New Council Member – With Joy McKnight's resignation from City Council in August, Reid Welch was appointed last month to fill the remainder of this term, which runs through Dec. 31, 2024. Reid has previously served on Carver's Planning Commission and is on Carver County's Parks Board. Please join me in welcoming Council Member Welch!

Daylight Savings

Here we go again; daylight savings time and still no action from those 'um' what should we call them? I guess to be nice and fair, we'll just call them politicians and leave the derogatory comments in the box, huh? Yep, it's that time of the year again to turn the clocks back on hour. (Spring forward' fall back cliché) So when do we do that? Sunday, early morning, November 5th. We all know though, everyone does it the night before, Saturday, right? This is when the days get shorter and shorter until winter solstice on December 21st.

Did you know that that is the shortest day of the year. There is the constant discussion and hopes that the twice a year changing clock ritual will become a thing of the past? There was a bipartisan support in Congress to keep daylight savings time permanent as of March of this year but no action had been taken on that bill called Sunshine Protection Act of 2023. Go figure huh? Another bill was introduced in March which would give states the option to stay on daylight savings but that stalled. Again, go figure. Did you know that Hawaii and Arizona are the two, only two states who do not participate in daylight savings time? Last word was that in 2022 the US Senate passed legislation to make daylight savings time permanent in 2023. While the bill, dubbed the Sunshine Protection Act, was unanimously approved by the Senate, it stalled in the House of Representatives before expiring altogether. So here, we are, November 2023 and have to turn the clocks back still again. All derogatory remarks and opinions stifled for this editor. Feel free to think what you want. Everyone is entitled to their opinion.

New Councilmember

The newest addition to the City of Carver council is Reid Welch is not a complete stranger to civil service. According to the reporter from the Chaska Herald, Reid has served on the Planning Commission and is a member of the Carver County Parks and Recreation Commission. He also commented that it was sooner than he had anticipated to serve on the city council but the vacancy created the opportunity for him. Reid is a computer engineer and also has served on the Planning Commission Board for five years. He likes being involved as well as being a source of direction to be taken. His family supported his decision after discussing it with them. His goal he says, "I'm looking forward to more involvement with the city and trying to balance what is good for the city as a whole as the community continues to grow."





2024 Enterprise Fund Budgets

The Finance Director discussed with the council the purpose of Enterprise Funds which involved water, sewer and Storm Water funds in order to provide enough revenue sufficient to achieve the projected year-end cash balance to cover three months of operating expenses, the following year debt service payments and capital acquisitions, as well as reserves for future capital improvements. A good portion of the revenue from Enterprise Funds are the result of user charges which is why it is important that the city charges appropriate rates to achieve the targeted cash balance.

The city has been able to monitor utility rates for its Enterprise Funds by maintaining a five year long-term financial plan to complete future capital needs, growth assumptions and operation projections. The city has been working with Northland Securities to prepare a ten year financial plan the model rates. The draft of the plan displays rate increases for the 2024 budget. The drafted ten year plan was to be presented to the council. The annual fee schedule will be reviewed to include utility rates and connection fees. The Enterprise Fund Budgets will be considered for final adoption tentatively in December.

Storm Water Pollution Prevention Program

The Assistant City Engineer discussed the Storm Water Pollution Prevention Program with the council. A Public Hearing required to be held, as well. As part of the overall National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System/State Disposal System permit program, the City is permitted by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency to discharge storm water to waters of the state under the small Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) permit. As part of this permit, the City is required to develop, implement, and enforce a Storm Water Pollution Prevention Program with required control measures. Those measures were reviewed once again by the council with the engineer. One of those requirements was that the city must provide an opportunity annual for the public to provide input on the adequacy of the storm water program.

The Assistant City Engineer presented the council with proposed amendment to the zoning code pertaining to the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System Permit. The MN Pollution Control Agency updated rules within the permit necessitating changes to the city's Zoning Cod. The council will review the proposal and in the future consider adoption.

A Public Hearing was held for the Annual MS4 Permit. Assistant City Engineer provided necessary information for the annual requirement to develop, implement and enforce a Storm Water Pollution Prevention Program. A resident

Recommended providing a quick guide for residents and businesses detailing relevant information on the requirements.

The Assistant City Engineer discussed amended Zoning Code changes proposed to the Storm Water Pollution Program. Once again the history and requirements of the program were reviewed. Periodically the MPCA updates this permit which incorporates new rules. After the permit is updated, cities must apply for permit reissuance. Permit reissuance has been obtained by the city. As part of this reissuance the city must update their city code to comply with the new rules. Two articles that require updates include management and discharge detection and elimination. The Planning Commission held a Public hearing reviewing the proposed changes to the zoning code. There was not any public input at the hearing and the Planning Commission recommended adoption of the proposed changes to the zoning code. The council also reviewed the proposed changed.

