# Mayor Courtney's Message

As the days get longer and the weather warmer, you know summer is on its way. I've got another bunch of updates to share this month. Make sure you read all the way through because I'm keeping the best for last!

6th Street Project Completion – If you remember, the first layer of blacktop along 6th Street West was laid a few days before Thanksgiving last fall. Now, crews are working finish this project, which includes adding the final layer of blacktop, curb improvements, striping and a few other finishing touches. We're anticipating the work will be complete by mid-June, weather permitting.

2024 Budget Kickoff – It's that time of year again. At our June 5 Work Session City staff, Council and I will begin working on the City's 2024 Budget. Our work will continue throughout the summer and fall, working toward deadlines of Sept. 29 for the preliminary levy, a "not to exceed" number for the 2024 Budget, and Dec. 18 for the final 2024 Budget.

Juneteenth Holiday – Due to the Juneteenth holiday, City Hall will be closed on Monday, June 19. Our second City Council meeting of the month will take place on Monday, June 26 at 7 p.m. at City Hall.

Farmers Market – The third annual Carver Farmers Market will return to Carver Station (1607 Hartwell Drive) on Tuesdays from 3 – 6 p.m. starting June 20 and running through Sept. 26. The City of Carver partners with the SouthWest Metro Chamber of Commerce for the Farmers Market. For more information, including vendor details, check out @CarverMnFarmersMarket on Facebook.

Levee and Legislative Update – One of the last things our State elected officials accomplished last month before the close of the 2023 Legislative Session was passing a Bonding Bill. I am excited to share the City of Carver was included and will receive \$6M for the Levee Improvement Project. This is the largest amount the City has received to date and it brings the total we've received on the estimated \$12M project to \$8.8M. To say I'm excited about this is an understatement! This money will allow us to begin construction on the Levee Improvement project, which could begin as soon as next year. A huge thanks to Rep. Jim Nash, who although Carver is no longer in his district, understands the importance of modernizing Carver's aging infrastructure and has continued to advocate on behalf of our Levee Improvement Project.

# City Events

At a council work session the City Attorney discussed the drafted ordinance regarding regulating large event with in the city. The council discussed additional staff direction pertaining to the language in the ordinance. Events occurring in the city limits require to expend significant public resources such as special services, road closures, parking accommodations and insurance coverage. These events also impact overall health, safety, and welfare of the community which can be both, positive and negative. Therefore, it was identified as a priority to develop an ordinance regulating city events within the city's strategic plans. Many sources have collaborated in the creation of the drafted ordinance to include the language, provisions for permits or licenses required. The language authorizes the city to impose reasonable conditions and permits were supplemental providing transparency and clarity. Consensus was recommended to move forward with the drafted document, staff to finalize and adoption at a future meeting.

# County Road #40 Corridor Planning

The City Manager provided previous discussions at a work session meeting pertaining to the former County Road # 40 Corridor Planning discussions. There were discussions held pertaining to the process of forming a Task Fork, objectives for such a force and proposed study schedule. The Community Development Direction provided information relating to the infrastructure trunk service area updates. Sharing information with affected areas would be one of the next phases to be pursued. Along with commitments from developers and to continue to explore options dependent upon developer interest and commitment.

# Solicitation Ordinance

The drafted ordinance relating to discussions for peddlers, solicitors, transient merchants and mobile food units were discussed with the City Attorney at a work session. Additional feedback from the council would be incorporated in the drafted document, as well. Adoption of said ordinance would also be reviewed.

The City Attorney and the council discussed the drafted ordinance for solicitation within the city at great length. The current ordinance imposes few regulations and lacks critical necessary language for ample enforcement. Additionally, currently regulations are limited with some businesses being inherently different from traditional transient merchants. Recommendation was submitted for a separate set of regulations specific only to them. As a result the drafted document updated business regulations pertaining to peddlers, solicitors, transient merchants, and mobile food units to provide for the meaningful regulation of these businesses. The proposed ordinance incorporates important code updates and standards for said parties defining specifics to each. Due to the challenging word regulations, a final drafted ordinance for consideration of adoption along with resolution for authorized publications was being presented for the council's input.

The final drafted ordinance regarding solicitation was presented to the council at their meeting for adoption. Motion was made and carried with all ayes approving the ordinance amending the chapter regarding Peddlers, Solicitors, Transient Merchants and Mobile Food Units. Motion was made and carried approving the resolution authorizing publication of the ordinance relating to solicitation in the city.

# Trail System

The Community Development Director indicated to the council at their meeting that the city had received a Statewide Health Improvement Program Grant. The money received installed signs throughout the city highlighting Carver's trail system. These signs also include a QR code linked to the city's website and a full trail map with details. There are six trail loops identified. Maps are also available at City Hall. Information will be included om the city's newsletter as well as social media.

