2024 Community Survey

The City Manager discussed at a work session with the council the 2020 survey conducted by Morris Leatherman Group. The staff was asked to facilitate a process conducting the survey every three years with the goal of having the ability to measure results from year to year and to collection additional perspectives for future policy processes proposals. Process details were reviewed and it was determined that the telephone survey conducted resulted in four categories were established. A company representative will be on hand to assist with a discussion on the survey process. Additionally, the council have the opportunity to revise, add or delete from the previous survey for the upcoming 2024 survey. The council also informally discussed additional questions in the areas of the SW Prime services; resident usage, support of a subsidy, as well as the amount of such a subsidy; new recreation facilities;

Specific park amenities; and communications. Also included in the discussion involved the 2023-2026 Strategic Plan identifying initiatives in the areas of the communications strategy, engagement and satisfaction. Speed limit perspectives were another area discussed. Money had been allocated to conduct a community survey. The council reviewed the original survey along with the results of that survey and the Strategic Plan.

The City Manager discussed the Community Survey with the council regarding approval of the questionnaire and acceptance of the proposal to conduct the said survey. A number of adjustments had been implemented after the initial discussion and feedback. A proposed draft of the presented questionnaire was seeking adoption. A strategic initiative had been taken in 2020. At that time request was made to facilitate a process to conduct the survey every three years for the purpose of having the ability to measure results from year to year and collect additional perspectives to be better informed for future policy processes. The process detail would be to conduct a telephone survey of four hundred randomly selected households within city limits.

In Memory of Don Brinkhaus Proposed Parking Ordinance

The City Attorney discussed with the council at a work session the proposed drafting of an ordinance prohibiting parking near postal delivery boxes. Discussion and providing direction for drafting the ordinance were reviewed.

A discussion ensued regarding parking in front of residential mailboxes causing inability for delivery. State law provides some restrictions but does not address prohibiting parking or addressing the issues.

Data Practices Policy

The City Clerk discussed the updates relating to the Data Practices Policy with the council at their meeting. The guidelines by the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act (MGDPA) were cited which is a series of State laws that guide government entities on how government data are managed. According to the MGDPA, government data is defined as "all data collected, created, received, maintained, or disseminated" by a covered governmental entity "regardless of physical form, storage media, or conditions of use." The city's current policy was adopted on 2016.

Presently the staff proposes to replace the existing policy with the new updated version better reflecting various amendments that have occurred updating the city's processing data request, or other types of data collected. The City Attorney has proposed the updated policy and the staff reviewed.

The City Clerk reviewed the Data Practices Policy update with the council, along with the resolution to adopt the policy and designation of responsible authority and compliance official. An overview was given again regarding the laws of the state guiding the management of data. Current policy was adopted in 2016. Staff was proposing to replace the existing policy with a new version updating the processing of date reflecting various amendments made by the state. The newer version had been proposed by the City Attorney and the staff reviewed the draft.

Election Judges

The council discussed the item pertaining to Election Judge appointments and pay by approval of resolution. The establishment of rates of pay for the Presidential Nomination Primary election to be held on March 5th was up for review. State law requires adoption of this resolution for upcoming elections. The council reviewed the list of potential individuals who have been previously trained and served. The resolution also gives the city the opportunity to recruit more judges as needed.

2024 General Fund Budget Amendment

The Finance Direction discussed with the council the adoption of a resolution authorizing amendment to the 2024 General Fund Budget. The General Fund Budget had been adopted in December of 2023 with at that time the anticipation of receipt of Public Safety Aid revenue in early 2024. However, these funds were deposited sooner and this causes a different budget range than planned and it is the best practice to adjust the budgeted revenues and expenditures for 2024 which will remain balanced after the amendment.

CHASK

Carver Place

The Community Development Director presented the application from the Carver Place Preliminary Plat from the Carver County Community Development Agency to the Planning Commission board who reviewed and discussed the matter at their meeting. The Planning Commission held a Public Hearing without receiving any public input. The presented information was discussed by the board members. Motion was made and carried with all ayes recommending approval of the Preliminary Plat for the Carver Place proposal.

The Planning Commission board members also reviewed the Final Plat for the Carver Place proposal. The Carver Place meets the guidelines of the approved Comprehensive Plan and the property is appropriately zoned. The staff recommendation recommends approval of the Final Plat. The proposed project has been reviewed by the various departments which include the Legal, Engineering, Fire, Public Works Services, Planning and Administration Departments as well as reviewed by the Carver County Public Works department.

The council discussed the application for Carver Place by the Carver County Community Development Authority for the sixty unit apartment building proposal on Hartwell Drive. The proposed project would be a three-story building. The floor plans were reviewed by the council. There was a question and answer session held, as well. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution approving the Preliminary Plat for Carver Place.