City Council Hppointment

The City Manager provided information regarding the appointment process for City Councilor vacancy. Interviews were held. Five candidates were interviewed for the council vacancy. Five candidates for council vacancy position were thanked for their interest and time. Motion was made and carried with all ayes appointing Reid Welch to the vacant city council position through 2024.

Preliminary Levy

The Finance Director provided an overview of the 2024 Preliminary Levy to the council. The council has been in the which was reviewed at the council meeting after the staff did as requested. Clarification was also given regarding the Final health and dental insurance final costs. Updates will continue to flow in over the next few months as the information becomes available. The mayor was satisfied with the budget allowing the city to focus and begin concentrating on Strategic Planning items setting the community up for a good future and allowing to be financially strong. Once again, the Preliminary Levy cannot be raised once accepted. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution certifying the 2024 Preliminary Levy.

Miscellaneous

Councilors extended thanks to the city staff and Public Services for all their support for Steamboat Days. It was a great event. Any suggestions can be forwarded to <u>steamboating@yahoo.com</u>. Thanks and appreciation, if not Mucho gratitude to the Steamboat Days Committee was also announced at the meeting.

Motor Café Getaway were presented the Heritage Preservation Commission Award. The award was presented personally to Nate, Terah and Johnnie Roise at the Getaway Motor Café located at 120 Broadway. What is the Carver Heritage Preservation Award you ask? It is to recognize and award a project that exemplifies the preservation and restoration of a structure in the **Carver Historic District.**



The mayor stated that since Highway 212 is now fully funded, the group, Big Four are focusing on Highway 5 through Victoria, Chanhassen and Waconia, along with 82nd Street in Chaska and Chanhassen. There is a fly in to Washington DC promoting transportation funding for Carver County. The mayor participated in last year's fly in. The mayors met in St Joseph. Over the last four years the Mayor's Association Annual Conference has had to be cancelled. The association is attempting to find alternatives for group meetings.

The council reviewed the Prosecution Agreement with the Carver County Attorney to be considered for adoption.

Southern Valley Alliance Executive Director was at the council meeting relating information and statistics involving domestic violence services provided by the organization. October is considered Domestic Violence Awareness Month also.

The Community Development Director provided updates to the council regarding the grant project with Green River Greening for Creekside park. A preconstruction meeting had been held. Thirtysix trees in the creek area will be removed. The technique will be used involving reinstallation of trees along the creek bed to help with erosion control. The council requested information be shared via social media and the city's website.

The Parks Advisory Group had a meeting. The Parks Master Plan, park dedication funds and the future parks maintenance fund were all looked at by the group. City of Chaska representative, Erin Link was also at the meeting to discuss the recreation agreement Carver has with the City of Chaska. The group was off to a good start.

Water Treatment Plant Filter

The Assistant City Engineer discussed with the council the water treatment plant filter # 2 Diagnostic work. The council reviewed a motion to accept the quote from Magney Construction for contracted services for the filter plant exploration work. Recently, expansion on the water treatment plant was completed. The expansion included gravity filters, existing filters which were not rehabilitated as part of this plant project. It was recently observed failures with the existing filters. The exact cause of failure was not known presently, diagnostic work was required to be completed before a repair method could be finalized. Magney Construction completed the expansion and were familiar with the plant processes. Recommendation was submitted that this firm be contracted to diagnose the problem in order for repair work to be completed this winter during low water demand usage.

Cost Share Agreement

The Public Services Direction discussed a Cost Share Agreement involving PreCise Salting Equipment with the council. The agreement with be with the Carver County Watershed Management Organization for PreCise Salt Tracker hardware. The agreement with the county would involve installation of hardware on four salt trucks. The newest acquisitioned truck already has the technology installed. This technology helps to reduce the amount of salt applied on roadways resulting in less usage and less chlorides discharged to regional water bodies.

Timber Creek Phase Four

The Community Development Director discussed the final plat for the Timber Creek Phase Four development with the council. The council reviewed the resolution adopting approval of the Final Plat, authorizing execution of the Developer's Agreement subject to the City Attorney's changes. The city had approved the first three phases for this project. Phase Four proposes sixty-six additional lots. The final tabulation for the development is two-hundred ninety seven of the three hundred forty eight homes will be through the planning process. The Final Plat for Phase Four conforms to the approved Preliminary Plat with lots meeting the requirements. The Final Plat was also reviewed and recommended approval by the Planning Commission Board. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution approving Timber Creek Phase Four Final Plat. Motion was made and carried with all ayes authorizing execution of the Developer's Agreement for Timber Creek 4th Addition subject to recommended changes by the City Attorney.

