Mount Hope Cemetery

The staff and the city clerk reviewed the rules and regulations ordinance pertaining to the Mount Hope Cemetery. Several changes were had been adopted to manage the process. Working with managing the cemetery, it was discovered that additional modifications are necessary to meet legal requirements. The following items were reviewed involving sale and transfer of sites, conduct within the cemetery, interments and disinterment, conditions of cemetery site purchases, site purchases, transfer of sites, decent of graves, monuments, flat or upright, permanent care, flowers, adornments and landscape improvements, general provisions and

The council reviewed rules and regulations pertaining to Mount Hope Cemetery. The adoption of the ordinance relating to amending the chapter section relating to cemeteries, adoption of resolution amending rules and regulations relating to the operation of the cemetery and adoption of a resolution authorizing summary publication of the ordinance were all discussed by the council and the City Clerk at the council meeting. Staff has reviewed the issue relating to operation and submitted recommendation for several adoption of changes to assist in managing of the cemetery. Working with the cemetery has constituted additional modifications for managing and meeting legal requirements. These items were reviewed recently. Additionally, adoption of the ordinance to amend the City Code relating to cemeteries is also required.

Service Recognition

Councilmember Glen Henry was recognized for his twelve years of service as a Council Member. Mike Webb and Jim Weygand both shared memories serving with him and thanks him for his service and commitment to the city. Other council members each shared their appreciation of his service. The council presented Mr Henry with an Honorary "Key to the City."

Service Award

The Greg Osterdyk Community Service Award was announced at the council meeting. The mayor, Lori and Sydney Osterdyk presented the 2022 Service Award to the Carver Fire Relief Association. The award was named after Greg, former mayor who was incredibly involved with community service. The Fire Relief Association was recognized for their efforts coordinating and hosting a fundraising event, sharing the proceeds from that event with the families of two retired firefighters who passed away last year. Additionally, the hours of volunteer hours to host the annual Fire Department Open House is a testament to their mission to serve their community.

Fire Department

The conversation relating to the purchase of a tanker truck from the City of Waconia was reviewed at the council meeting. Motion was made and carried with all ayes approving the purchase of the tanker truck. Question was asked if there were any concerns about the age of the truck. The Fire Chief and Assistance both stated that it was their opinion that the vehicle had been well taken care of and it was the best valued equipment seen recently for sale. Safety upgrades were asked about. Automatic slack adjusters plus seats with integrated shoulder and lap belts could be added. The replacement costs were reviewed.

County Road #40

The council reviewed the County Road # 40 Turnback Agreement County personnel and the city engineer regarding the acceptance agreement with the county for the turnback of county state aid highway forty to the City of Carver.

Question was asked about when the city would discuss plans for seal coating and reclamation. Those discussions could begin immediately. The city will have the funds for the project by the time the agreement is in place. Comment was made that the city may want to rescope the effort and conduct some maintenance putting aside funds for other projects. The engineer stated that the reclamation could be postponed but the city might wish to consider how at ease they are with the degree of deterioration before the reclamation is done. Inquiry was made about acquisition of additional easements with the annexation process. The engineer stated that the annexation is for the portion of the road on the western portion. The city limits straddle the road and the city cannot bring in a road unless it is completely within the city boundaries. In order to bring that half of the road into the city limits, the city must go through a paperwork exercise brining that portion of the road into city limits. Another inquiry asked, "Does the annexation include only the road, or does it include any of the properties in that area? The assistant engineer responded that the county indicated that the right of way is county owned. Therefore, the only process is to annex the property into the city. The culvert on the east side is Chaska owned culvert. Funds usage was discussed. The Public Services has been planning for this action. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution authorizing execution of a turnback acceptance agreement with Carver Country for the County Sate Aid Highway

HDH Transition Plan

The Assistant City Engineer discussed the Americans with Disabilities Transition Plan with the council. This ADA act consists of five titles outlining protections. They are Employment, State and Local government services, public accommodations, telecommunications and Miscellaneous Provision Title II involving programs, activities and services public entities provide. As a provider of public transportation services and programs the city must comply with this section of the Act as it specifically applies to public service agencies. "Title II of ADA provides that, "...no qualified individual with a disability shall, by reason of such disability, be excluded from participation in or be denied the benefits of the services, programs, or activities of a public entity, or be subjected to discrimination by any such entity." The city conducted a self-evaluation of its facilities within public rights-of-ways and has developed this Transition Plan which details ensuring that all facilities are accessible to all individuals. The drafted plan was posted conducting a thirty-day public outreach opportunity allowing individuals to comment on the drafted plan and there not any comments received. The ADA deficiencies identified within the plan will be addressed as funding allows by programming ADA improvements into future capital improvement plan projects. The plan contemplates an implementation goal of correcting the noted deficiencies within thirty years.

Emergency Well Repairs

The Public Services personal acknowledged to the council that emergency well repairs performed at the Community Park. Discovery was made that the well was non-operational. Repairs were scheduled and an inspection performed. The items relating to failure were reviewed. Well components have been replaced, tested and working properly. Repair costs exceeded the regular purchasing authority however the repairs were deemed to be immediately necessary. Per requirements all procedures were followed and the council notified.