Miscellaneous

The Property Valuation Process had been presented by the county assessor with an overview of the process, which included property taxation, assessment and the city's and county's data and discussed at a work session meeting.

The council reviewed with the City Attorney the proposed Fire Hydrant Tampering Ordinance. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the ordinance amending the chapter in the city code prohibiting nonauthorized use of city fire hydrants.

The Community Development Director updated the council on the Community Park skate park equipment which had been removed due to the age of the equipment, and maintenance concerns. The Parks Advisory Group will be discussing future uses and equipment options for the park. Currently the equipment is available for use at the Ironwood Park.

The Planning Commission Board was informed that reviewal of appropriate documents for the proposed Timber Creek, 5th Phase will be forthcoming tentatively in the winter of 2024.

Carver Oaks development will also be brought to the Planning Commission Board's attention in the future.

The discussion regarding the transportation facility with the school district was also brought to the Planning Commission's attention with the item scheduled to also be brought to their attention at some point this year.

The Carver Lions Soggy Bottom fundraiser was discussed by the council. The Soggy Bottom event began fifteen years ago under the leadership of Mayor Greg Osterdyk. The Lions organization will be evaluating different fundraising option for the future.

The council was updated on the Carver country Park Boards project relating to the Baylor Regional Park. Boardwalk construction is planned to begin soon. Plans to reopen in spring are in the works. A ribbon cutting ceremony for the Paradise Commons, a new rental facility at the Waconia Regional Park was held.

NorthStar Forge, a Carver business, was featured on the January 24 Twin Cities Live show the council was told.

The Light and Seek event was held at the Nature Conservatory. The council thanked publicly Anna Edland, Shelly Rudolf and Toni Dauwalter for their hard work coordinating this event.

The council reviewed the drafted ordinance amending city codes regarding prohibiting parking near postal delivery boxes.

Liquor License

The City Clerk discussed the topic with the council regarding the issuance of the liquor license for the Carver Black Sox. In the past the team held an on-sale license for seasonal home games. It has become increasingly difficult to obtain 3.2 % beer products according to the team. Additionally due to recent Minnesota law amendments for baseball teams changes have been established allowing procuring to qualifying persons. An on-sale wine license had been procured the previous year by the carver Black Sox Baseball Team. Notification had been sent to the MN Alcohol and Gambling Division that in addition to the wine license the Black Sox organization required to obtain an On-Sale Liquor License. An additional requirement was given and the team was notified. Required documentation would be forwarded for final approval. For future renewal the team will need to apply for both licenses to continue operating as in the past.

General Fleet Vehicles

The City Manager discussed with the council the purchase of general fleet vehicles. The city was looking to authorize the purchase of two trucks. The council was asked to consider this purchase of two medium-duty trucks to be added to the general fleet within the Public Services Department for the purpose of conducting work for all level of maintenance throughout the city.

The council discussed further the item relating to purchasing of two vehicles for the Public Services Department. Payment for these vehicles would be made through four-year interfund loan monies as outlined in the resolution presented to the council. Motion was made and carried with all ayes authorizing the purchase of two trucks from Apple Ford. Motion was made and carried with all ayes adopting the resolution authorizing an interfund loan.

Merriam Junction Trail Project

The council reviewed a power point presentation at their work session meeting regarding the Merriam Junction Trail Project. [For full details and more information, check the city's website, February 20th work session minutes)

A synopsis of the presentation involved the proposal for the trail project which would include 2.4 miles of paved trail, four bridges and embankment stabilization. Proposed trail connectivity with the Carver County's MN River Bluff Regional Trail, DNR's MN River Valley State Trail and the USFWS's Louisville Swamp Trailhead. Design collaboration with restoration of the levee condition in Scott County and the City of Carver's levee improvements.

The partners in this project include: the City of Carver, Carver County, Louisville Township, MN DNR, and US Fish and Wildlife Services (USFWS .)

Bluff Creek Parking Lot

At a work session the council discussed with the City Manager the Bluff Park parking lot addition. During times of full field use in Bluff Park, traditionally overflow parking spills onto Carver Bluffs Parkway and Carver Creek Circle. Concerns have been expressed regarding the overflowing parking situation. A parking facilities concept was being proposed. As a cost savings measure, construction of a gravel surface additional parking area work will be performed by the Public Department. This additional parking area would accommodate an additional forty-three spaces.

Water Treatment Facility Improvements

The Assistant City Engineer discussed with the council the Change Order for the Water Treatment Facility Improvements project. The project had included new construction on the existing facility site, infrastructure, upgrades and reconfigurations to the existing facility and site infrastructure to compliment the overall facility expansion efforts. Recent determinations were made for operational efficiency. The change order would be funded with the balance of construction contingencies. This contingency amount is unallocated in the current Long-Term Financial Plan resulting in no significant impacts to the city's rate structure. The next revision of the Long-Term Financial Plan process, scheduled to begin the summer of 2024, adjustments should show this capital expense relating to the next plan.