# Federal Grant

The City Engineer and the Assistant City Engineer discussed the certified levee project which the council reviewed the information at their council meeting. The mayor emphasized that although the amount was huge, the city had a long way to go to get the project started. The engineer pointed out that it is still not enough to start a construction project and have already applied for the 2024 Federal funds for another funding opportunity. Motion was made and carried with all ayes authorizing execution of the FY 2022 Community Project Funding Grant Agreement with the Us Department of Housing and Urban Development for the Levee Improvement Project.

# Lift Station

The Public Services Direction provided updates on the Oak Street Lift Station. There was damage to pumps. The situation was assessed, discussed and researched. New pumps to replace the two pumps were the recommendation received. The council reviewed the quotes received. A loaner pump had been installed temporarily. Warranties and life spans for these pumps was discussed. The lift station on Oak Street was determined to have more daily start-ups than other locations which is hard on the pumps. Additionally, this site services a larger area. The council discussed the topic to great length. Motion was made and carried with all yes approving the quote to MN Pump Works.

# Municipal State Hid Street System

The Assistant City Engineer reviewed the Municipal State Aid Street System revision with the council at their meeting. Adoption of the resolution establishing aid was up for council review. This system had been established in 2021. This was triggered by the city surpassing the population threshold. The program is to assist in construction and maintenance of their street system. The funding is generated by the State's Highway Users Tax Distribution and allocated based on population and system miles. As a part of the system maintenance, annual reviews are done by the city engineer who certifies current street mileage, along with revising routes within the system as required to optimize needs and funding. The system revision proposed currently involves adding County Road # 40 to the city's aid system. This agreement was recently executed with the county. Noteworthy value is that turnback routes are unique in that they can be added by the city and do not count against its allowable mileage added to their system. Turnback routes are tabulated above and beyond the rest of the city's street system, causing no impact on the remainder of the system that is currently in place. Upon receipt from the Commissioner of Transportation after submittal of the city's signed resolution for this system revision, the city engineer will include this route in the 2023 State Aid needs calculation. Then the route will be reflected int eh 2024 State Aid funding allocation to the city.

The Assistant City Engineer provided the council with the Municipal State Aid Program map revision and reviewed the topic at their meeting. Motion was made and carried adopting the resolution establishing Municipal State Aid Streets within the City of Carver.

# Long-Term Financial Plan

The Finance Director was at the work session with the council to discuss the Kick-Off Plan update for the Long-Term Financial Plan. The purpose to refresh the council on the plan and guidance moving forward. Topics covered included biggest challenge of the plan, staff observations and comments.

# Public Utilities Emergency Response Plan

The concept for this plan resulted from an emergency water pressure issue experienced in the city. The item was discussed at a work session with the City Manager. Debriefing identified the need for stronger response protocols.

An Emergency Response Plan was formulated by the utilities team. Reviews were conducted among personnel throughout the city.

# *Annual Water Report*

The council discussed the annual water report. The strategic plan included the development of a Water Guide for residents. The guide included frequently asked questions., bill information, meter reading, conservation tips and the like. This guide was then forwarded to the council. The information circulated by several means. Feedback will be incorporated into an updated version.

# Carver Creek Place

The owner of the property at Carver Creek Place discussed the situation with the council at their meeting. The owner provided background and circumstances related to present dilemma. Owner expressed concern regarding the demolition of the structure. Plea was made to allow selling the owner to interested party who would complete construction. The city attorney's response related to the litigation whereas the city was authorized to demolish the structure. Ample time had been provided due process and a meaningful opportunity to dispute any issues throughout the proceedings. It was not prudent for the council the litigation at the meeting. The property owner was directed to contact the attorney directly.

At the council meeting the council reviewed and discussed the Demolition Contract Award presented. Council action required was the award and approval of the contract in stated amount to Don and Wayne Excavation for the demolition of the abandoned hazardous structure at Carver Creek Place which the city has been working to abate the abandoned hazardous structure. Under MN Statutes the city was authorized legal proceedings pursuing a court order effective in February. Authorization for demolition was given in May. Property owners were notified to remove personal property required to be removed before the end of May. Several quotes were received. Initially demolition costs would be paid by the city and then subsequently assessed against the property.

# Main Street

The council discussed a speeding issue and an altercation with an angry speeder on Main Street. The council was put on notice of the continued speeding issue on the street. The area of main concern involved the western end down to Broadway. There is a steady stream of vehicles, long with speeding vehicles. Law enforcement in the past have handled this situation relatively satisfactorily. However, as of the late the speeding has worsened. Request was submitted for additional police presence and longer-term solution. The issue would be addressed. Calling 911 was encouraged. An increased presence would be requested from Broadway to Hickory along Main Street.