South West Prime / Prime MD

The Community Development Direction discussed the issue of the SouthWest Prime/Prim MD agreement. The city has been partnering with SW Transit for SW Prime services since 2019. Ridership has increased annually and there was a high demand for Prime in 2022. The city increased the original budget for services in 2022. Costs of those rides was reviewed. The proposed contract covers daily trips for errands or job transportation throughout the Prime area, as well as trips to the airport. The council had reviewed and enters into an agreement with SW Transit for a service identified as Prime MD which additionally serves Carver. Prime MD provides service to hospitals and clinics for non-emergency trips with the current service area, as well as select locations outside of the SW service area. The cost to ride the Prime MD proposes to increase cost per ride. The city attorney reviewed the contract. Prime and Prime MD are both included in the 2023 budget with an allocation but based on recent increases proposed, the budget is not anticipated to cover current demand for ridership. The council was recommended to discuss direct on updated cost per ride, along with the 2023 budget.

The council reviewed the SouthWest Prime Service Agreements for Prime Services and Prime MD agreements. The impact of these services on the 2023 budget were reviewed as far as cost associated with the contracts. Additional information was requested from SouthWest regarding the services for the airport and Prime edge for future discussions. Motion was made and carried with all ayes approving an agreement with SouthWest Transit for Prime MD. Motion was made and carried with all four ayes and one nay adopting the SouthWest Prime Service Agreement excluding the airport service and Prime Edge Service.

Zoning Ordinance

The Community Development Director presented an overview on the Zoning Ordinance reviewed and enforced by the Planning Commission board. A working draft of revisions for section of Zoning Code articles was being reviewed and discussed presently. The director went through the significant changes in the working draft. Staff is continuing to work through revisions that they discussed. Project updates were also discussed. These included Rier Wild Learning Center, Net Steps Learning Center, Getaway Motor Café and Mizzy's Pizza. Residential developments also underway are Brookeview, The Preserve, and Timber Creek. Also reviewed were the Jonathan Carver Parkway Improvement Project, Sixth Street West Project, and the Ironwood Park Expansion Project all projects which the Planning Commission has input on.

The Community Development Director discussed with the Planning Commission members the Zoning Ordinance Update Part II. Tools are available in the zoning ordinance tasked with administrating. Staff would provide an overview of the review, application and administration of planning processes that the commission collectively utilize it. Topics to be included to be covered include Variances, Conditional Use Permits, Planned Residential Districts, and Planned Commercial Development Overlay District. These should be reviewed and prepared for in the upcoming months for review and updates.

Vandalism

Request was submitted at the work session asking that the research be conducted by the staff for security options for vandalism occurring at the Lions Park. Suggestion was submitted for tree clearing for more visibility. Another option was community awareness. The issue will continue to be reviewed and discussed.

Timber Creek

The Planning Commission members reviewed the Timber Creek Phase III/Final Plat discussions. The property is located generally south of Meridian Fields and west of Copper Hills. Property consists of approximately one hundred sixty-one acres. The background of the staging of the development was reviewed by the Planning Commission for recommendations for Phase III of their Final Plat in Timber Creek. Phase I reviewed included sixty-eight single family homes. Many permits have been issued while the neighborhood is taking shape west of the elementary school. As of January, 2023 Phase III includes forty single family lots. The total lots through the planning process are up to two-hundred thirty-one of the total three hundred forty-nine lots in the development. Timber Creek is anticipated to bring two to three more phases through the Final Plat process consistent with the approved Preliminary Plat. The staff's recommendation was approval of the Final Plat for Phase II of Timber Creek.

Carver Levy

The council briefly reviewed the status of the Carver Levy process. Currently the council is working with Hud on grant terms and environmental review. Requests are to be submitted to the State of Minnesota for bonding funds as there were no bonds in 2022. Items being pursued include Levee Work Plan Goals, Project Communications and Engagement, Geotechnical Evaluations, Topographic Survey, Preliminary Design Configuration, Construction Limits and Property Impacts and Refined Costs. 2023 Street Improvement Project

The Assistant and City Engineer both presented details regarding the 2023 Street Improvement Project ongoing at the work session meeting of the city council. The original scope of the project included mill and overlay of streets in the River Oak development as well as reclamation of Fourth Street. The city opted to delay the reclamation of Fourth Street until 2024 so that construction traffic would not impact the new pavement on Fourth Street. The item was reviewed again by the council for authorization of plans and specifications.