Service Recognition

Employee years of service recognition honored employees. Vicky Son-Eiden, City Clerk received the Five Year Service Award. Natalie Meyer, Administrative Assistant and Chad Shell, Public Services Director were also honored for their service with recognition certificates and thanked by the mayor.

Fire Department

The Fire Department submitted request for the purchase of two Chevrolet Tahoe's from the City of Chanhassen. One vehicle would replace an existing pick-up utilized as a command while the other would be an addition to the fleet allowing the department to realign and have a utility vehicle. This purchase would negate the planned purchase of a vehicle in 2024.

Carver Business Alliance

The Carver Business Alliance is a collaboration of business owners, community leaders, and local officials working together to promote, enhance, and create opportunities for commerce in the City of Carver. Business roundtable discussions are held, and City of Carver updates are provided at each meeting." They usually meet every third Friday at city hall. May's meeting is scheduled for Friday, November 17th.

Gateway to Carver

The Community Development Director discussed the issue regarding Gateway to Carver,

Country Road # 40. The city acquired owner-ship of the county road in December of 2022 which stretches from Jonathon Carver Parkway to downtown, extending to County Road # 61. There are several names affiliated with the track as it winds through Carver, Main Street West, Breodawy, Fourth Street East and Old Carver Road. This process occurs periodically when a city is directly impacted by decision along a corridor. Since the street traverses through downtown and across much of the southern half of the community, the city has more vested interest in the operation, maintenance and construction of the corridor. Not only now responsible for the expanse of road, the city now has control over how the corridor looks and functions. The city must be mindful of key intersections, trail connections and the overall look and feel of the corridor. A Task Force has been formed identified as Gateway to Carver. Business owners and residents along the corridor as well as resident throughout the community can provide valuable and meaningful feedback for the project. The Task Force held their first meeting providing feedback on how people utilize the road, and the challenges that they felt were visible. The group focused on concerns at the Mount Hope Road and Old Carver Road intersection, as well as the intersection of Broadway and Main. Their second meeting was held with staff to discuss visioning work completed with conceptual drawings. The Heritage Preservation Commission will also be reviewing the information due to the historic downtown area impacted. Other government units who reviewed their conceptual drawings were the Planning Commission, Business Alliance group, Park Advisory Group and the City Council. Residents along Main Street East met to see proposed traffic changes with the project. A table was set up at the Fire Department Open House event manned by staff to gather greater community feedback. A project page is available on the city's website and comments were submitted. The key intersections reviewed thus far also earned the focus and attention for overall pedestrian safety at both intersections. Importance was also placed on a trail from Jonathon Carver Parkway to the downtown area.

Seventh Annual Tree Lighting

The 2023 Seventh Annual Carver Tree Lighting at Gazebo Park in Downtown Carver, Minnesota is slated to go ahead folks. Mark your calendars, plan to attend. It's in the works everyone! "Several years ago the City of Carver created a community service award designed to recognize the time, support, service, and dedication that individuals and organizations have given unselfishly to our community. In 2019, the City Council renamed the award program after the late Mayor, Greg Osterdyk, in recognition of his many years of service and dedication shared with the community. It is important to acknowledge the hard work of citizens that truly make a difference in our community.

The Dahlgren Township Association annual meeting will be held December 7-9, 2023.

Did you know that October is/was Domestic Violence Awareness Month? That it began over thirty years ago supporting and connecting advocates working with survivors? It goes on more than we know and it goes on even here.

The Southern Valley Alliance stated that calls in the last two years have doubled and there is an increased need for programs. "Ending domestic violence takes neighbors, businesses, faith communities, families, friends, and coworkers willing to be involved in ending the cycle of abuse. We all have a critical role to play in supporting survivors of abuse and preventing it from continuing in our community. I hope you will take time during the month to take just one step to assist and advocate for survivors."

Did you know that Carver County requested funding for Lake Waconia Regional Park? Request was submitted for the third phase of the park project and plans to match those funds if approved. This funding would be put towards a picnic pavilion, playground, fishing pier, docks, parking lot expansion, trails and other park amenities.

Here's some more fun facts that you might not have known. Through partnerships with local organizations, the Eastern Carver County Schools Equity and Inclusion department hosted free produce market weekly in June through August. There were nearly one hundred volunteers who worked approximately a thousand hours to provide this market to families. Between the Chaska Middle School West and Norwood Young America Pavilion sites, 3029 family visits reached more than ten thousand people with 137,511 pounds of food being distributed. It was also estimated that more than one hundred and sixty five thousand meals were provided throughout the summer through the market. Eighty four percent of families experienced food insecurities in the past twelve months. Seventy two percent reported offered throughout the summer. This program made people feel like they belonged to the community. If you are one of those families in need, you can visit, if possible, www.findfoodcarvercounty.org for more insecurity opportunities.