January Water Report

It is city staff's objective is to work with residents regarding removal of discolored water from household systems.

The city is aware of this issue inadvertently creating an unwanted narrative regarding recent water concerns. The following quote, unquote is not the full memo posted. Reference the city's webpage for the full content.

"The Water Resources Team acknowledges and regrets that in attempts to assist residents with discolored water reports, opportunities were missed to directly respond to the principal concern. We can and will do better! There is an abundance of mineral deposits (iron and manganese) in the City's water mains right now, which causes intermittent discoloration of water throughout the community. Although there is not a safety issue with the water, we acknowledge the situation is not ideal and want to improve the conditions significantly. This issue has been exacerbated in cases where people live near dead end infrastructure (water mains), near closed valve locations that were recently opened, and in areas where fire hydrants have been illegally accessed. The City needs to do a community-wide hydrant (water main) flush to remove these minerals from the system. The City can do this work as soon as overnight temperatures stay above freezing for 30 days or more. Although the City's manganese levels are within the Department of Health's desired ranges, the City's Utility Operators and Engineers believe they can make adjustments to the filtration system at the Water Treatment Facility on Mount Hope Road that increases the ability to pull a greater percentage of minerals out of the system...prior to the "finished" water being distributed throughout the community. There will always be a certain amount of minerals in our water, frankly every municipal drinking water system has them, however...if we increase our ability to remove these minerals on the head end...we can minimize the impacts out in the water main and in homes. Tremendous progress has been made in this area."

"OPERATIONS UPDATE Off-season flushing was completed. A full city-wide water main flush of the entire distribution system is planned for this spring. In the interim, residents may experience intermittent discoloration, until the benefits of a city-wide water main flush are realized. The Utilities Team charged the filter system, which promotes manganese and iron removal during the filtration process. The Utilities Team also cleaned the reclaim tank."

"MAINTENANCE TIP Home Water Softening (MN Department of Health) • Make sure the softener is set to the hardness of your water supply. If the hardness is set too high, the softener will cost more to operate and waste water, costing you extra money. The City of Carver suggests 32-35 grains as the water softener setting. • If your home has new copper plumbing, do not run the water softener for at least the first few weeks you use water at your house. This will help the plumbing form a protective mineral layer to reduce the risk of consuming excess copper. • Make sure that the softener is filled with sodium or potassium chloride (softener salt) following the manufacturer's recommendations. • Depending on your water quality, some softeners may be able to fully or partially remove copper, iron, manganese, and radium, in addition to calcium and magnesium. Note that copper can reenter the water after if leaves the softener and passes through your home's pipes and plumbing."

Ides of March

Know what the Ides of March even are? What does "Beware the Ides of March" even mean? Look it up if you are want to know more, but this author summed up what Tim Goodwin had to say about the Ides of March.



"Wm Shakespeare created a mystique around the Ides of March with his late 16th -century classic, *Julius Caesar*.

But where did the term originate? Why is it a symbol for bad luck? It has ties to Shakespeare.

"According to the Roman calendar, the Ides are a monthly occurrence. In March and other months with 31 days, the Ides always falls on the 15th; it falls on the 13th in months with 30 days. The Ides traditionally marked the arrival of the new Moon and was cause for celebration. The word "Ides" is derived from Latin, meaning "to divide."

The Ides is one of three named days in the Roman calendar month. The others are the Kalends, which always falls on the first day of a month, and the Nones, which occurs on either the 5th or the 7th of a month, depending on if it has 30 or 31 days, respectively."

"The Romans tracked time differently than we do today. Instead of assigning a number to each day, months were divided into groupings around three landmark days that marked specific Moon phases. For example, in March, the Kalends represented the first day of a month (new Moon); the Nones fell on the seventh day (first quarter); and the Ides occurred on the 15th (full Moon)."

"The Ides fell on the 15th in the months of March, May, July, and October. In the other months, the Ides were recognized on the 13th, which also shifted the Nones to the fifth day. The time between the 3 days was counted as "before the Nones," "before the Ides," and "before the Kalends."

The Ides of March also represented the beginning of a new year with the appearance of the first full Moon of the Roman year before January and February were later added to the Roman calendar. Should You Fear the Ides of March?"

"As with <u>Friday the 13th</u>, bad luck is in the eye of the beholder, so it's best to just go about your day as usual on March 15. In other words, don't live in fear of something out of your control. If someone tells you to "Beware the Ides of March," it's probably nothing of serious consequence, but that's probably what Caesar thought, too!"