The Assistant City Engineer discussed the 2023 Street Improvements Projects with the council. Reviewal of the motion to authorize the preparations of Plans and Specifications was reviewed. Currently the city owns and maintains approximately twenty-seven miles of local streets within the city. Existing streets continue to age and new streets added to the system. It is important to follow a systematic approach to street maintenance extending permanent life as long as possible until major construction efforts are required. The council has recognized this need and adopted its first Pavement Management Plan. This is the second year of initiating that plan. The 2023 Plan identifies Fourth Street from Jonathan Carver parkway to Elm Drive West as a reclamation, the River Oaks neighborhood streets south of Fourth Street requiring mill and overlay, while Monroe Drive requires seal coat. At a work session the council reviewed current cost estimates for these projects. After review of current financials, constructability benefits and guidance provided, the decision was made to defer the Fourth Street reclamation to 2024. This would be completed in conjunction with the remaining mill and overlay of the River Oaks neighborhood already programmed in the 2024 plan. The next step in the process is to prepare final plans and specifications for the projects. The general proposed schedule outline includes authorization of preparation of Plans and Specifications, Project Design approx.imately March 2023, approve plans and specs, order advertising of bidding, April 2023, award contracts and construction approximately fall of 2023. These projects would be funding utilizing a combination of City Street Maintenance Funds, Municipal State Aid Funds, and Municipal Utilities Enterprise Funds. Costs were discussed in length.

Utility Billing

The Finance Director discussed and presented at a work session proposed changes to the utility billings including minor cosmetic changes, enhancements, calculation changes and communication plans.

Organization Resolution

The council meeting was led with the City Manager discussing the 2023 appointments for Acting Mayor and other various boards appointments. Final decision of discussion included, Acting Mayor: Kristy Mock, Heritage Preservation Commission: Kristy Mock, Parks Advisory Group: Courtney Johnson, Planning Commission: Erk Perschmann, Carver County Leaders: Laurie Sayre and Erik Perschmann, SouthWest Transit Board: Joy McKnight and Laurie Sayer, Carver Business Alliance: Courtney Johnson, District 112 Community Leaders: Courtney Johnson, Regional Council of Mayors: Courtney Johnson, Carver Fire Relief Association: Courtney Johnson & Brent Mareck City Attorney: Dave Anderson Official Newspaper: Chaska Herald Electronic Fund Transfer Authority: Lynn Tschudi City's Official Depository: Old National Bank City Investments: Northland Securities, USB Financial Services, and PMA Financial Network/Securities, Inc. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the Organization Resolution appointing members to government entities representation.

2023 Legislative Priorities.

The City Manager discussed with the council the 2023 Legislative Priorities. A motion was necessary to adopt the priorities which is an annual process conducted by the council for impending legislative session. Once adopted, the priorities are communicated to the appropriate representative and senator. The legislative issues identified in 2023 are identical to those as in 2022 with the exception of regulations for THC cannabinoid products.

City Of Carver

The City of Carver has a recreation partnership for programming and resident rates at Chaska recreational facilities. Carver residents are eligible for resident rates at the Community Center, Curling Center, Town

Three Rivers Full Moon Program

Have you ever heard about Three Rivers Park District's "Under the Full Moon Program"? Me, neither. It's a popular program offered in several parks in the southwest metro the article said. Researching the topic, it appears Baylor Park is not part of Three Rivers Park but Gale Woods, and



Carver Park are. Didn't know that. (www.threeriversparks.org – for full list of parks available).

Moving on, article stated that the park district is returning with one ifs most popular programs, "Under the Full Moon". What does this mean? It says it offers individuals the chance to explore winter sights and sounds under the light of the beautiful full moon at various parks. Makes sense, doesn't it? According to the park's Director of Outdoor Education and Recreation, Ms Wendy Weirich, says that this program, "...the full moon program is one of the park district's oldest and most beloved programs." Well, you can't go wrong now, can you? Nature, night serenity, peace, beauty, nature at its finest, solitude etc.

She went on to say, "...park district offers the program every month, even during the summer season and that the program is a more unique experience in the winter. We do it every month in different places..."

"Just imagine how quiet it is in the snow at night as opposed to walking in the night in summer where there's a chorus of insect songs, but in winter, it's peace. People may have never experienced that level of silence before. The insulating qualities of the snow actually insulates the sound so that part is the really interesting experience."

Weirich added that because it is so quiet at night in the winter, people's senses become more aware.

"Since you can't see great at night your other senses become more amplified. Your hearing really tunes in," she said. "You begin to really pay attention to how your feet sound on the snow and it's a really amazing sensory experience."

Weirich also said that it's a great time for visitors to participate in the full moon program because it gives them an opportunity to observe wildlife who thrive during the winter.

"This is the season that the owls are in their breeding season, so you can hear owls calling and flying at night in the woods," she said. "Hearing the owls' calling is a pretty magical experience late at night in the woods."

Weirich encourages all those who are interested in learning more about nature in the dark or who just want to do winter activities like snowshoeing or kick sledding to register for a program.

"People are always looking for these divergent things to do with their families and a lot of people are looking for those types of things in the beginning of the year," she said. "When you go to a program like this you meet other kindred spirits. There's a social quality to it that you might find a new friend."

Weirich said equipment will be provided for each respective full moon program.

"Just dress for the weather because we do not know what the weather may bring," she said. "Just be comfortable and be ready to walk. The pace is pretty slow because we want to be able to hear things, and bring your adventurous spirit."

The Under the Full Moon program is offered in the following Three Rivers southwest metro parks: Carver Park Reserve, Cleary Lake Regional Park and Murphy-Hanrahan Park Reserve.

Cost of the program is \$6 and reservations are required. There is a 20% discount for groups of four or more.