From a Chaska Herald's article of looking into the past thought it would be nice share with you all in case you didn't see it in the local newspaper. "October 16th, 1862: Jack Frost, ESQ, has paid us nightly visits for the past week, causing everything in the vegetable kingdom to wither by his cold touch: of course the leaves are falling fast, and the forest will soon be "stark-naked."

The other passage involved October 17th, 1957: "Lystad's Exterminators of Minneapolis will bait the city dump for rats today (Thursday) and warn pet owners to keep their animals away from the city dump for the next week to ten days." Anyone remember where the old Chaska dump was? Yea, I know, I'm dating myself. Who cares really? Just found it a fun fact to share with everyone.

Here is some more fun facts for you also found from the Chaska Herald reporting. Westbrook Community Church donated one thousand pounds of fresh produce to a local non-profit distributor. The produce came from their garden during a recent youth initiative for delivery to Bountiful Basket Food Shelf in Chaska. The garden produce consisted mainly of sweet corn, tomatoes, pumpkins, cucumbers, beans, onions, peppers, radishes and carrots. Mark Danielson is the man who organized the garden project which began in 2022. Also, Westbrook high school student collected almost six hundred pounds of food during a trick-or-treat similar event asking for food donations instead of candy. Thanks and congratulations to everyone involved.

Where is he?

Remember the revered Carver "RiverBoat Captain" also dubbed "Steamboat Captain"?

Where is he? Where did he end up? Does anyone care? Does anyone know? Somewhere I thought or I vaguely remember hearing where the carving went but for the life of me, can't recall now. We are talking about back in 2003/2004 folks. Some people may not even know about our River Boat Captain. What better place or time to resurrect the carving? It began with the deterioration of a stump outside the old Temperance Hotel. A former Steamboat Days committee commissioned to have the old elm tree carved and we had our very own River Boat Captain. The old tree has been succumbed by the dreaded 'Dutch elm' disease which was the reason for the carving .

Where was it originally? If memory serves me right it was close to the garage of Lucie's and before what is now known as Getaway Motor Café. Correct me if I am wrong, someone. That's where he stood for a long time. Tale is that the carving rotted and tipped over and was then put behind the then Fire Station. From there? Who knows? Again, does anyone really care?

The history of our Steamboat Captain is: The 1981-1984 Steamboat Committee who consisted of the inspirational community members who love their community were Bev Swanson, Monica Giese, Chris Anderson, Phylis and Arlan Pauly along with Pat Chalupsky. The work on the carving began during the 1985 Steamboat Days event and was carved by Kathleen Reiton. So

where is our illustrious carving of the Steamboat Captain these days? I expect an answer someone......

Moving on: there was a second carving done of our esteemed captain. This was where this author became very confused and began digging. Thanks to my friend Jim who prefers to remain nameless filled in the blanks for me along with the other two friends of mine who were involved. Don't have their permission to publish their names at the time of this writing.

As the story goes: Carver on the Minnesota began looking into replacing our esteemed captain due to the arrival of the tugboat, "The North Wind" in 2011. The thought process was since they had this tugboat, the sight also needed its captain. (The Villager Tower, 2011, issue 277 you will find the article about the tugboat.) Jim, John and Peter went down to Minneapolis to get the log to bring back. From there the log went to Matt's on Highway #212 where at his sawmill cut the log to the dimensions needed. Peter then proceeded to carve the final product which you will now see at the end of Broadway near the "North Wind." There used to be a Tugboat Committee, as well. Anyway, back to the and carving sage; after Matt finished, the prepared wood was then moved to Peter's where he carved our esteemed second captain to oversee "The North Wind." In the beginning he also had a pipe in his mouth but some vandals removed it. Such a shame. The project was funded by the Carver on the Minnesota members.



Another interesting tidbit of information regarding the second venture to replace our original esteemed carved captain was that the Carver on the Minnesota had hoped to create and install historic-themed carving in Carver and along the trails but the then Park and Recreation Commission were not interested in the idea. And there you have it.

October marked the 37th recognized Domestic Violence Awareness Month. The issue of domestic violence remains prevalent but the society's understanding and treatment of the issue has changed since 1987.



Southern Valley Alliance for Carver and Scott

Counties is the counties primary resource for victims of domestic violence which was founded in 1982 formally known as the Southern Valley Alliance for Battered Women. To reflect the organization's broadening scope of work, the name was shortened.

An Alliance and partnering with law enforcement agencies was formed in 2021. Alliance relies heavily on the relationship with law enforcement agencies along with other nonprofit and community organizations. Along with the changing attitudes in society, offenses are taken more seriously than in the past.

Southern Valley Alliance has partnered with law enforcement agencies in Scott and Carver Counties to raise awareness and funds for domestic violence causes through the Purple Patch Program.
