carver business group meets every third Friday of the month at 8 AM at the Carver Place. Anyone owning a business in Carver is welcome. The next scheduled meetings are August 16th and September 20th.

Hawthorne Ridge

The Planning Commissioners were presented with the Final Plat for Hawthorne Ridge. This development includes eighty-one singlefamily home sites. The majority of the site is steep slopes with mature trees that will be preserved.

There is a dedicated private park and discussion was held on its location. Question was asked whether or not there would be a path to the park. Question was asked regarding sidewalk connection with the existing development. Confirmation was given that the connection would be from Spring Creek. Motion was made and carried with all ayes recommending approval of the Final Plat for Hawthorne Ridge.

The Eastern Carver County School Board approved the November Referendum with three questions on the ballot, November 5th.

"These three questions address enrollment growth and funding needs necessary to provide the educational experience each student needs and deserves."

Question 1: An operating levy increase to help bridge our budget gap, continue the strong academic preparation of our students, prevent cuts to programs and services, maintain class sizes and manage growing enrollment.

Question 2: A bond request to build a new elementary school on district-owned land in Chaska, address deferred maintenance needs across the district and build a larger bus garage on a new site. Question 2 can pass only if Question 1 is approved.

Question 3: A no-tax increase renewal of our existing security and technology levy, which supports school security systems, technology for students and staff, and related professional development and support.

"Chair Tim Klein said. "We've been reviewing information for the past several months to help us determine what level of community support we need to keep our schools strong, and these three questions are the result of that analysis."

The decision to proceed with a referendum was based on months of study, input and research to manage growing enrollment and address aging buildings, budget pressures and academic needs. Contributing factors include state funding that has not kept pace with inflation for more than 15 years, enrollment projected to grow by 1,400 students in the next five years, maintenance needs across the district that far exceed the capital funding provided by the state and the need to maintain school security and technology systems.

If all three questions are approved, the average homeowner (\$350,000 home) would see a tax increase of \$36 per month. Without approval, the district will have to make cuts that will impact all areas of the district, from class size, program offerings, facilities maintenance, and school security. "

Also, for anyone interested, "all Kindergarten through 5th grade students will be invited to meet their new teacher and complete a brief learning assessment during a thirty-minute *Connect & Assess* meeting on August 27 or 28.

Families will find out the name of your child's teacher in early August. At that time, you will also receive information about how to schedule the *Connect & Assess* appointment for your child(ren) using an online scheduling system.

What is Connect & Assess?

Students and their parents/guardians will have the opportunity to connect one-on-one with their child's teacher and meet other school staff. This begins a positive school-home relationship.

Teachers will assess each student to learn about them as a learner/reader to gather some baseline information to begin personalized instruction as soon as the first day of school. These are not tests of ability or intelligence. Kindergarten students will take early-learning assessments in math and literacy.

Grades 1-5 will complete a benchmark reading assessment to determine a child's instructional literacy level.

Families can drop off school supplies, pay for lunch, and complete or return school forms during this visit.

The Future of Jonathan Carver Parkway

Construction Planned for 2021 By: City of Carver

A plan for the future of Jonathan Carver Parkway, also known as Carver County Road 11, has been developed after two years of meeting. The process also included several community open house events. The City Council identified the need to study the future of Jonathan Carver Parkway during a strategic planning session. The City of Carver and Carver County shared the cost of the study.

After several months of investigation and feedback, a recommenddation has been made for several improvements along the corridor. First, to expand to four lanes from 6th Street West to Levi Griffin Road. Second, construct a second pedestrian underpass. The pedestrian underpass would be located north of Carver Elementary, eliminating the need for students to cross Jonathan Carver Parkway at Ironwood Drive.