"The Shakespeare Connection

Caesar gives little thought to the words, but he should have taken them more to heart—because he may have lived to lead another day. Caesar's Last Ides of March

It is said that Caesar, the Roman general and dictator, received a similar message on March 15, 44 B.C. He did not take the warning to heart and was assassinated by a group of senators. The plot, led by enemies-turned-friends Marcus Junius Brutus and Gaius Cassius Longinus, was carried out in the Senate House in Rome. It is said that those who took part in Caesar's killing believed it would save the Roman Republic. Others have speculated that Caesar's calendar reform and the rejection of long-held Roman traditions led to his demise."



Women's History Month

Women's History Month 2024 will take place from Friday, March 1 - Sunday, March 31, 2024. Sidebar: While there is not a specific month designated to Celebrate the males there is an International Men's Day, November 19th, recognizing the positive value men also bring to the world, their families and communities.



While at the same time, it is an obvious observation, as well, that this particular honoring of the female population will undoubtedly offend/disturb/aggravate some men, not all, but the ones who have been have hurt, desecrated unfairly or used by some women. This theme recognizes women who understand the need to eliminate bias and discrimination from individuals' lives and institutions."

As the days get longer and hopefully warmer, I have a handful of updates to share this month. Here goes! Parking by mailboxes – A resident reached out to me recently asking if parking was prohibited in front of mailboxes. It turns out it wasn't, but that's about to change! The Morris Leatherman Group will conduct a telephone survey of 400 randomly selected households in the City of Carver. This sample size will provide results projectable to the entire city adult population within ± 5.0 percent in 95 out of 100 cases. The sample is also sufficient to permit the results to be divided into four categories for more detailed analysis, such as age, mobility, home ownership, presence of children and other demographic characteristics. We should have results from the Community Survey later this summer.$

Hollywood comes to Carver – Last month a film crew rented Church by the River to film scenes for "Unholy Communion," a new murder mystery movie based on the book of the same name by Thomas Rumerich. Lisa's Journey to find a Kidney Donor

There was an article in the Chaska Herald (SW News Media) regarding a Carver family's daughter-in-law, Lisa Armstrong who is married to Mike Armstrong. Lee and Rosie Armstrong are her in-laws who are Dahlgren Township residents but considered a part of Carver. Lee used to own Carver Heating and Air Conditioning, a business in Carver. It seems Ms Armstrong is in need of a kidney transplant. Also, from reading the article Graham Johnson wrote, she has had quite the health journey her entire life. Her kidneys are failing and she is currently on dialysis. Possibly word can be spread so that someone might find it in their heart to step up, be tested and donate a kidney?

A former teacher, Bev Geffert, from Chaska Schools approached the School Board about putting up a banner at a school game event for the purpose of awareness and the need for a kidney. The article was published the week of February 22nd, or Carver Current webpage also

has it printed on the 22nd. It's well worth the read and again, anyone who may be interested is asked to call 612-625-5115 and identify Lisa's name. Or if you prefer and can, visit www.uofmtransplant.org for more information. Prayers and thoughts are extended to Lisa and her family.

Graham stated that what is important and the biggest thing I would like to emphasize is that not only are all the medical tests surrounding donation paid for, you will receive a report about all the tests that were done and whether you are a candidate for donation. Even if someone cannot donate directly to Lisa for whatever reason (different blood type for example), you can still do what is called a paired exchange where someone donates a kidney to another person but references Lisa Armstrong, she will be moved to the front of the list and get the next available kidney that she is a match for. Age isn't necessarily a factor for the donor either. The biggest thing is that the donor is healthy and isn't on a lot of medication. I would be so happy if we could help this woman find a donor.

This is Lisa's story:

I have had type 1 diabetes since age 6. I have always tried to take good care of myself, but the technology to care for diabetes was not always as good as it is now. I had my first transplant from my mother in 1995. I had a pancreas transplant in 2005 to eliminate the diabetes, but that transplant failed and the diabetes returned and it damaged my mother's kidney that she donated. My sister donated a kidney in 2010. In 2011, I found out that I had cancer from the medication I was taking for the transplant. The chemotherapy worked, but caused damage to my sister's donated kidney. I have been cancer free for 12 years. I have had kidney failure and been on dialysis 3 times a week for 4 hours each day since May of 2023. A living donor is the most successful way to get a transplant. My family members have been screened and are unable to donate for various reasons. I am reaching out to friends and the community to see if there is someone that is a match that would be willing to donate.

Some positive aspects of donating a kidney are that you will get free in-depth medical screening. There is a grant that can reimburse you for lost wages and your job is safe while you are out. The hospital stay is usually only a couple of days and everything is paid for. There are tax credits for kidney donors also. If you are interested in learning more about kidney donation at the U of MN., please call 612-625-5115 and tell them you would like to donate a kidney to Lisa Armstrong. It is called a directed donation. This will help me to be able to live to see my daughter graduate and see her future unfold, which is something that is precious to me.