Mizzy's Pizza
The council discussed Mizzy's Pizza grant application. A resolution authorizing the application was necessary to the Carver County Community Development Agency. The CDA has a grant program called the Community Growth Partnership Initiative for projects within the county. The grant encompasses redevelopment, community development and affordable housing. During the planning process, the grant had been discussed as a potential funding source for municipal utilities fees and infrastructure for the project. The city is required to be the applicant to the CDA acting as a conduit for the grant funds. There is no financial commitment required. It was recommended that the city authorize the application.

# Maintenance Expectations

The City Manager reviewed with the council maintenance expectations throughout the city. Riverside Park was one issue touched upon. The Parks Team held a meeting and there was a focus on community expectations regarding landscape areas within the city. Areas of discussion involved the roundabout on Jonathan Carver Parkway, the planting bed at Sixth Street and Broadway, planting bed at Broadway and Main by the tugboat, Levi Griffin Road, Monroe Drive, and the park playground areas. Weed free was a focus area with a 'front yard' standard ideology along the thought process of requiring seasonal help to maintain this standard. Maintenance expectations were discussed. Included in that discussion was labor hours per week to maintain the Riverside Park. The proposed mow plan would remove approximately seven and half acre of weekly maintenance. Ironwood Park mowing area is approximately nine and half acres. The proposed plan would maintain campsites, archery, boat landing, parking lot and an entrance road safety strip of turf grass standards. The remainder grow to its natural habitat. Labor could be cut seventy-five percent, leaving time saved dedicated to maintenance of featured landscape and playground areas. "No Mow" area is subject to regular flooding, leaving uneven ground and erosion issues and vehicle vandalism to turf. "No Mow" area has preliminary grant funding to be restored to native prairie and habit in the next one to three years. Councilmember feedback stated that the Riverside Park is a gem in the community with further comments regarding the overgrowth and inability to maintain properly. Another councilmember was unaware of the park utilization. Discussion of Riverside park was lengthy as to maintenance. The mayor was aware of the utilization and maintenance of the park. The mayor's preference was time prioritization at more utilized parks and other landscaped areas. Another councilmember's comment related to the reality of flooding at Riverside Park. Particular investments have not been implemented due to this flooding. Support for the proposed maintenance expectations was expressed. Work would continue for signage I the park involving public understanding the "no mow" intentional areas. Efforts will also be made for communication efforts creating awareness of this maintenance plan.

# Juneteenth Holiday Observance

The council reviewed the topic of the Legislature considering moving up Juneteenth to officially begin in 2023 instead of 2024. The city cannot conduct business on this day as it will be considered a Federal Holiday. This action would also affect the regular council meeting scheduled for June 19<sup>th</sup>. The city attorney stated that this will create chaos due to the short timeframe. An amendment will be required if considered a paid holiday in the Employee Reference Manual. The council discussed rescheduling the council meeting and approving the amendment to the handbook.

The City Manager reviewed information regarding the Juneteenth Holiday. A bill had been established as a state-recognized holiday signed into law on February 3<sup>rd</sup> of this year. The holiday recognized the date which slavery was abolished in the United States. Public business cannot be conducted on June 19<sup>th</sup> in recognition of this holiday. The new law goes into effect on August 1<sup>st</sup>, 2023. However, a provision contained in both the House and Senate state government omnibus policy bills making the new holiday effective on June 19<sup>th</sup> of this year requiring observance.

The proposed action preemptively observe Juneteenth beginning on June 19th, 2023, in order to avoid any scheduling challenges. All the technicalities involving time, shifts etc were reviewed. Then the council reviewed the amendment to the Employee Handbook making Juneteenth a paid holiday for city employees.

# Bluff Road Reclamation

The City Manager discussed with the council the Bluff Road Reclamation Change Order. The city had adopted a Pavement Management Plan identifying street maintenance projects throughout the community along with a corresponding funding plan. The annual Street Maintenance Levy is the primary source for street maintenance projects. Previously, a bid was accepted. Since the project came in under engineer's estimate additional areas in need were considered. A section of Bluff Road was cited as a strong candidate for expedited maintenance. Bluff Road had been identified in the PMP for 2027. The area was reviewed and discussed. Determination was made sufficient funds were available for the Bluff Road repairs.

# Carver Preservation Award

The Heritage Preservation Commission members reviewed the two nominations for the Carver Preservation Award.

The information was reviewed by the commissioners and discussed, along with both submissions receiving the award. Motion was made and carried with all ayes awarding 417 Oak Street and 420 Broadway properties

the 2022 Carver Preservation award. The plaques will be made for each submitted property and the sign will be in the yard for six months. Congratulations to the winners!





East Union Elementary building sold to Southwest Metro Intermediate District 288.

"The building that once housed East Union Elementary will live on as an educational site. The school-district owned property, consisting of approximately eight gross acres with a 22,608 square foot elementary building in Carver, is being sold to Southwest Metro Cooperative District, ISD 288.

The plans for the building are to utilize it for K- 8 Level and four Special Education Programs for the eleven member district that serves many southwest metro area school districts including Eastern Carver County Schools.


